Charleston, West Virginia, Tuesday, March 4, 2025

The Senate met at 11:05 a.m.

(Senator Smith, Mr. President, in the Chair.)

Sub. for Senate Bill 589 (originating in the Committee on the Judiciary)—A Bill to amend and reenact §50-1-3, §51-1-10a, §51-2-13, §51-2A-6, §51-9-4, §51-9-6a, §51-9-6b, §51-9-6c, and §51-11-11 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to repeal §51-9-6d, relating to salaries and retirement benefits of judges; increasing annual salary of magistrates, justices of the Supreme Court of Appeals, circuit court judges, family court judges, and judges of the Intermediate Court of Appeals; providing salary for secretary-clerks of family court judges and family case coordinators determined by a pay scale established by court; suspending contribution of courts into judicial retirement system until certain condition met; providing for actuarially reduced pension benefit for judges in certain circumstances; increasing surviving spouse plan benefit; eliminating distinction between certain judges for purposes of calculating surviving spouse plan benefits, surviving dependent children plan benefits, and adjusted annual retirement benefit; and providing sunset date for limitation on retirement benefits.

**Senate Bill 622,** Authorizing compensation for certain lower court staff.

**Senate Bill 662**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new section, designated §16B-17-21, relating to clarifying that racial discrimination includes discrimination based on certain hair textures and hairstyles historically associated with a particular race; and defining a term.

Referred to the Committee on Government Organization; and then to the Committee on the Judiciary.

**Senate Bill 663**—A Bill to amend and reenact §46A-6-102 and §46A-6-105 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to amend the code by adding a new article, designated §46A-6O-1, §46A-6O-2, §46A-6O-3, §46A-6O-4, §46A-6O-5, and §46A-6O-6, relating to creating the Transparency and Accountability in Financial Services Act; providing a short title; setting forth legislative declarations; providing definitions; requiring transparency upon request and prohibiting discrimination; establishing enforcement provisions; providing for severability; and clarifying relevant consumer protection provisions.

Referred to the Committee on Banking and Insurance; and then to the Committee on the Judiciary.

#### By Senators Azinger, Martin, Phillips, Charnock, and Helton:

**Senate Bill 664**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new article, designated §5A-3A-1, §5A-3A-2, §5A-3A-3, §5A-3A-4, §5A-3A-5, and §5A-3A-6, relating to establishment of the First Amendment Preservation Act; providing definitions; prohibiting state contracts with media monitoring organizations; requiring written certifications that state purchasing contracts are in compliance with the act; and clarifying the applicability of the act to state contracts.

Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

#### **By Senator Azinger:**

Senate Bill 665—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended by adding a new section, designated §31A-1-7, relating to clarifying that when a West Virginia state chartered bank sells or transfers all, or substantially all, of its assets and liabilities to another entity, that such buyer or transferee must be insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation; providing the right to seek equitable relief to the Commissioner of the Board of Banking and Financial Institutions and to interested parties to prevent prohibited transactions by unqualified buyers; and clarifying that the prohibition on the acquisition or transfer of a West Virginia state chartered bank by buyers or transferors that are not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation does not apply to any agreement that was originally executed prior to the date of enactment of this section, or to any subsequent amendment or modification to any such agreement.

#### By Senator Weld:

**Senate Bill 666**—A Bill to amend and reenact §11-13MM-2 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to disabled veteran taxpayers; and clarifying the definition of a "disabled veteran taxpayer".

Referred to the Committee on Military; and then to the Committee on Finance.

#### By Senator Azinger:

**Senate Bill 667**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new section, designated §18-33-9, relating to requiring public elementary schools and secondary schools to display in a conspicuous place in each classroom of the school a durable poster or framed copy of the Ten Commandments that meets certain requirements; and listing requirements for the posters or frames and uses for surplus posters.

Referred to the Committee on Education; and then to the Committee on Finance.

**Senate Bill 668**—A Bill to amend and reenact §11-13JJ-4 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to clarifying the participation requirement for the volunteer firefighter tax credit.

