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

The Governor is vested with the chief executive power of the State; recommends to the Legislature, by message at the commencement of such session thereof, the passage of such measures as he deems expedient; appoints, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, certain officers of the State Government, who may be removed by him for cause; may remit fines and penalties, grant reprieves, commute punishment and pardon and parole after conviction; is Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the State and, as such, may call out the National Guard to enforce laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

The Auditor, as the State's official bookkeeper, audits all claims presented against the State for payment; keeps complete record of lands forfeited to the State, sold for delinquent taxes and redeemed; collects delinquent taxes and all taxes from public service corporations, and assesses and collects license taxes and fees from corporations; as attorney-in-fact, accepts service of process directed to all corporations; through the fire marshal, investigates fires and keeps records of fire losses in West Virginia; through the deputy insurance commissioner, issues licenses to insurance agents and companies, and assesses and collects all insurance taxes and fees; and, through the deputy securities commissioner, issues licenses for the sale of securities in West Virginia, approving or rejecting and supervising such sale in the State.

State Board of Education Members: \$600 per year and necessary expenses. Term: Six years. Bi-partisan. Six members appointed by Governor, with advice and consent of Senate. State Superintendent of Schools chief executive officer and member of board. Meetings fixed by resolution of board or by call of president or State Superintendent of Schools.

Negro Board of Education Members: \$600 per year and necessary expenses. Consists of two members of Negro race appointed by Governor with advice and consent of Senate, the State Supervisor of Negro Schools and State Superintendent of Schools, ex officio.

The Superintendent of Schools is the head of the Department of Education and, as such, has supervision of the free schools of the State, serving as chief executive officer of the West Virginia Board of Education. The Superintendent has power to institute proper proceedings for the removal of school officials, arranges for conferences with local superintendents relating to conditions, needs and improvements of schools; causes to be prepared and published courses of study, school laws, library book lists, and other pamphlets which promote interest in schools; serves as chairman of the State Board of School Finance, which controls the distribution of state aid to local school systems; and interprets school laws and rules of the State Board of Education. State Board of Education has general control and management of educational affairs of all state educational institutions, except West Virginia University and Potomac State School of West Virginia University. Negro Board has general control, management and supervision with the State Board of Education of Negro Schools in State.

Standardization Committee: Receives no compensation. THE STATE ROAD COMMISSION

ERNEST L. BAILEY, Commissioner

Salary of Commissioner: \$6,000 per year. Appointed by Governor with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Four years.

Members of Commission: \$10 per day for days actually in session; compensation not to exceed \$300 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Four years. Non-partisan. Meets third Monday in January and third Monday in July. State Road Commissioner is member of Commission.

State Road Commission's jurisdiction extends to the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of 4,800 miles of designated primary roads, and the 29,550 miles of designated secondary roads, and the State Road Commissioner is empowered by law to supervise the fiscal affairs of the Commission to provide for such construction, reconstruction and maintenance. In addition, the Commission registers automotive vehicles, regulates traffic on state roads, and outdoor advertising contiguous to its roads, operates state-owned toll bridges, engages in roadside development and maintains a department to supply highway information.

Advisory Council: \$15 per day for each day actually served in discharge of duties, also necessary expenses. Six members appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Six years, subject to will and pleasure of Governor. Two members represent employer interests, two employee interests and two the interests of the general public. Meets first Monday in January, April, July and October. Limit of 30 days' service in any year.

Board of Review: \$4,000 per year each. Three members appointed by Governor, with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Six years. Non-partisan. Governor designates chairman.

Purpose is to promote social and economic security by reducing, as far as possible, the hazards of unemployment. Through compulsory system of unemployment reserves, it provides measures of security to families of unemployed persons and guards against menace to health, morals and welfare arising from unemployment. Council serves as advisory body to Director. Board of Review hears and determines disputed claims, appoints examiners, organizes appeal tribunals and exercises such additional powers as may be necessary for the proper conduct of a system of administrative review of disputed claims.

Silicosis Medical Board: Compensation per diem fixed by Commissioner. Three members licensed physicians, appointed by Commissioner. Term: Six years. Commissioner selects chairman annually.

Provides workmen with hospitalization and medical care for injuries sustained in the course of and growing out of their employment in industry, fixes compensation during their disability, and, in case of death, provides for their dependents. Workmen's Compensation Appeal Board to review action of Commissioner upon appeal of any employer, employee or dependent. Silicosis Medical Board determines the presence of silicosis and stage and degree of resultant disability.

STATE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, Article I, Code 1931, all boards of examination and registration are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year. Each board is also given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers are authorized to administer oaths.

Each applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of \$20, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge \$5 for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof. All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board, and each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificate it issues. An applicant who has been refused a license, or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked, has the right of appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he resides.

Unless otherwise specified, members of boards are allowed \$10 per day for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or of its committees and in necessary travel, and are entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January, and the secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

BOARD OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS

(\$10 per diem while in session)

Created 1911; non-partisan; composed of three certified public accountants who have been in active practice in West Virginia for at least five years; members receive \$10 per diem while in session, and actual expenses; self-sustaining; appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate; term, three years; elects own officers; members eligible for reappoinment; duties, to conduct examinations of applicants for certificates as certified public accountants. (Code, 30-9.)

STATE BOARD OF AERONAUTICS

(Serves without compensation)

Created by Chapter 4, Acts 1931; to consist of three members, to be appointed by the Governor for a term of two years, and to serve without compensation; one member to be State Road Commissioner; bi-partisan; board to have general supervision and control over all airports and landing fields used for commercial purposes and over all State, county and municipal airports, schools of aviation and all other phases of aerial activities.

AGRICULTURAL ADVISORY BOARD

Created in 1923; consists of the Governor, the Commissioner of Agriculture and the Director of the Agricultural Extension Division of the West Virginia University, ex officio; board to meet at the seat of government at least four times each year at regular intervals, to consider the condition and needs of the agricultural interests of the State and to prevent overlapping, duplication or interference of, by or with the work of one department of agriculture with that of the other. (Code, 19-1-9.)

WEST VIRGINIA BOARD OF ARCHITECTS

(\$10 per diem while in session; Secretary's salary, \$50 per month)

Consists of five members, appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate, for a term of five years; members receive \$10 per day while in session and expenses; self-sustaining; must be architects of not fewer than ten years active practice in West Virginia; all members eligible for reappointment; non-partisan. This board examines all applicants for the practice of architecture in the State and registers successful applicants. (Code, 30-12.)

STATE ARMORY BOARD

Consists of the Governor, Secretary of State, and State Auditor; duties to approve the selection of all armory sites and plans and specifications, to contract for the erection of all armories, for the purchase of buildings suitable for armories; to have control of all arsenals, armories or other quarters of the National Guard, camp grounds and rifle ranges owned by the State; may procure by purchase or condemnation armories, arsenals, camp grounds, etc., when State reimbursed, may transfer title of camp grounds and rifle ranges to United States.

STATE ATHLETIC COMMISSION

(Serves without compensation)

Created under Chapter 3, Acts 1931; to consist of three members to be appointed by the Governor, for a term of three years, to serve at the will and pleasure of Governor; bi-partisan; no two to be residents of the same county at the same time; to serve without compensation; self-sustaining; the commission to have sole direction, management and jurisdiction over all boxing, wrestling and sparring matches and exhibitions held within the State; to license clubs, corporations or associations; to hold such matches or exhibitions and to appoint all referees

STATE COMMITTEE OF BARBERS AND BEAUTICIANS

(\$10 per diem while in session)

Created under Chapter 82, Acts Second Extraordinary Session, 1933; bipartisan; members receive \$10 per diem and expenses not to exceed \$4 per day while in session; self-sustaining from examination fees; composed of the Commissioner of Health, ex officio, and four other members to be appointed by the Governor by and with the consent of the Senate, for a term of four years, to serve at the will and pleasure of the Governor; one such member to be an employing barber, one an employee barber, one an employing beautician and one an employee beautician, and one of the four to be a member of the colored race; committee to examine all applicants for certificates of registration, issue certificates, collect examination and registration fees and promulgate rules and regulations covering the operation of barber and beauty shops and schools of barbering and beauty culture.

CARNIFEX FERRY BATTLE GROUND PARK COMMISSION

(Serves without compensation)

Created under Chapter 9, Acts 1931; commission to consist of three members appointed by the Governor for a term of four years; to serve without compensation; commission authorized to examine, survey and locate lines for a state park, in Nicholas County, opposite the mouth of Meadow River, said site to include the location of the battery, rifle pits and terrain upon which the battle of Carnifex Ferry was fought in the Civil War; commission is authorized to procure options, contract for the payment of the purchase price, survey and place battle-ground markers at a cost not to exceed \$5,000; vacancies on commission to be filled by the Governor.

STATE COURT OF CLAIMS

(\$15 per diem while in session)

Principal office of commission in State Capitol at Charleston; meetings annually in January and at such other times and places as may be designated by the chairman; commission to prescribe rules, regulations and conditions for horse racing in West Virginia.

(\$10 per diem while in session)

Created under Chapter 5, Acts, 1939; consists of seven members, including the Director of the State Agricultural Extension Division, the Director of the State Agricultural Experiment Station, the Director of the State Conservation Commission, the State Commissioner of Agriculture (all of whom serve ex officio), and three representative citizens to be appointed by the Governor; term of office for citizen members, four years; of first members appointed, one shall serve two years, one three years, and one four years; to serve without compensation, but to be reimbursed for expenses; majority to constitute quorum; authorized to employ administrative officer and other technical experts; to offer assistance to supervisors and coordinate the programs of the several districts; to disseminate information throughout the State concerning the activities and programs affecting soil conservation and to accept and receive donations, gifts, contributions, grants and appropriations from the United States and from the State of West Virginia or other sources, and to use the same for the purpose of carrying on the administrative duties of the commission.

TEACHERS' RETIREMENT BOARD

Board charged with general administration and management of Retirement System; has right to sue and be sued, plea and be impleaded, contract and be contracted with, and shall make all necessary rules and regulations to carry out provisions of retirement law. Members serve without compensation but are reimbursed for necessary expenses; no member shall suffer loss of salary while performing Board duties; shall meet at least twice a year; authorized to employ executive secretary whose compensation shall not exceed maximum prescribed for the office of county superintendent of schools; also may secure services of necessary technical and administrative employees.



LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS

FIRST EXTRAORDINARY SESSION, 1944

(January 3 to 7)

The Legislature of West Virginia was convened in extraordinary session by Governor Neely for the purpose of enacting legislation providing for absentee voting for men and women of West Virginia in the Armed Services of the United States.

Senate Bill No. 2 was the only bill passed during this session. This act provided for the temporary registration and absentee voting for men and women in any branch of the Armed Services of the United States who, in the performance of their duties, would be absent on election day. This act shall expire June thirtieth, one thousand nine hundred forty-seven.

This extraordinary session also passed the following House Concurrent Resolution:

"Raising a joint committee to study the problem of economic and physical rehabilitation of West Virginians now in military service.

"Resolved by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring therein:

"That a joint committee of six, consisting of three on the part of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the Speaker thereof, and three on the part of the Senate, to be appointed by the President thereof, be named to study the problem of rehabilitation of the United States' veterans of the present war, most particularly the task of restoring those now in service to as good or better jobs than those they left upon donning the uniform of the United States government; and, be it

"Further Resolved, That this committee shall have the power to request the assistance of representatives or committees from the ranks of industry, labor and government, in the study of this problem, leading toward a concerted drive for physical and economic rehabilitation of West Virginians in the armed forces.

"The committee shall select a chairman, and if deemed advisable, a co-chairman from its membership, and is authorized to employ such clerical assistance as may be determined to be necessary by a majority vote of the full membership of the committee.

"The committee is granted authority to hold hearings at any place in the State of West Virginia, and is authorized to sit during the recess of the Legislature.

"The Clerk of the House of Delegates and the Clerk of the Senate, upon the approval of the chairman of said committee, shall draw their requisitions upon the Auditor, payable out of the contingent fund of the two houses, respectively, for the actual expenses of said committee which expenses shall not exceed one thousand dollars. Requisitions to the Auditor for payment of expenses of said committee shall be accompanied by a signed approval of said expenses, signed by the chairman of said committee or by one authorized to do so by the committee.

"The Auditor is authorized, upon the presentation of the requisitions of the clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates, to draw his warrants upon the treasury in payment of same.

"Said committee shall report its findings to the next extraordinary or regular session of the Legislature."

Complying with the "terms of this resolution, on Thursday, June 22, 1944, Senate President, James Paull, and Speaker of the House of Delegates, John E. Amos, appointed the following committee:

RULES OF THE SENATE

(Regular Session, 1943)

Presiding Officer

- 1. The President of the Senate may appoint a President pro tempore, who during the absence of the President shall preside and perform all the duties of the President. The President having taken the chair, and a quorum being present the journal of the preceding day shall be read, to the end that any mistake may be corrected that may have been made in the entries.
- 2. The presiding officer of the Senate may call a member to the chair who shall exercise his functions for the time being, but no member by virtue of such appointment, shall preside for a longer period than three days.
- 3. The presiding officer of the Senate shall have the regulation of such parts of the Capitol and of its passages as are, or may be, set apart for the use of the Senate, its officers and committees.

Admittance to Senate Chamber

4. No person except members of the House of Delegates, the heads of the executive departments, the governor's private secretary, ex-members of the legislature, judges of the supreme court of appeals, circuit courts and of other courts of record, representatives of the press duly accredited to the Committee on Rules, and legislative attaches engaged in the proper discharge of their duties, shall be admitted within the Senate chamber while the Senate is in session. No person, not a member of the Senate, shall, while within the chamber when the Senate is in session, seek in any manner whatsoever to influence the vote or opinion of any Senator on any subject of legislative consideration, under penalty of disbarment from the chamber for the remainder of the legislative session. No attache of the Senate shall, at any time, engage in such activity, under penalty of immediate dismissal by the Committee on Rules.

Duties of Clerk—Official Journal

- 5. The Journal of the Senate shall be daily drawn up by the Clerk and shall be read the succeeding day. It shall be printed under the supervision of the Clerk and delivered to the members without delay. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for corrections, the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith, and from the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal. In addition thereto ten copies shall be printed on 6×9 heavy weight bond paper, with a certificate at the end thereof signed by the President and Clerk of the Senate certifying that the same is the official Journal of the Senate. They shall be bound in flexible binding and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the Senate of West Virginia," with designation of regular or extra session and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk, one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History and one with the Clerk of the House of Delegates.
- 6. The Clcrk of the Senate shall not suffer any records or papers to be taken from the table, or out of his custody, by any person except a chairman of a committee but he may deliver any bill or paper, directed to be printed, to the printer of the Senate, or to any member of the Senate on taking his receipt for the same.
- 7. The Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates may interchange messages between the hours of adjournment and that of meeting on the following day, so that said messages may be read immediately after the usual order of the day.

Powers of the Senate Over Its Members

- 8. A majority of the Senators shall be necessary to proceed to business; two members may adjourn, and three members may order a call of the Senate, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the Senate, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been twice called.
- 9. In case a less number than a quorum of the Senate shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be made as the Senate, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund. And this rule shall apply, as well to the first convention of the Senate at the legal time of meeting, as to each day of the session, after the hour has arrived to which the Senate stood adjourned.
- 10. No Senator shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the Committee on Privilege and Elections, and reported to the Senate, unless by order of the President of the Senate.
- 11. The Senate may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 25.)
- 12. The Senate may punish by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its officers in the discharge of their duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of any member for words spoken in debate; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 26.)

Privileges of Members

- 13. Every member, when speaking, shall stand in his own place, and address the President and when he has finished, take his seat.
- 14. Every member within the Senate chamber, when a question is put, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the Senate excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting must be made before the Senate divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason why, in his opinion, it ought to be adopted.
- 15. If a member be called to order, for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the Senate for words spoken in debate, if any member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exceptions to them have been taken.

Roll Calls

- 16. No member of the Senate, or other person except the Clerk and his assistants, shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called or counted.
- 17. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same subject, without leave of the Senate; nor more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- 18. While the President is reporting or putting a question none shall entertain private discourse, read, stand up, walk into, out of, or across the Senate Chamber.
- 19. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Chair, and then the mover shall have the right to explain his views, in preference to any other member.
- 20. While the President is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.

21. During any debate, any Senator, though he has spoken to the matter, may arise and speak to the orders of the Senate, if they be transgressed, in case the President does not; but if the President stands up at any time, he is first to be heard.

Absence Without Leave

22. If any member of the Senate absent himself from the service thereof without leave, except in case of his sickness or other unavoidable cause which may prevent his attendance, the Senate may by order or resolution, direct his absence to be entered on the Journal.

Absence With Leave

23. No member of the Senate shall absent himself from its service without leave first obtained.

Standing Commitees

- 24. At the commencement of each session the following standing committees shall be appointed, to consist of not less than five nor more than nine members, except the Committees on Forestry and Conservation and on Public Buildings and Humane Institutions which shall each consist of not less than eleven, and not more than fifteen members, the Committee on Roads and Navigation which shall consist of seventeen members and the Committees on Judiciary and on Finance, which shall each consist of eighteen members.
 - I. On Privileges and Elections.
 - II. On the Judiciary.
 - III. On Finance.
 - IV. On Education.
 - V. On Counties and Municipal Corporations.
 - VI. On Roads and Navigation.
 - VII. On Banks and Corporations.
 - VIII. On Public Buildings and Humane Institutions.
 - IX. On the Penitentiary.
 - X. On Railroads.
 - XI. On Militia.
 - XII. On Federal Relations.
 - XIII. On Insurance.
 - XIV. On Agriculture.
 - XV. On Mines and Mining.
 - XVI. On Medicine and Sanitation.
 - XVII. On Labor.
 - XVIII. On Claims and Grievances.
 - XIX. On Forfeited, Delinquent and Unappropriated Lands.
 - XX. On Public Printing.
 - XXI. On Rules. (The President of the Senate to be ex officio Chairman.)
 - XXII. On Joint Rules (to be composed of the President of the Senate, as ex officio Chairman, and two members of the Senate to be appointed by the President).
 - XXIII. On Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills on the part of the Senate (to consist of five members).
 - XXIV. On Public Library.
 - XXV. To Examine Clerk's Office (to consist of three members).
 - XXVI. On Temperance.
- XXVII. On Forestry and Conservation.
- XXVIII. On Redistricting.
 - XXIX. On Interstate Cooperation.
- 25. All standing committees shall be appointed by the President of the Senate, unless otherwise directed, and the chairman of each committee shall be designated by the President of the Senate.

Record of Meetings

The chairman of each standing committee of the Senate shall cause to be kept for the purpose, a record of every meeting of such committee, wherein shall be entered:

- (a) The time and place of each committee meeting, and every hearing had before the committee.
 - (b) The attendance of members of the committee at each meeting thereof.
- (c) The name of any person appearing before the committee, and the interest represented by him.

Any member of such standing committee may cause a notation to be made upon the record aforesaid of the reason for his absence at any former meeting of the committee; and in the absence of any such explanatory note, the presumption shall be that his absence was without reasonable cause.

Meetings to be Open

All meetings of the committees, other than executive sessions, shall be open to the public.

Preservation of Records

On the adjournment of each session of the Leglislature, the chairman of the respective committees shall deliver to the Clerk of the Senate the record book herein provided for, and it shall be the duty of such Clerk to preserve the same among the archives of his office.

Select Committees

26. Select committees shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members unless the Senate shall direct otherwise.

Committee on Privileges and Elections

- 27. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall report in all cases of privileges and contested elections, the principles and reasons on which their resolutions are founded.
- 28. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall examine the oaths taken by each member, and the evidence of their election, and report to the Senate.

Committee to Examine Clerk's Office

29. The Committee to Examine the Clerk's Office shall see that all papers belonging thereto are properly filed, labeled and put away in the presses, and the books belonging to the office are chronologically arranged, and shall make report thereof to the Senate at each session.

Committee of the Whole

- 30. When the Senate shall resolve itself into the Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the chair and appoint a chairman to preside in the Committee.
- 31. The Committee of the Whole shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the Senate. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as they are applicable, except the rule limiting the time of speaking, concerning the previous question, and taking the yeas and nays. The proceedings in the Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal of the Senate, except so far as reported to the Senate by the chairman of the committee.

Order of Business

- 32. The order of business of the Senate shall be:
 - I. To read the Journal.

- III. To receive reports from Standing Committees.
- IV. To receive reports from Select Committees.
- V. To receive bills, resolutions, motions and petitions.
- VI. To act upon unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from the previous day, and no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following that on which it was offered.
- VII. Senate and House Bills on third reading.
- VIII. Senate and House Bills on second reading.
 - IX. Senate and House Bills on first reading.
 - X. Miscellaneous business.

Bills To Be Read on Three Separate Days

33. All bills originating in the Senate shall be read on three separate days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays, on each bill, this rule be dispensed with.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

Title of Bills

- 34. In the title of all bills to amend chapters or sections of the Code, or acts passed since the Code was adopted, the several committees to whom they are referred, or by whom they originated, shall insert the subject matter of the chapter.
- 35. All engrossed bills shall be fully and distinctly read when put upon their passage.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

Consideration of Bills

36. All bills or business originating in the Senate, shall be considered in the order in which they are introduced and all bills and resolutions received from the House of Delegates shall be introduced in the order in which they are received, unless in either case the Senate otherwise directs.

Resolutions to Lie on Table

37. All resolutions, when introduced, shall lie on the table at least one day.

Appropriation Bills

38. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 42.)

Reference to Committees

- 39. All bills reported from the House of Delegates shall be referred to the appropriate committee on the first reading. All bills introduced on leave shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry, and if the committee report a bill different from the one introduced such bill shall be received and treated by the Senate as the original bill, and shall be read a first time and printed, unless in any of the aforesaid cases the Senate shall direct otherwise.
- 40. On each reading of a bill, the Clerk shall state whether it is the first, second or third reading of such bill.
- 41. On the demand of any two members when a bill is being read for amendment, it shall be read section by section, and when the amendments which may be moved shall be disposed of, the question, unless the Senate otherwise order, shall be taken on ordering the bill to be engrossed and read the third time. If a bill should be ordered to its engrossment and third reading and amendments thereto have been made, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform to the amendments. The bill shall then be re-printed,

and shall be the engrossed bill. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill. All Senate bills so ordered shall be jacketed, endorsed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a bill should be passed by the House and returned to the Senate without amendments, or if amended, and the amendments should be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a House bill on second reading if the same be amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full in typewriting on slips of paper, and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the House, and all amendments shall appear in the Senate Journal.

42. When a bill or resolution of the House of Delegates is passed or rejected by the Senate, the fact of its passage or rejection, with the bill or resolution, shall be communicated to the House of Delegates.

Messages

43. Messages may be introduced in any stage of business except when a question is being put by the presiding officer, while the yeas and nays are being called by the Clerk, or while the ballots are being counted.