**Senate Bill 669**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new article, designated §33-15F-1, §33-15F-2, §33-15F-3, §33-15F-4, §33-15F-5, §33-15F-6, and §33-15F-7, relating to requiring medical insurance providers to include infertility services in their policies; making findings; providing for determination of infertility; providing prohibited and permissible limitations on coverage; requiring rulemaking; establishing an effective date; providing for severability; and defining terms

#### By Senator Garcia:

**Senate Bill 670**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new section, designated §17-2A-4c, relating to authorizing the Commissioner of the Division of Highways to offer locality pay to Division of Highways employees working in certain jurisdictions.

Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure; and then to the Committee on Finance.

#### By Senator Rucker:

**Senate Bill 671**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new article, designated §8A-13-1, §8A-13-2, §8A-13-3, §8A-13-4, §8A-13-5, and §8A-13-6, relating to establishing the By-Right Housing Development Act to streamline the approval process for development when that proposed development meets all the rules for such development in a given community.

Referred to the Committee on Economic Development; and then to the Committee on Government Organization.

#### By Senator Rucker:

**Senate Bill 672**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new section, designated §18-2-15, relating to the State Board of Education; requiring students in grades K through 12 to deposit their mobile phones in a secure container during instructional time; and providing exceptions for students who may have a need for their mobile device (for example, students with diabetes or other medical conditions who require access to their cell phone for medical purposes) or have permission from a teacher to use the mobile device for educational purposes.

#### **By Senator Rucker:**

**Senate Bill 673**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new article, designated §8A-13-1, §8A-13-2, §8A-13-3, §8A-13-4, §8A-13-5, §8A-13-6, §8A-13-7, §8A-13-8, and §8A-13-9, relating to defining third-party challenges to development permits; setting forth definitions; providing that properly issued development permits shall be presumed valid and enforceable unless proven otherwise through a legal challenge; defining what constitutes standing and for purposes of challenging a development permit; limiting third-party challenges to development permits; defining the burden of proof to challenge development permits; providing an expedited review process for resolving legal challenges to development permits; requiring transparency and accountability for authorities that issue development permits; providing a right to appeal for denials of development permits due to a third-party challenge; and providing that third parties that are unsuccessful in challenging a development permit shall pay the applicant's attorney's fees and expenses.

**Senate Bill 674**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new article, designated §18-36-1, §18-36-2, and §18-36-3, relating to permitting students to take the Classical Learning Test as an alternative to the traditional ACT and SAT exams; providing for definitions; providing for post-secondary and higher education admissions and financial aid; and providing for college preparation assessments.

**Senate Bill 675**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new section, designated §30-5-37, relating to requiring a participant in a federal 340B Drug Pricing Program to report certain data to the Board of Pharmacy.

**Senate Bill 678**—A Bill to amend and reenact §5B-2O-1, §5B-2O-2, §5B-2O-3, and §5B-2O-4 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to amend the code by adding a new section, designated §5B-2O-5, relating to establishing the Affordable Electricity and Economic Growth Act of 2025 to facilitate coke production and steelmaking in the state.

escheated and waste and unappropriated lands; providing all lands subject to sale under this article be certified before July 1; providing all land sales be completed within 150 days after the auditor has certified the lands; and clarifying payment shall be made to the sheriff of the county in which the property is situated.

**Senate Bill 685**—A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new article, designated §31E-17-1701, §31E-17-1702, and §31E-17-1703, relating to creating the Non-Profit Transparency and Accountability Act; naming the act; putting forth legislative findings; and requiring that all nonprofit organizations that receive any part of their total operating funds from public sources, whether state or federal, shall be subject to Freedom of Information Act requests and bear the responsibility to respond to these requests under the same requirements as a public body.

**Senate Bill 686**—A Bill to amend and reenact §19-14-2 and §19-14-5 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to the West Virginia commercial feed law; and providing that a person engaged in selling products or commodities produced exclusively on their own farm is not a distributor and is exempt from obtaining a Commercial Feed Distributor Permit.

**Senate Bill 687**—A Bill to amend and reenact §24-1-1 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to the authority of the Public Service Commission; providing limitations on the jurisdiction on electric utilities by the Public Service Commission; requiring rate adjustment recommendations be forwarded to the Legislature; and establishing rate adjustments require specific bill approval by the Legislature.