Passages of Bills and Joint Resolutions

44. When a bill or joint resolution is put upon its passage, the President shall propounded the question, "Shall the bill (or joint resolution as the case may be) pass?" On the passage of every bill or joint resolution the vote shall be taken by yeas and nays, and be entered on the Journal. When the bill is on a second reading, and the question is upon striking out, the President shall propound the question: "Shall these words be stricken out?"

Motions

- 45. When the question is pending, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, for the previous question, to lie on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to adjourn the question to a different day, to commit or amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged.
 - 46. On the first reading of a bill, a motion to reject the bill shall be in order.

Adverse Report by Committee

47. If a committee shall have reported adversely to a bill, the President, immediately after the report of said committee is read shall put the question: "Shall the bill be rejected?", which question shall have precedence over all motions, except a motion to adjourn.

Reconsideration of Vote

- 48. The question being once determined must stand as the judgment of the Senate, and cannot during the session be drawn again into debate unless reconsidered, and it shall be in order to reconsider any vote only within two legislative days next after the one upon which such vote was taken. A motion to reconsider shall be in order only when made by a Senator who voted with the prevailing side, and when the vote was not taken by yeas and nays all Senators will be conclusively presumed to have voted with the prevailing side.
- 49. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question in reference to the standing committee shall be first put.

Division of the Question

50. If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided; but on motion to strike out and insert, it shall not be in order

to move for a division of the question, but the rejection of a motion to strike out and insert one proposition shall not prevent a motion to strike out and insert a different proposition; nor prevent a subsequent motion to simply strike out; nor shall the rejection of a motion simply to strike out prevent a subsequent motion to strike out and insert.

51. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

Previous Question

52. There shall be a motion for the previous question, which being ordered by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been asked and ordered. The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions, or may be made to embrace and authorize motions and amendments and include the bill to its engrossment and third reading and then, on renewal and second of said motion, to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order pending a motion for or after the previous question shall have been ordered on its passage, for the President to entertain and submit a motion to commit with or without instructions to a standing or select committee; and a motion to lay upon the table shall be in order on the second and third reading of a bill.

A call of the Senate shall not be in order after the previous question is ordered, unless it shall appear upon an actual count by the President that a quorum is not present.

All incidental questions or orders arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether an appeal or otherwise, without debate,

Yeas and Nays

- 53. When the yeas and nays are ordered, or a call of the Senate is directed, the names of the members shall be called in alphabetical order.
- 54. The yeas and nays on any question shall, at the desire of one-tenth of the members present, be entered on the Journal and any member may enter any protest on the Journal upon the determination of any question. After the yeas and nays shall have been taken, and before they are counted or entered on the Journal, the Clerk shall read over the names of those who voted in the affirmative and those who voted in the negative, at which time any member shall have the right to correct any mistake committed in enrolling his name.
- 55. When a bill or joint resolution passed by the Senate shall be amended by the House of Delegates, the question on agreeing to the bill or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on by yeas and nays in the Senate, and the result entered upon its Journal. In all such cases the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 31.)
- 56. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.
- 57. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote shall be viva voce, and be entered upon the Journal.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 44.)

Executive Session

- 58. When nominations shall be made in writing by the Governor to the Senate, a future day shall be assigned, unless the Senate unanimously direct otherwise, for taking them into consideration.
- 59. When acting on the nominations of the Governor, the Senate shall be cleared of all persons except the Clerk, his assistants, the Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper, and all such officers shall be sworn to secrecy.
- 60. All confidential communications made by the Governor to the Senate and all proceedings thereon, shall be by the members thereof kept secret until the Senate shall, by unanimous affirmative vote of the members present, remove the injunction of secrecy. When an executive session of the Senate has been

dissolved, the result of its action upon any executive nomination considered therein shall be forthwith certified to the Governor in a formal communication signed by the President and attested by the Clerk.

61. All information and remarks touching the character or qualification of any person nominated by the Governor to office, shall be kept secret. The legislative proceedings and the executive proceedings of the Senate shall be kept and recorded in separate books.

Constitutional Amendment

62. When an amendment to be proposed to the Constitution is under consideration, the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate shall not be requisite to decide any question for amendments, or extending to the merits, being short of the final question.

Adjournment

- 63. When the Senate adjourns each day, it shall stand adjourned to 2 o'clock P. M. the next day, unless the Senate otherwise direct.
- 64. When the Senate adjourns each day, every member shall keep his seat until the President leaves the chair.

Parliamentary Practice

65. In all cases not provided for by the Rules of the Senate or the Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Delegates, the Senate shall be governed by the practice in the House of Representatives of the United States.

Suspension of Rule

66. No standing rule or order of the Senate shall be rescinded without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor and no rule shall be suspended except by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the Senate present.

Withdrawal of Bills from Committee

67. Any bill, resolution or business may, by a vote of the majority of the members present, be withdrawn from the committee to which it had been referred or be taken from the table, and placed upon the regular or special calendar of the Senate in such order of business as the Senate may direct.

RULES OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

(Regular Session, 1943)

ELECTION AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Officers and Their Compensation

1. The House, at the commencement of each Legislature, shall elect a Speaker, Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Doorkeeper. All officers, except the Speaker, shall receive such compensation as the House may determine.

Vote to be Viva Voce

2. In th election of officers by the House, the vote shall be given viva voce, and a majority of the whole number of votes given, a quorum being present, shall be necessary to elect. If, upon any vote, there be no election, the person having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped, and any votes thereafter given to such person shall not be taken into the counting to affect the result in any way. But if two or more have the lowest and equal number of votes, they may be voted for again. No question before the House, or in committee of the whole, shall be voted on by ballot.

DUTIES AND RIGHTS OF THE SPEAKER

Call to Order

3. The Speaker shall take the chair on each legislative day precisely at the hour to which the House shall have adourned; shall immediately call the members to order and, after prayer, if a quorum is present, proceed to the order of business.

Preservation of Order

4. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum while the House is in session; enforce the rules and orders of the House; prescribe the order in which business shall come up for consideration, subject to the rules and orders of the House; announce the question of business before the House when properly requested by any member; receive all messages and communications; put to vote all questions which are properly moved; announce the result of all votes and authenticate, when necessary, the acts and proceedings of the House.

Decorum in Debate

5. In debate, the Speaker shall prevent personal reflections and confine members to the question under discussion, but he shall not engage in any debate, or propose his opinion on any question without first calling some other member to the chair. When two or more members arise at the same time, he shall name the one entitled to the floor.

Questions of Order

6. The Speaker shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the House when demanded by any ten members. He may speak to questions of order in preference to other members, and may make the concluding speech on any appeal from his decision, notwithstanding, he may have before spoken on the question; but no other member shall speak more than once on such appeal without leave of the House.

When properly requested by a member, the Speaker shall inform the House upon any point of order or practice pertinent to the business before it.

Preserving Order in Galleries

7. The Speaker shall have general control of the House Chamber, lobbies, and rooms and of the corridors and passages in that part of the Capitol assigned to the use of the House. In case of any disorderly conduct or disturbance in the

galleries, corridors or passages, he shall have the power to order the same to be cleared, and may cause any person guilty of such disturbance or disorderly conduct to be brought before the bar of the House. In all such cases the members present may take such measures to prevent a repetition of such misconduct, either by the infliction of censure or such other penalty, as may be authorized by law, on the parties thus offending, as the House may deem best.

Presiding Officer in Absence of Speaker

8. The Speaker may designate by an appointment in writing entered upon the Journal of the House, any member to perform the duties of the chair for a period not exceeding three consecutive legislative days, but for no longer period, except by special consent of the House, and the member so designated shall be during the time for which he is designated, vested with all the powers and duties conferred by these rules, or by law, upon the Speaker. The Speaker shall have the right to call any member to the chair to perform the duties of Speaker but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.

If the Speaker be absent at the time appointed for the meeting of the House, it shall be called to order by the Clerk, and a Speaker pro tempore selected by the House. The Speaker pro tempore shall preside over the House until such time as the Speaker shall be present.

Appointment of Attaches

9. The Speaker shall as soon as practicable after being authorized, appoint for the House such committee clerks, stenographers, pages and other attaches and employees as the House may by resolution direct, and may, at his discretion, remove any person so appointed and appoint another in his stead. He may also appoint, without resolution, a private secretary and a stenographer to himself. He shall appoint an official Chaplain whose duty it shall be to be present at the convening of each day's session for the purpose of opening the session with prayer.

Appointment of Committees

10. The Speaker shall appoint all committees, except where the House shall otherwise order. In appointing standing committees he shall designate the chairman and vice chairman of same. In the absence of the chairman of a committee the vice chairman shall preside. When the House authorizes the appointment of a committee the Speaker may wait until the next legislative day to make the appointment.

Chairman of Committee on Rules

11. The Speaker shall be ex officio member and chairman of the Committee on Rules.

Acts and Writs Signed by the Speaker

12. All acts shall be signed by the Speaker; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the House or any committee having authority to issue same, shall be under his hand and attested by the Clerk.

Putting Questions

13. The Speaker shall rise to put a question but may state it sitting.

Vote of the Speaker

14. In all cases of a call of the yeas and nays, the Speaker shall vote, unless excused; in other cases he shall not be required to vote unless the House is equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal and in case of such equal division the question shall be lost. When the yeas and nays are taken the Speaker's name shall be called last.

Examination of Journal

15. It shall be the duty of the Speaker to examine the Journal of the House, daily, before it is read and cause all errors and omissions therein to be corrected.

CLERK

Clerk to Have Charge of Clerical Business of House

16. The Clerk shall have charge and supervision of all the clerical business of the House. He shall perform the duties imposed on him by law and the rules of the House. He shall have charge of the Clerk's desk and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him.

Duties of Clerk

17. It shall be the Clerk's duty to read to the House all papers ordered to be read; to call the roll and note and report the absentees, when a call of the House is ordered; to call the roll and note the answers of members, when a question is taken by yeas and nays; to assist, under the direction of the Speaker, in taking the count when any vote of the House is taken; to notify committees of their appointment and the business referred to them; to superintend the execution of all printing ordered by the House, and to report to the Speaker, to be submitted to the House, every failure of the printer to execute the same properly and promptly. He shall attest all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House and shall certify to the passage of all bills, and to the adoption of all joint and concurrent resolutions by the Legislature. In addition to his other duties the Clerk shall keep the accounts for pay and mileage of members, officers and attaches, and for printing and other contingent expenses of the House, and prepare and sign warrants or requisitions for the same.

The Clerk shall superintend the recording of the Journal of the proceedings, the engrossing and enrolling of bills, and shall cause to be kept and prepared for the printer the Daily Journal of the proceedings of the House.

Clerk to Have Custody of All Records

18. The Clerk shall have the custody of all records and papers of the House, and shall not allow them to be taken from the table or out of his possession without the leave of the House, unless to be delivered to the chiarman of a committee to which they may have been referred and then he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall endorse on bills and papers brief notes of proceedings had thereon by the House and preserve the same in convenient files for reference.

Clerk to Appoint Assistants

19. The Clerk shall appoint such assistants as are authorized by law or by resolution of the House and shall have power to suspend or remove any of his appointees and appoint others in their stead. He may also appoint without resolution a secretary to himself and a stenographer who shall be the official stenographer for the House. The per diem of the assistants and employees of the Clerk shall be fixed by the Committee on Rules.

Clerk to Have Charge of All Printing

20. The Clerk shall have supervision and charge of all printing done for the House, and the public printer shall print only such documents and other matter as the Clerk authorizes.

Payment for Printing

21. The public printer shall have all bills for printing approved by the supervisor of public printing and then present the same to the Clerk who shall draw his warrant or requisition for same upon the Auditor payable from the Legis-

lative Printing Fund. The supervisor of public printing shall see that all bills are in accordance with the state contract for legislative printing before he approves their payment. A copy of all bills for printing shall be furnished the Clerk by the public printer.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

Duties

22. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the House and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings and to maintain order under the direction of the Speaker. He shall execute the commands of the House from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the Speaker.

Under the direction of the Speaker, he shall superintend the distribution of all documents and papers to be distributed to the members. He shall see that no person, except those authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereat.

He shall have charge under the Speaker for the purpose of maintaining order, of the Hall of the House, its lobby, galleries and other rooms in the Capitol assigned for its use, and shall exclude from the floor all persons not entitled to the privilege of the same. He shall attend to seating visitors, and shall see that the janitors and cloak-room attendants perform their duties, and see that the house chamber is properly ventilated, heated, and lighted.

DOORKEEPER

Duties

23. It shall be the duty of the Doorkeeper to attend the House during its sessions, and to announce all messages. He shall have charge of the main door of the Chamber during the sittings of the House, and shall see that the other doors are properly attended; have general charge and oversight of the assistant doorkeepers; detail such assistant doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the Sergeant-at-Arms may deem proper; assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in seeing that the rules relating to admission to the floor are strictly enforced, and shall perform such other duties as the Speaker or the House may order.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS

Absence from the House

24. No member shall absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave, or be sick and unable to attend, but any member who conscientiously believes that the seventh day of the week ought to be observed as the Sabbath shall be excused from attending upon the House on that day.

Every Member to Vote

25. Every member present when a question is put, or when his name is called, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the House excuses him. A motion to excuse a member from voting must be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason therefor.

Members Shall Be in Places When Voting

26. While the yeas and nays are being taken every member shall be in his seat, and during the session of the House no person other than a member shall occupy the chair of a member.

Quorum

27. A majority of all the members elected to the House shall be necessary to proceed to business; seven members may adjourn, and ten members may order a call of the House, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the House, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been called twice.

When Less Than Quorum Present

28. In case a number less than a quorum of the House shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for nonattendance shall be made as the House, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund of the House. This rule shall apply to the first meeting of the House, at the legal time of meeting, as well as to each day of the session after the hour has arrived to which the House stood adjourned.

Taking Members Into Custody

29. No member of the House shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the Committee on Elections and Privileges, and reported to the House of Delegates, unless by order of the Speaker of the House of Delegates.

Punishment of Members

30. The House of Delegates may punish its own members for diserderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 25.)

Providing for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

31. The House of Delegates may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or f.r any assault, threat or abuse of any member for words spoken in debate; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 25.)

ORDER AND DECORUM IN DEBATE

Recognition and Decorum

32. When a member is about to speak in debate or deliver any matter to the House, he shall rise in his place and respectfully address the presiding officer as "Mr. Speaker," and, upon being recognized, shall proceed, confining himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities and indecorous or disrespectful language.

When a member arises and addresses the Chair, the Speaker may recognize him by name; but no member in debate shall designate another by name.

Recognition by the Chair

33. When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Speaker shall name the one who is to speak first, and his decision shall be final and not open to debate or appeal. However, in all other cases the member who shall rise first and address the Chair shall be first recognized.

Mover of Question to Have Preference in Debate

34. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Speaker, and then the mover of the question shall have the right to open and close the debate thereon.

Member Out of Order

35. When any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, but may be permitted with leave of the House, to explain; and the House shall, if appealed to, decide the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to; if the decision be in favor of the member so called to order, he is at liberty to proceed; if the decision be against him, and the case requires it, he shall be liable to the censure of the House, or such other punishment as the House may properly impose.

Calling to Order for Words Spoken in Debate

36. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to and they shall be taken down at the Clerk's table. And no member shall be held to answer, or be subjected to the censure of the House, for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words were spoken and before the exception to them was taken.

Decorum During Debate

37. While the Speaker is putting a question, ascertaining the result, or addressing the House, no one shall walk out of or across the House; and when a member is speaking, no one shall engage in conversation or pass between him and the Speaker.

Limitation on Debate

38. No member shall speak except in his place, and not more than twice on a question, except by leave of the House. And if a question be pending at the time of an adjournment and is renewed on the succeeding day, no member who shall have spoken twice on the preceding day shall be permitted again to speak without leave of the House. The House by majority vote may limit debate on any question.

Members Not to Be Disturbed While Speaking

39. No one shall disturb or interrupt a member who is speaking, without his permission, except to call to order if he be transgressing the rules.

Speaking Before Negative is Put

40. When the Speaker is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.

PUTTING QUESTIONS AND VOTING

Putting Question; Division

41. All questions shall be put distinctly in this form, to-wit: "As many as are in favor [as the question may be] say 'Aye'," and after the affirmative vote is expressed, "As many as are opposed say 'No'." If the Speaker be in doubt as to the result, or if a division is called for by any member, the House shall divide. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats and be counted, and afterwards those in the negative. The count may be made by the Speaker, or, if he so directs, by the Clerk, or two members, one from each side, to be named for that purpose by the Speaker. When the result is ascertained the Speaker shall rise and state the decision of the House. Such vote shall not be printed in the Journal unless the yeas and nays are called for by not less than nine members of the House prior to the announcement of the decision by the Speaker.

Yeas and Nays

42. On the passage of every bill and joint resolution, and when the yeas and nays on any question are called for by one-tenth of those present, the Speaker shall direct the roll to be called, and every member present shall answer "Aye" or "No" when his name is called, unless excused. Before the result is announced the Clerk shall read to the House the names of those who voted in the affirmative, and then those who voted in the negative, at which time any member may correct a mistake committed in taking down his vote. The result shall then be announced, and the yeas and nays entered on the Journal, but if the House so orders, the announcement of the result and the entry of the yeas and nays upon the Journal may be postponed to the succeeding day, with liberty to absent members at any time before the result is announced by the Speaker, to appear and vote "Aye" or "No", in the presence of the House; and any member may, in the presence of the House, change his vote before the result is announced. The Journal shall also show those absent and not voting.

Upon calls of the House, in taking the yeas and nays, the names of the members shall be called alphabetically, except the Speaker shall be called last.

Pairs

43. Members may pair on any question by filing a signed statement of the same with the Clerk, who shall read the same to the House before the vote is taken. A blank form of pair for use of members shall be provided by the Clerk. No pair shall be recognized unless made in person by the member signing the same, nor unless one or both of the parties thereto are absent.

Division of Question

44. Any member may call for a division of any question before the vote thereon is taken, if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition will remain for the decision of the House, but the member calling for the division of a question shall state in what manner he proposes it shall be divided. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendment nor motion to strike out and insert.

Calling of Yeas and Nays

45. No member or any person shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called.

Tie Vote Loses Question

46. In all cases when the House is equally divided, the question shall be lost.

Verification of Vote

47. When a question upon which the yeas and nays have been taken has prevailed or failed by not more than five votes, the Speaker may, upon request of five members, order a verification of the vote. During such verification, no member shall change his vote unless it was erroneously recorded, nor may any member not having voted cast a vote. A verification must be called for immediately after a vote is announced and before any other business has intervened.

Explanation of Vote

48. No member shall be allowed to make any explanation of his vote during the taking of the yeas and nays; but after the roll has been called and the vote announced, any member may explain his vote and the explanation shall be recorded in the Journal if he requests it. The Speaker may limit the time allowed members for explaining votes.

When Members Not to Vote

49. Any member who has a personal or private interest in any measure or bill proposed or pending before the House shall disclose the fact and not vote thereon.

Voting by Machine

49-a. A voting machine may be used in taking the yeas and nays on any question, for quorum calls and for determining the result when a division is demanded. When a vote is to be taken on the voting machine the Speaker shall announce the question to be voted upon and direct the Clerk to prepare the machine. The Clerk shall then sound the gong which shall be notice to all members to vote. After reasonable time has been given all members to vote the Speaker shall ask the question "Have all members voted?" vote himself, if the vote being taken is upon a question on which he is required to vote, and then direct the Clerk to close the machine and ascertain the result. As soon as this is done, the Clerk shall hand the record of the vote to the Speaker and he shall promptly announce the result. No vote may be changed after it has been recorded.

No member shall vote for another member, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member. In addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by law, any member who shall vote or attempt to vote for another member may be expelled as a member of the House or punished in such other manner as the House may determine. If a person not a member shall vote or attempt to vote for any member, he shall be barred from the floor of the House for the remainder of the session and may be further punished in such manner as the House may deem proper, in addition to such punishment as may be prescribed by law.

All other rules governing voting and the taking of the yeas and nays, insofar as applicable, shall apply to taking votes by means of the voting machine.

MOTIONS

Stating the Question

50. When a motion is made, it shall be stated by the Speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be passed to the desk and read aloud by the Clerk before debate.

Form of Motion

51. Every motion, except subsidiary or incidental motions, shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker or any member desires it; but this exception shall not apply to motions to amend.

Withdrawal of Motions

52. After a motion is stated by the Speaker or read by the Clerk, it is deemed to be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before a decision or amendment, unless the previous question has been ordered, in which case it can only be withdrawn by leave of the House.

Order and Precedence of Motions

- 53. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except:
 - 1. To adjourn.
 - 2. To lay on the table.
 - ${\it 3.}\,$ For the previous question.
 - 4. To postpone to a day certain.
 - 5. To go into a Committee of the Whole on the pending question immediately.
 - 6. To commit to a Committee of the Whole.
 - 7. To commit to a Standing Committee.
 - 8. To commit to a Select Committee.
 - 9. To amend.
 - 10. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill shall have precedence of another motion to amend; and if carried, the bill is rejected.

Motion to Adjourn

54. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when the House is voting, or while a member is addressing the House, or when no business has been transacted since the motion to adjourn has been defeated.

Motions Not Debatable

- 55. The following motions shall be decided without debate, and shall not be amended:
 - 1. To adjourn.
 - 2. To fix the time to which the House shall adjourn,
 - 3. To lay on the table.
 - 4. For the previous question.
 - To suspend the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days.
 - 6. To recess.

Motions Not in Order

56. No motion directing the appropriation or payment of money shall be in order.

Effect of Indefinite Postponement

57. When a question is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be again acted on during the session.

Motion to Reconsider

58. A motion to reconsider any question may be made by any member who voted with the majority, or in case of a tie vote, by any member. This motion shall be made on the same or next succeeding legislative day of the House. Such a motion, if seconded, shall take precedence of all other questions, except the consideration of a conference report or a motion to adjourn, and unless by motion postponed until some future time shall be acted upon at once. A motion to reconsider shall not be withdrawn without leave of the House, and if the House decides to reconsider, any member may thereafter call the subject up for consideration. A motion to reconsider a question, having been put and lost, shall not be renewed.

Debate on Motions to Reconsider

59. Debate shall be allowed on a motion to reconsider only when the question which it is proposed to reconsider is debatable. Where debate upon a motion to reconsider is in order, no member shall speak more than once nor for a longer period than three minutes.

Reconsideration of Question Requiring More Than Majority Vote

60. When a majority of members present vote in the affirmative •n any question, but the question be lost because it is one in which the concurrence of a greater number than a majority of a quorum is necessary to an affirmative decision, any member may move for a reconsideration.

Effect of Motion to Table

61. A motion to lay on the table shall only have the effect of disposing of the matter temporarily, and may be taken from the table at any time after the eighth order of business has been passed.

Motion Must Be Germane

62. No motion on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

Previous Question

63. When any question is before the House, any member being in order and having the floor may move the previous question, but such motion to be put must be sustained by being seconded by ten members. The question being moved, the Speaker shall say, "Is the motion sustained?" and those favoring the motion shall rise. If a sufficient number arise, the previous question shall be thereby seconded, and the question shall then be put in this form, "Shall the main question be now put?" If this question be decided in the affirmative by a majority of the members voting, a quorum being present, it shall have the effect of cutting off all debate and bringing the House to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions upon which it has been asked and ordered, except when the motion applies to the main question, the member in charge of the measure under consideration, shall have five minutes to close the discussion before the vote is taken; and when the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have three minutes to close the discussion on the amendment. Should the previous question be decided in the negative, the House shall proceed with the matter before it as though the previous question had not been moved.

When a member moves the previous question he shall specifically state in his motion whether it shall apply to the main question and the amendments or to the amendment or amendments only.

The previous question shall not be admitted in the Committee of the Whole.

MEETING OF THE HOUSE

Time of Meeting

64. The House shall meet every day, except Sunday, unless it shall be otherwise directed by special order, precisely at the hour to which it shall have adjourned at its last sitting; but if no hour were fixed at such sitting, then at two o'clock P. M.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

Daily

- 65. The daily order of business shall be as follows:
 - I. To read, correct, and approve the Journal.
 - II. To act upon leave of absence for members.
 - III. To receive and consider reports of standing committees.
 - IV. To receive and consider reports of select committees.
 - V. To receive and consider messages from the Executive, state officials, and other communications and remonstrances.
 - VI. To receive messages from the Senate, and consider amendments proposed by the Senate to bills passed by the House.
 - VII. To receive (a) resolutions, (b) petitions, (c) motions.
 - VIII. Bills introduced on motion for leave and referred to appropriate committees.
 - IX. To act on unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from previous day, but not resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following on which it was offered.
 - X. House and Senate Bills on third reading.
 - XI. House and Senate Bills on second reading.
 - XII. House and Senate Bills on first reading.
 - XIII. Miscellaneous business.

Priority of Business

66. All questions relating to priority of business shall be décided without debate.

Special Orders

67. Any subject made a special order of business shall be laid before the House by the Speaker, or may be called up by any member, when the time fixed for its consideration arrives. If not called up or acted upon at the time fixed, it shall lose its standing as a special order.

Reports and Messages Receivable at Any Time

68. Messages from the Governor and Senate, communications and reports from state officers, reports from the Committee on Elections and Privileges, which involve the right of a member to his seat, reports from the Committee on Enrolled Bills, reports from the Committee on Rules, and reports of Conference Committees may be received at any time when the House is not actually engaged in taking a vote on some question, in which case it shall be received as soon as the result of the vote is announced. When received it shall be disposed of as the House may direct.

Consideration of Local Bills

69. Local bills shall be placed upon a special calendar to be known as the Local Bill Calendar, and on Friday of each week, after the ninth order of business is passed, shall be taken up and disposed of before any other business is acted upon: *Provided*, That this rule shall not prohibit the consideration of local bills at such times as the House may determine after the last Friday within the constitutional duration of the regular sessions of the Legislature.

Special Calendar

70. The House may by resolution authorize the Committee on Rules to arrange a special daily calendar and the consideration of bills on this calendar shall take precedence over the Regular House calendar.

COMMITTEES

Kinds of Committees

71. Committees may be of four kinds, namely: Committee of the Whole House, Standing Committees, Select or Special Committees, and Conference Committees.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

72. The House may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole at any time on the motion of any member, and in forming a Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the chair and a chairman shall be appointed by him to preside over said committee. It shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the House. The proceedings in Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal except so far as reported to the House by the Chairman of the Committee.

Rules of Proceeding in the Committee of the Whole

73. The rules of proceeding in the House shall be observed, as far as practicable, in Committee of the Whole, except that any member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, but he shall not speak a second time until every member desiring to speak shall have spoken; nor shall a motion for the previous question nor a motion to lay on the table or to adjourn be made therein. The yeas and nays need not be taken in Committee of the Whole.

Consideration of Bills in Committee of the Whole

74. Upon demand by any member, bills committed to a Committee of the Whole House shall, in Committee of the Whole, be read by sections. All amendments made shall be noted by the Clerk and reported to the House by the Chairman. After being reported to the House, the bill shall again be subjected to amendment before a vote on the report is taken.

Motion to Rise Decided Without Debate

75. A motion that the Committee of the Whole rise shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

STANDING COMMITTEES

76. The following standing committees, to consist of not less than seven nor more than twenty-five members, shall be appointed at the commencement of each session and to them respectively shall be referred all bills or resolutions pertaining to the subject indicated by the names of said respective committees, to-wit:

Agriculture.

Arts, Science, and General Improvements.

Banks and Corporations.

Claims and Grievances.

Counties, Districts, and Municipal Corporations.

Education.

Elections and Privileges.

Executive Offices and Library.

Federal Relations.

Forestry and Conservation.

Forfeited, Delinquent and Unappropriated Lands.

Game and Fish.

Humane Institutions and Public Buildings,

Insurance.

Judiciary.

Labor.

Medicine and Sanitation.

Military Affairs.

Mines and Mining.

Penitentiary.

Printing and Contingent Expenses.

Railroads.

Redistricting.

Roads.

Rules.

State Boundaries.

Taxation and Finance.

Temperance.

Committee on Elections and Privileges

77. The Committee on Elections and Privileges shall examine and report upon all the certificates, and other evidences referred to them, touching the right of persons claiming to have been elected members of the House, or to any office for the state at large; and also upon other petitions and matters touching elections and returns, or relating to the privileges of members and officers of the House, or witnesses attending the House or any committee thereof, as shall be referred to them.

Committee on Rules

78. At the beginning of each session the Speaker shall appoint a Committee on Rules, to consist of seven members. The Speaker shall be ex officio Chairman of said Committee. The Committee on Rules shall report to the House, from time to time, rules for the government thereof, and amendments to such rules. The Committee shall be privileged to report at any time and said report shall be adopted by a majority vote.

All resolutions authorizing the appointment of attaches or relating to the appointment of persons, or prescribing the salary or pay of such attaches or persons, shall originate in and come from the Committee on Rules.

Committee on Taxation and Finance

79. The Committee on Taxation and Finance shall, as soon as possible after the commencement of the regular session, report the general tax and appropriation bill with an estimate of the probable revenue and expenditures of the two years, and of the public debt. They shall from time to time report such measures for equalizing and reducing taxation, supplying revenue and facilitating the collection thereof, reducing the public expenditure, and providing for the principal and interest of the public debt as may seem to them expedient; and they shall further examine into and report upon all matters and propositions relating to taxation and finance as shall be referred to them by the House.

Committee on Claims and Grienvances

80. All claims against the state, which may be presented to the House, shall be referred to the Committee on Claims and Grievances, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Committee on Executive Offices and Library

81. The Committee on Executive Offices and Library shall examine the several public offices and library, and report whether their books and accounts are properly kept; whether the public money has been disbursed according to law; and diligence used in the collection of revenue; and whether the money received is properly accounted for. They shall report from time to time such measures as may seem necessary to add to the economy of the executive offices and the accountability of their officers.

Reports of Committees

82. The several standing committees shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise. All committees shall submit their reports to the House in writing, and the same shall be printed in the Journal. Reports of committees shall be advisory only. Committee chairmen shall see that the originals of all bills, resolutions, and such other documents as are referred to them, are returned to the House, with the report upon the matter to which they pertain.

Discharging Committee from Consideration of Bill

83. When a bill or resolution has been in the hands of a committee five legislative days after having been referred to it, the committee may be discharged from further consideration of the bill or resolution by a majority vote of all the members present. The chairman of a committee may move that his committee be discharged from consideration of the matter at any time after commitment and after the fiftieth day of the session any member may move to discharge a committee from consideration of any bill or resolution at any time after the same has been referred to it.

Committee Meetings

84. Meetings of all committees shall be upon a call of the chairman, but no committee shall sit during a session of the House without leave of the House. It shall be the duty of the Chairmen of Committees to announce, or have announced, from the floor of the House, or by the Speaker or Clerk, during the session of the House, committee meetings, and at such time, if practicable, the number of all bills to be considered at such meetings. In case of failure of the chairman of any committee to call a meeting of such committee upon the request of a member, then fifty per cent or more of the members of such committee shall have a right to call a meeting of such committee.

Committee Hearings

85. The introducer of a bill, and all other persons who shall so request of the chairman or clerk of the committee, shall be given an opportunity to be heard upon a measure referred to a committee, but no one not a member of the committee shall be present when the final vote is taken on any matter under consideration. Every committee hearing shall be open to the public.

Committee Clerks

86. The Speaker shall assign to the various committees such clerks and other clerical and stenographic help as may be necessary to properly carry on the work of the committees. Committee clerks shall keep such records and perform such duties as the chairmen of the respective committees may direct.

Committee Records

- 87. The chairman of each committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record in which there shall be entered:
- $\left(a\right)$ The time and place of each hearing, and of each meeting of such committee.
 - (b) The attendance of committee members at each meeting.
- (c) The names and addresses of all persons appearing before the committee, with the name of person, persons, firm or corporation, and addresses, in whose behalf such appearance is made.
- (d) The vote of each member on all motions, bills, resolutions and amendments acted upon, when a yea and nay vote is taken.

Such a record shall be read and approved at the next regular meeting of the committee. The committee records shall be open to inspection of the public at proper times and places and at the close of the session shall be filed with the Clerk of the House.

Committee Quorum; Sub-Committees

88. A majority of any committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A sub-committee, which shall report to the regular committee, may be appointed to consider and report to the committee on any matter referred to it.

Minority Views

89. The minority of any committee may present its recommendations in writing with the report of the committee, and the same shall be printed in the Journal, and said recommendation may, by a vote of the House, be substituted for and become the report of the committee.

House Rules to Govern Committee

90. The rules governing the proceedings of the House shall apply to the proceedings of the committee, insofar as the same are applicable.

Select or Special Committees

91. Select or special committees may be provided for on motion or resolution, designating the number and object, and, unless otherwise ordered, shall be appointed by the Speaker.

Conference Committees and Reports

92. All reports of conference committees shall be presented after having been signed by a majority of the conferees of each House and be printed in the Journal. No matter shall be considered by said committee, or reported upon by it, except that in disagreement between the two houses.

BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND PETITIONS

BILLS

Method of Introducing

93. All bills to be introduced in the House shall be filed with the Clerk not later than 4:00 o'clock P. M. on the preceding legislative day. Before the next meeting of the House the Clerk shall number such bills as are presented and edit and correct them as to form. When the time for introducing bills is reached in the regular order of business the Clerk shall report each of said bills by title in the same manner as if the bills were introduced from the floor. This rule shall not deny a member the right to introduce a bill from the floor in case of urgency.

Bills to Be Presented in Triplicate

94. All bills shall be presented in triplicate and signed by the member introducing the same, the original copy for the use of the committee and for the permanent files of the House, the second for printing and copying, and the third for the use and accommodation of the members of the press, which shall be kept by the Clerk in some convenient place for this purpose.

Joint Sponsors of Bill

94-a. A bill may be introduced bearing the names of not more than two members as joint sponsors of the bill.

Reference to Committees

95. Bills introduced by any member, on motion for leave, or by any standing committee, shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and all such bills shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry. If the committee report a bill different from one so introduced, either by amendment or substitution, such bill shall be received and treated by the House as the original bill, and the Committee report and Journal of the House shall show that the bill was either amended or substituted in committee.

What Bills to Contain

96. Bills proposing laws or changes in laws shall consist of a title, beginning with the words, "A Bill to," and contain a brief statement of the object of the proposed measure, and if it amends or changes a law, a reference to the law proposed to be changed. The bill proper shall begin with the enacting clause, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia," and state at large the measure proposed.

Bill Not to Embrace More Than One Object

97. No bill shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be stated in the title, and no law shall be revived or amended by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large in the new act.—(See Const., art. 6, sec. 30.)

Reporting Bills From Committee

98. When a bill is reported from committee with the recommendation that it do pass, it shall be placed on the calendar for the succeeding day and come up on first reading unless the House by action otherwise directs. If on the calendar when referred, it shall be replaced on the reading from which it was taken.

If a bill be reported favorably with amendments, the report and Journal shall so show, and when the bill reaches second reading the committee amendments shall be acted upon before other amendments are offered, except amendments to the committee amendments.

If a committee to which a bill has been referred reports that the same ought not to pass, the Speaker shall immediately propound the question, "Shall the bill be rejected?" If this question is decided in the negative, the bill shall be disposed of in the same manner as if reported favorably.

Printing of Bills

99. The Clerk shall have all bills printed that are ordered to second reading, and such other bills as the House may order printed.

Recommitment of Bills

100. A bill may be recommitted at any time before it passes. Should such recommitment take place after its engrossment, and an amendment be reported, the bill shall be placed on second reading when reported back.

Reading Bills

101. Before any bill is read by the Clerk, he shall state to the House whether it is on first, second or third reading.

Bills to Have Three Readings

102. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read on three different days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with. Upon any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutional rule, in order that the bill may be read twice or three times on the same day, and upon the first or second reading of any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutional rule in order that the bill may, upon such reading, be read by its title: *Provided*, That in all cases there shall be three readings on each bill, and that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read.—(See Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

Bills—First Reading

103. The first reading of a bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question shall be, "Shall the bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be lost, it shall be regarded as ordered to its second reading, unless the House otherwise specially directs. On the first reading of a bill, it may at any stage of the reading be rejected on motion.

Bills-Second Reading

104. No bill shall be put upon its second reading until the same shall have been printed and delivered to the members of the House at least one day previous to such reading, unless in case of emergency.

Amending and Engressing Bills

105. On the second reading of a bill on the demand of any two members, it shall be read section by section for amendment, and when the amendments as may be moved are disposed of, the question, unless the House otherwise orders, shall be, if a House bill, "Shall the bill be engrossed and ordered to the third reading?" If a House bill shall be ordered to its engrossment and third reading, and amendments have been made thereto, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform with the amendments. The bill shall then be reprinted and shall be the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. All House bills ordered to their engrossment and third reading shall be jacketed and engrossed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a House bill is passed by the Senate and returned to the House without amend-

ment, or it amended and the amendment or amendments be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a Senate bill on second reading, if the same be amended by the House and passed on as amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full on slips of paper in typewriting and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the Senate, and all the amendments shall also appear in the House Journal.

Time Bills to Go into Effect

106. In the passage of a bill by the House, a motion may be made that it take effect from its passage, or at some time other than ninety days after its passage; and if said motion be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to the House, taken by yeas and nays, the Clerk shall communicate that fact to the Senate along with the bill.—(See Const., art. 6, sec. 30.)

Senate Bills

107. Senate bills passed by the Senate and reported to the House shall be referred to the appropriate committee unless the House otherwise directs. After this they shall be treated in the same manner as House bills.

RESOLUTIONS

- 108. Resolutions shall be of three classes, as fellows:
- (1) Joint Resolutions: All proposed amendments to the Constitution shall take the form of a joint resolution, which shall be subject to the rules which govern the proceedings on bills, except that it shall be read on three several days, and, to be adopted, must on its third reading be agreed to by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House.—(Const., art. 14, sec. 2.) When a proposed amendment to the Constitution is under consideration, the vote of a majority of the members present shall be sufficient to decide an amendment thereto or any collateral or incidental questions thereto short of the final question.

[Note: Joint resolutions are used only for amendments to the State Constitution and to ratify amendments to the Federal Constitution. Such resolutions do not have to be submitted to the Governor for his approvai.]

- (2) Concurrent Resolutions: Concurrent resolutions shall be used for the purpose of expressing the sentiments of the Legislature, for authorizing expenditures incidental to the sessions and business of the Legislature, for agreeing upon adjournments beyond the constitutional limitation, for creating special joint committees, for raising a joint assembly and other inferior and incidental purposes of legislation, and such other purposes as the Legislature may drem proper. The adoption of such resolutions must be concurred in by both houses.
- (3) House Resolutions: These simple resolutions shall be used for expressing the will or order of the House on matters in which the concurrence of the Senate is not necessary. A House resolution shall be proper to express the sentiments of the body, to authorize expenditures from its contingent fund, for agreeing upon any question, and for all incidental purposes pertaining to the organization and work of the House.

Introduction of Resolutions

109. All resolutions to be introduced in the House shall be filed with the Clerk not later than two hours prior to the convening of the session at which they are to be introduced. They shall be presented in triplicate and copies shall be for the same purpose as that of bills. When the proper order of business is reached, the Clerk shall proceed in the same manner as if they were introduced from the floor. This rule does not deny a member the right to introduce a resolution from the floor in case of urgency. The different classes of resolutions shall be numbered by the Clerk and entered in full in the Journal.

Action on Resolutions

110. All joint resolutions shall be referred to the appropriatiate committee, and when any other resolution is presented, containing no reference of the subject thereof to a committee, it shall lie over for one day, to come up under the ninth order of business unless a majority of the House orders otherwise.

PETITIONS

111. All petitions, remonstrances, memorials and other papers addressed to the House shall be filed by the member with the Clerk prior to the convening of the House. When in the regular order of business the time is reached for presenting petitions or any such papers, the Clerk shall read a list of those on file, giving the member's name presenting same and a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the same shall be referred to the committee of the member's selection unless otherwise ordered by the House. Each member, upon filing any such petition, remonstrance or other paper, shall endorse thereon his name, and if not so endorsed it shall not be received. The Journal shall show the name of the member presenting such papers, a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the disposition made of same.

AMENDMENTS

Forms For

112. The Clerk shall furnish to members sheets with a proper heading printed in blank upon which amendments shall be written, and all amendments offered shall be on such blanks and bear the name of the member offering the same.

Must Be Germane

113. No amendment shall be in order that is not germane to the matter under consideration; and the Speaker, when the question is raised, shall rule as to the admissibility of the proposed amendment.

Time for Offering

114. Amendments may be offered to any bill or joint resolution and acted upon on their second reading and before they are ordered to their engrossment and third reading. No bill shall be amended on third reading, except by unanimous consent of the members present. Amendments to resolutions other than joint resolutions shall be in order at any time the same are being considered. Committee amendments shall be subject to amendment and shall be disposed of before any other amendments are in order.

Reading and Stating

115. Amendments shall be read by the Clerk and stated by the Speaker before being acted upon.

By Striking Out Enacting Clause

116. A motion to amend by striking out the enacting clause of a bill shall have precedence over another motion to amend, and, if carried, the bill or resolution is rejected.

Amendment to an Amendment

117. A motion to amend a pending amendment may be received, but until it is disposed of no other motion to amend will be in order. But pending such amendment, a motion to amend in the nature of a substitute, and a motion to amend that substitute, may be received, but shall not be voted upon until the original matter is perfected.

Amendment to Have Precedence Over Substitute

118. If a substitute for a bill or resolution be offered, a motion to amend the original bill or resolution shall have precedence:

Motion to Amend to Have Precedence Over One to Strike Out

119. If a motion be made to strike out part of a bill or resolution, a motion to amend the part proposed to be stricken out shall have precedence.

Filling Blanks

120. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time proposed shall be first put, and the question shall be put on names in the order they were nominated.

No Amendment by Way of Rider

121. No amendment by way of rider shall be received to any bill after engrossment.

Agreeing to Senate Amendments

122. When a House bill or House joint resolution shall be amended by the Senate, the question on agreeing to the bill or resolution as amended shall be again voted on by yeas and nays, and the result entered on the Journal, and in such a case the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to the House shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 7, sec. 31.)

Amendment by Section

123. If a bill is being considered section by section, only amendments to the section under consideration shall be in order. After all sections have been considered separately, the whole bill shall be open for amendment except that an amendment seeking to strike out matter previously inserted and containing substantially no new proposition shall not be in order.

Amending Titles

124. After the passage of a bill or joint resolution, amendments to its title may be offered when the title is read for approval.

Amendments to Senate Bills

125. Any Senate bill or resolution may be amended in the same manner as a House bill or resolution. If a Senate bill or resolution is amended the same shall be noted by the Clerk on the jacket containing same before it is reported to the Senate

After the reading of a Senate amendment to a House bill or resolution the question shall be, "Will the House concur in the Senate amendment?". But it shall be in order to move that the House concur in the Senate amendment with an amendment; or that the House refuse to concur and ask the Senate to recede.

If the Senate shall refuse to concur in a House amendment to a Senate bill or resolution, the following motions shall be in order and shall be privileged in the order named: First, That the House recede; Second, That the House insist and ask for a committee of conference; Third, That the House adhere.

Amendments to Be Printed in Journal

126. All amendments proposed, unless withdrawn, shall be printed in the Journal.

Speaking on Amendments

127. On an amendment being moved, a member who has spoken to the main question may speak again to the amendment.

JOURNAL

Clerk to Keep

128. The Clerk of the House, under the direction of the Speaker, shall keep a full and correct Journal of the proceedings.

Approval and Correction

129. When the Journal has been read to the end that any mistake made in the entry may be corrected, if no objection is made, it shall stand approved; but if objection be made, the first question of the House shall be to dispose of the same, and when such objections are disposed of and the Journal corrected, as the House may order, it shall stand as approved.

Printing Official Copies

130. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for correction, the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith. From the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal, which shall be properly indexed. In addition thereto six copies shall be printed on 6x9 heavy-weight bond paper, with a certificate at the end thereof, certifying that the same is the official Journal of the House and the same shall be signed by the Speaker and Clerk. Such printed Journal shall be the official record of the House. They shall be bound in flexible binding, and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the House of Delegates of West Virginia," with designation of regular or special session, as the case may be, and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk, and one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History, and one with the Clerk of the Senate.

Journal to Be Printed Daily

131. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to furnish a copy of each day's proceedings of the Journal to the printer, to be printed and distributed without delay.

Inserting Motions in Journal

132. Every written motion made to the House shall be inserted in the Journal with the name of the member making it, unless it be withdrawn on the same day it is submitted.

CHANGE OR SUSPENSION OF RULES

Rescinding or Amending Rules

133. All propositions to amend or rescind any standing rule or order of the House shall be by resolution and be at once referred, without debate, to the Committee on Rules, and shall be reported therefrom within two days. Any such resolution may be adopted by a majority vote, a quorum being present.

[Note: The power to make its rules of procedure is given the House under Sec. 24, Art. 6 of the Constitution.]

Suspension of Rules

134. These rules shall not be suspended, except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present. Unless there be a unanimous consent for the suspension of rules, the vote shall be determined by yeas and nays.

[Note: The motion to suspend the rules is usually preceded by a member requesting unanimous consent of the House to do a particular thing. If no one objects the House is deemed to assent, and what is desired is allowed accordingly. If objection is made, then the member may move that the rules be suspended for the specific purpose or object he has in view. A motion to lay on the table may not be applied to a motion to suspend the rules. (Hind's Precedents, Sec. 5405.)]

Manual and Rules

135. On any question of order or parliamentary practice where the rules of the House or the joint rules of the House and Senate are silent or inexplicit, Jefferson's Manual and the Digest of the Rules and Practices of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress shall be considered as authority.

[Note: Jefferson's Manual was prepared by Thomas Jefferson for his own guidance as President of the United States Senate in the years he was Vice-President, from 1797 to 1801. The House of Representatives, in 1837, by rule which still exists, provided that the provisions of the Manual should "govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the House." The Manual is regarded by English parliamentarians as the best statement of what the law of Parliament was at the time Jefferson wrote it. (House Manual and Digest), 70th Congress, 1st Sess., Sec. 278.]

MISCELLANEOUS RULES

Persons Admitted to the Floor

136. No person except Senators, elective state officers, heads of state departments, ex-Governors, members of Congress, Judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals, Judges of Circuit and other Courts of record, former members and officers of the House and Senate, members of other State Legislatures, the Governor's secretary, members of the press when properly accredited, attaches when actually engaged in work for the House or a member thereof, the Clerk of the Senate and his assistants, may be admitted upon the floor of the House, except by permission of the Speaker. At the convening of the House, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall see that all persons, except those covered by this rule, retire from the floor of the House.

Lobbying in the House Chamber

137. No person engaged in lobbying shall be permitted upon the floor of the House at any time while the House is in session, and any person transgressing this rule shall be removed from the floor of the House and be debarred from the privilege of the floor during the remainder of the entire session. The Speaker is charged with the enforcement of this rule and it shall be the duty of any member, officer or employee of the House to inform the Speaker of any violation of this rule.

Newspaper Correspondents

- 138. (a) Any person accorded the privilege of a newspaper correspondent must be the telegraphic correspondent of a daily newspaper, or of a recognized press association, who is not engaged in any department of the state government, or in any other business, or must be the official reporter of a Charleston daily newspaper; and no more than one representative of each newspaper shall be admitted to the press tables or press gallery at one time.
- (b) All applications for admission to the press gallery or press tables must be made to the Speaker. Such applications shall state the name of the newspaper, its location, times of publication, and be signed by the applicant.
- (c) The Speaker shall verify the statements made in such application, and if the application is approved by him, he shall issue a correspondent's card, signed by him.
- (d) The correspondents shall not visit the members in their seats during the session of the House, and shall abide by such rules and regulations as may be adopted by the Rules Committee of the House.
- (e) The card issued by the Speaker must be presented when required by any Sergeant-at-Arms. It shall not be transferable. The transfer or loan of such card to any one shall be followed by its cancellation and the withdrawal of all its privileges from the correspondent so offending.

(f) The gallery or press tables allotted to newspaper correspondents shall be for their exclusive use, and persons not holding correspondents' cards shall not be entitled to admission thereto.

Lounging Prohibited in the Hall of the House

139. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to prevent all persons not connected with the Legislature from assembling in the halls at any time when the House is not in session for the purpose of lounging or loafing. For the purpose of enforcing this rule, the Sergeant-at-Arms or his assistants shall be in attendance at all times, and the persistent neglect or disregard of this rule shall be cause for dismissal by the Speaker, or removal.

Peddling Prohibited

140. No person shall be permitted to hawk, peddle or offer for sale any article of traffic at any time within the hall of the House; and it shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to strictly enforce this rule.

Regulating Use of Halls

141. The Speaker shall have power to regulate the use of the halls and stairways of the part of the Capitol building used by the House for refreshments and like purposes when the Legislature is in session.

Oaths

142. The Speaker or Clerk shall have authority to administer any oaths required by the business of the House.

Janitors

143. The janitors appointed for or assigned to the House shall, under direction of the Speaker, have care of the House chamber, committee rooms and halls of the House and keep the same in a neat and proper condition at all times.

JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF DELEGATES

(Regular Session, 1943)

Joint Assembly

1. Whenever there shall be a joint assembly of the two houses, a brief account of the proceedings shall be entered upon the Journal of each House, except in the joint assembly for counting votes for state officers.

[Note: It is the custom to hold joint assemblies in the House Chamber and they are presided over by the Speaker. In such sessions the Clerk of the House acts as Clerk, assisted by the Clerk of the Senate. The President of the Senate is givn a seat to the right of the Speaker and seats are arranged for the members of the Senate.

Joint Assembly to Open and Publish Election Returns

2. As soon as the Senate, being organized, is informed that the House of Delegates is ready to proceed, as provided by section three of article seven of the Constitution, to open and publish the returns of the elections for state officers, the Senate, preceded by its president and other officers, shall repair in a body to the hall of the House of Delegates. Upon their arrival the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Delegates shall announce the presence of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall then address the Speaker of the House, stating that a majority of the Senate have assembled in the hall of the House of Delegates to be present at the opening and publishing of the returns of the elections for State officers, held on theday of The Speaker of the House of Delegates shall invite the President of the Senate to a seat upon his right, and the other members of the Senate and officers thereof to take seats assigned them, and after announcing that a majority of the House of Delegates is present, shall then open and publish the returns of said election, proceeding by counties in alphabetical order, the Clerks of the two houses each taking down the returns as announced by the Speaker, to be entered upon the Journal of the House; and when completed and estimated the Speaker shall announce the votes received by each person voted for, for each of said offices, and those receiving the largest number of votes shall be by him declared duly elected; and the Senate shall then return to its hall; and if any two or more candidates for any of said offices have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the two houses shall immediately proceed to choose one of such persons for said office by a joint vote, as provided by Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution.

Disagreement and Conference

3. Whenever a measure of one house is amended in the other and the house in which it originated shall refuse to concur in the amendment, the house amending the measure may either insist or recede therefrom. But when a measure originating in one house is amended in the other, the house in which it originated may amend such amendment and a motion therefor shall take precedence of a motion to concur. If said house refuses to concur, the other house may either recede from or insist upon its amendment, and a motion to recede shall take precedence of a motion to insist. The motion to lay on the table or to postpone indefinitely shall not be in order in respect to the motion to recede from or to insist.

A motion to recede having failed shall be equivalent to the adoption of a motion to insist and shall be so entered upon the Journal. A motion to insist being decided in the negative, shall be equivalent to the adoption of a motion to recede and shall be so entered upon the Journal. If the motion to insist prevails, the house so insisting shall request a committee of conference on the subject of disagreement, and shall appoint a committee therefor. The other house may thereupon appoint such committee. Unless a different number is agreed upon, such conference committee shall consist of five members from each house.

Such committee shall consider and report upon only the subject matter of the amendment or amendments which were in disagreement, with necessary consequential changes. The committee shall meet at a convenient time, to be agreed upon by their chairmen, and having conferred freely, shall report to their respective houses the result of the conference. In case of agreement, the report shall be first made, with the papers referred accompanying it, to the house which refused to concur, and there acted upon; and such action, with the papers referred, shall be immediately reported by the Clerk to the other house. In case of disagreement, the papers shall remain with the house in which the measure originated. If an agreement is reached, the report shall be made and signed in duplicate by at least a majority of the conferees from each house, one of the duplicates being retained by the conferees of each house.

Messages Between the House

4. When a message is sent by one house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent, by the Doorkeeper thereof, if it be in session, and then be respectfully communicated to the presiding officer by the person by whom it may be sent, but no message shall be received during a call of the roll. But the Clerk of one house may communicate a message to the Clerk of the other after adjournment, and any message so sent shall be received by the house to which it is sent whenever it may be in session.

Introduction of Bills

5. No bill, other than an appropriation bill, shall be introduced in either house after the fiftieth day of the session unless permission to introduce the bill be given by a concurrent resolution, setting out the title of the bill, and adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members of each house present and voting.

One House to Notify Other of Rejection of Bill

6. When a bill or resolution passed in one house is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be sent to the house in which the same shall have been passed.

Record of Bills

7. The Clerks of the two houses shall keep separate records or registers, in which shall be recorded every action taken by the Senate and House on each bill and resolution.

Clerks to Endorse Bills

8. The Clerks of the two houses shall endorse on each bill a statement of any action taken by their respective bodies.

Notice to Be in Writing

9. Notice to either house of the action of the other shall be in writing, signed by the Clerk of the house giving such notice.

Each House to Have Control of Own Printing

10. Each house may order the printing of bills, resolutions, reports, and other documents without the consent of the other.

Joint Committees

- 11. Joint standing committees of the Senate and House shall be appointed as follows
- (1) Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills—To consist of five members from each house.

- (2) Committee on Joint Rules—To consist of the presiding officers and two members of each house, to be appointed by the presiding officers.
- (3) Such other joint committees as may be provided for by concurrent resolutions. A bill or resolution referred to a joint committee may be recalled from such committee by the house in which it originated.

Engrossed Bills to Be Filed with Clerk of House

12. All engrossed bills passed by, and joint and concurrent resolutions adopted by, both houses shall be filed with the Clerk of the House to be kept with the rolls of the Legislature and to be used by him in printing and publishing the acts of the Legislature.

Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills

13. The Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills shall consist of five members of the Senate and five members of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the presiding officer of each house, whose duty it shall be to compare carefully all bills and joint resolutions passed by both houses, with the enrollment thereof, and to correct any errors or omissions they may discover and to make reports to their respective houses from time to time, of the correctly enrolled bills or joint resolutions. It shall be in order for the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills to report at any time.

Printing Enrolled Bills

14. After a bill has been passed by both houses, the type from which it was originally printed shall be corrected as to any typographical errors that may not previously have been corrected and to include any amendments that may have been made by either house since the last printing of the bill. After the type has been so corrected, two hundred copies of the bill shall be printed (except charter bills, of which only twenty-five of each shall be printed). Twelve of these copies shall be on seven and one-fourth by ten bond paper, twenty-pound basis of at least fifty per cent rag content for the use of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, one of which copies, when properly authenticated, shall become the Enrolled Bill, and the remainder shall be on twenty-pound basis, sulphite bond paper. From these copies all judges shall be furnished enrolled bills as provided for in section fourteen, article one, chapter four of the code.

Authentication of Enrolled Bills

15. Enrolled Bills shall be authenticated by the signature of the chairman of the House Committee and the chairman of the Senate Committee. composing such Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, but in the absence of such chairman another member of the committee may act in his stead, and they shall require all bills and joint resolutions before such authentication to be free from interlineations or erasures and destroy any previous enrollment containing any interlineations or erasures. A certificate, showing in which house the bill originated and when it takes effect, signed by the Clerks of the two houses, shall be endorsed on the bill. After enrolled bills and joint resolutions are authenticated as aforesaid, they shall be signed by the Speaker of the House and by the President of the Senate.

Presenting Bills to Governor

16. After a bill shall have thus been signed in each house, it shall be presented by the said committee to the Governor, for his approval. The said committee shall report the day of presentation to the Governor, which time shall be entered on the Journal of each house.

Record of Enrolled Bills

17. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Enrolled Bills to keep a record book of all bills presented to the Governor for his approval. The title and number of each bill presented to the Governor shall be entered in this book, and when a bill is presented to him, the date presented and the signature of the Governor, showing receipt of same, shall be entered at the side of each title.

Action of Governor on Bills

18. Every bill disapproved by the Governor shall be returned by him to the house in which it originated, with his objections thereto, unless the Legislature shall, by its adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after said adjournment.

Every bill approved by the Governor shall, within five days after it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State and the fact of said approval communicated by the Governor to the house in which said bill originated.

Every bill which shall be neither approved nor disapproved by the Governor shall immediately, after the expiration of five days from the time it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State, who shall forthwith engross thereon a certificate to the following effect: "I certify that the foregoing act, having been presented to the Governor for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the house of the Legislature in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the State, has become a law without his approval," and shall date and sign the same. The Governor shall notify the house in which the bill originated of each bill becoming a law without his approval.

Upon each bill returned to either house of the Legislature with the objections of the Governor, the Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates shall engross the action, if any, of their respective houses on the reconsideration and passage of said bill, and sign the same.

Joint Meetings of Committees

19. Whenever any bill has been referred by the Senate to one of its standing committees, and the same or like bill has been referred by the House to one of its committees, the Chairmen of the respective committees, when in their judgment the interest of legislation or the expedition of business will be better served thereby, may arrange for a joint meeting of their committees for the consideration of such bill. All joint committee meetings shall be presided over by the chairman of the Senate committee.

What Shall Be Printed in the Journal

- 20. The following shall always be printed in the Journal of each house:
- (a) Messages from the Governor and messages from the other house, the titles of all bills and the title and text of all resolutions.
- (b) Every vote taken by yeas and nays in each house, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial, or paper presented to each house.
 - (c) A true and accurate account of the proceedings of each house.

Manner of Printing the Journal and Bills

21. In printing the daily Journal of the proceedings of each house there shall be printed at the top of each page, except the first, the date of the Journal and on the last page of each day's Journal shall be printed the calendar for the next day.

At the top of the first page of each bill, preceding the title and number thereof, there shall be printed the name of the person by whom or the committee by which it was introduced and the date of introduction; and at the top of each page, except the first, shall be printed the number of the bill.

Use of Legislative Halls and Offices

22. Permission to use, other than for statutory purposes, either Legislative chamber or offices used by the two houses, may be granted by the President of the Senate or Speaker of the House as the case may be. During legislative sessions, the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate shall have power to regulate the use of the halls and stairways of the parts of the capitol building used by their respective houses, for any purpose whatsoever.

Resolutions

23. Resolutions requiring concurrent action may originate in either house, and shall be of two kinds, namely:

Joint Resolutions: These resolutions shall be used for proposing amendments to the State Constitution and for ratifying amendments to the Federal Constitution. Joint resolutions shall be adopted as provided in section two, article fourteen of the Constitution.

Concurrent Resolutions: Such resolutions shall be used for all purposes not covered by joint resolutions as defined above.

Suspension of Joint Rules

24. No Joint Rule shall be suspended, except by a two-thirds vote of each house, and unless there be unanimous consent, such vote shall be taken by yeas and nays.

After the new Constitution was adopted in that year a special session of the newly elected members of the legislature was held and Daniel D. Johnson was elected President to succeed Carlos A. Sperry.

Regular terms of Court are held on the second Wednesday in January and on the first Wednesday in September.

Special terms are held at such times as may be designated by the Court.

STATE LAW LIBRARY

The West Virginia State Law Library, consisting of law books and legal periodicals only, is situated on the third floor of the second unit of the Capitol Building. The library is in charge of the State Law Librarian, appointed by the Supreme Court of Appeals.

The books of the library consist of textbooks purchased, and reports and laws of other states as well as many foreign countries, all except textbooks and codes coming in by exchange for West Virginia reports provided by the State Law Librarian, as consecutive volumes of the reports of West Virginia and elsewhere are published.

The State Law Librarian, from West Virginia reports furnished him by the superintendent of public printing, supplies all judges of courts, West Virginia State officers and State law libraries of other states with copies of these reports.

The law governing the State Law Library provides that the library shall be open to the judges of the Supreme Court and the clerks, judges of the United States and circuit courts, state officers, and members and officers of the Legislature during the session of that body. It is also provided that no other person shall be permitted to remove any book or paper from the place where the library is kept, but that "other persons than those prescribed above may be permitted to use the library at the place where it is kept."



FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT, (D), of Hyde Park, N. Y., was born January 30, 1882, son of James and Sara (Delano) Roosevelt, A. 

The Newton D. Baker General Hospital is located in Berkeley County, on state highway 9, four miles east of the city of Martinsburg.

It is a War Department installation of semi-permanent type, designed to care for soldier casualties of the present war. Patients are received from other hospitals or direct from hospital ship at ports of debarkation. They may be transferred to another general or specialized army hospital, discharged from the army, or returned to duty after recovering from the cause of their disability.

Construction of the multi-million dollar institution was begun in 1943, and first patients arrived in January, 1944. The hospital is designed to care for approximately 2,000 casualties, including partially-recovered patients in the Reconditioning Program.

The permanent Army and civilian personnel required to staff the installation numbers above one thousand. Approximately 85 buildings, connected by corridors, comprise the main hospital center. Reconditioning Barracks, War Department theatre, fire department, heating plant and engineers' center are not connected with the main group.

Included in the main group are the administration units, officer, nurse, WAC and enlisted men's barracks; approximately 30 wards; professional units; a Red Cross unit and patients' recreation hall; post office; post exchange lunch counter, store, tailor and barber shop; library; several mess halls, and quartermaster storage units.

A spur from the main line of the B. & O. Railroad enables hospital trains to deliver patients directly into the hospital.

The War Department on September 29, 1942, acquired the Greenbrier Hotel, White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, and has designated it as the Ashford General Hospital in honor of the late Colonel Bailey K. Ashford of the Medical Corps.

The hospital has a bed capacity of 2,000, and is a center for Vascular Surgery and Neurosurgery. The staff represents the best in medicine, surgery and the specialties, and many thousands of soldiers have been given adequate treatment since the establishment of the hospital.

FEDERAL REFORMATORY FOR WOMEN

The Federal Reformatory for Women is situated amidst the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains in Summers, Monroe and Greenbrier Counties. It was established by Act of Congress June 7, 1924, and the buildings and grounds have a value in excess of \$2,000,000. It was designed to take care of all women Federal prisoners in the United States and the insular possessions, and has a capacity of 500. There are fifteen buildings housing inmates, a Hospital, Administration Building, Laundry, School Building and Auditorium, Storehouse, Shops and an extensive farm with modern dairy, piggery and truck gardens. The Enabling Act especified that each inmate should be given training that would fit her to be self-supporting on her return to society, and the entire program of the institution is based upon this plan for rehabilitation. An intelligent and sincere attempt is made to supplant the old-time theory of punishment with a program of cleanliness, industry and education in citizenship. Classification and casework is highly developed to provide for adequate training within the institution and proper placement in jobs after release.

The Veterans Administration Facility is located in Wayne County, West Virginia, west of the city of Huntington.

It has a 317 bed hospital, with modern equipment, and accepts general medical and surgical cases. Honorably discharged veterans of all wars are eligible for admission. Those who serve in the armed forces in other than war periods are eligible for admission if discharged for a disability incurred in line of duty or if in receipt of pension for a disability incurred in line of duty.

The facility also adjudicates the compensation and pension claims of those who have served in the armed forces since July 15, 1903, and arranges for the appointment of suitable fiduciaries for incompetent veterans and minor beneficiaries and sees that their estates are administered in accordance with the West Virginia laws.

A new Vocational Rehabilitation Division was established under Public Law No. 16, 78th Congress, approved March 24, 1943, to grant and supervise vocational rehabilitation to persons who served in the armed forces after December 6, 1941, and prior to the termination of the present war, who have a disability incurred in or aggravated by such service, and who are in need of vocational rehabilitation to overcome the handicap of such disability.

OFFICE OF PRICE ADMINISTRATION

Headquarters: Charleston

(August 1, 1944)

The Office of Price Administration was established on January 30, 1942, by the Emergency Price Control Act. Touching every business which buys or sells, it is charged with three basic duties: First, the prevention of inflationary increases in the prices of commodities, and in rents in defense rental areas; second, the rationing of commodities for civilian consumption; and third, the protection of consumer interests.

OPA came into existence at a time when war production demands had caused the prices of basic raw materials to rise 66 per cent in the period which intervened following outbreak of war in Europe in September 1939; in the same period, wholesale prices had increased 31 per cent; and retail prices of clothing, house furnishings, and foods were up 25 per cent.

Immediately coordinating War Price and Rationing Boards in the 55 counties of the State, OPA moved on April 28, 1942, to freeze the retail, wholesale, and manufacturer's prices of almost every commodity at highest March 1942 levels. The charge for services connected with commodities was also fixed and rentals stabilized in more than 300 defense rental areas.

As time passed, numerous necessary amendments and new regulations were placed in effect to control living costs. In 1943, to obtain better compliance with food pricing regulations and to simplify the pricing structure, OPA introduced "dollar-and-cents Community Prices," which are fixed by district offices using established pricing formulae. Community Pricing has now been extended throughout West Virginia. In this way, every housewife now can know the maximum price which a store may charge for any food commodity thus priced on a "dollar-and-cents" basis.

The price control program is flexible enough to permit new regulations and amendments as conditions demand. In August 1943, OPA acted to freeze restaurant prices in this State, setting maximum restaurant prices at the highest level existing in the period April 4-10, 1943.

OPA's list of rationed commodities now includes sugar, processed foods, meats, fats, cheese, oils, butter, margarine, canned fish, canned milk, fuel oil, typewriters, cooking and heating stoves, shoes and rubber workshoes, tires, automobiles, bicycles, and gasoline.

The price control and rationing programs are administered in each county by the War Price and Rationing Boards which are divided into rationing and price panels. The boards are responsible to the district office in Charleston, which in turn answers to the regional OPA office in Cleveland. The Charleston office was opened in May 1942.

The West Virginia War Finance Committee (originally known as the War Savings Staff) was set up in September, 1941, for the purpose of promoting the sale of War Bonds and Stamps. Under the direction of the state committee and the state staff, war savings committees were organized in each of the state's 55 counties. With headquarters in Parkersburg, F. Roy Yoke, Collector of Internal Revenue, served as State Administrator until the removal of headquarters to Charleston, December 1, 1942. Mr. Yoke was succeeded by E. R. Mowbray, Field Representative of the Treasury Department, Washington, who served as Acting Administrator until July 1, 1943, at which time the Treasury Department announced the merger of the War Savings Staffs of the nation with the Victory Fund Committees (composed of bankers of the nation) into one permanent war financing organization—the War Finance Committee.

On August 1, 1943, the War Savings Staff of West Virginia became the War Finance Committee, with headquarters retained in Charleston. A. C. Spurr, President of the Monongahela West Penn Public Service Company, Fairmont, was named State Chairman, and upon acceptance of the post announced the appointment of Robert Clutter, Charleston, a former Deputy Administrator of the War Savings Staff, as Executive Manager of the new state organization. Simultaneously with the change in organization, the 55 counties of the state were divided into eight regions (now nine) over which were appointed chairmen. County committees were expanded and revamped to conform with changes in the state and national organizations. Following the resignation January 1, 1944, of Mr. Clutter, W. C. Handlan, former director of publications for the State Department of Agriculture, assumed the office of Executive Manager. Mr. Handlan, former West Virginia newspaper man, directed or assisted with all war loan publicity campaigns prior to his acceptance of this post.

The Honorable M. M. Neely, Governor of West Virginia, has, since the inception of the war financing program, served as honorary chairman of the state committee, members of which represent business, industry, the church, education, labor, and civic and social organizations of the state. Revenue for prosecuting the war is provided by a continuing day-in and day-out war financing program highlighted by periodic war loan campaigns. Month-by-month sales and records of war loan drives provide evidence of the type of support for the war financing program coming from the people of West Virginia.

^{*}Because 1st (November 30-December 31, 1942) and 2nd (April 12-May 1, 1943) War Loan campaigns were conducted within federal reserve districts and without regard to state lines, it is not possible to make direct comparisons of West Virginia sales results with those of other states for these earlier drives

WAR PRODUCTION BOARD

Regional Office: 1300 Union Commerce Building, Cleveland, Ohio

War Production Board has two principal duties to perform. It is a service organization designed to assist business and government in achieving a coordinated program of maximum war production; and it is designated to inform the various businesses as to priority rulings and to see that priority regulations are obeyed.

Manufacturers and producers whose facilities are not being used in war production are supplied with information and specifications on needed war materiel, and WPB further assists them in submitting a bid for the needed product. WPB also conducts surveys of plants in which civilian production is being limited by priorities, lack of transportation or other emergency reasons. After having gained a knowledge of a plant's unused facilities, WPB is in position to suggest various items which are needed and which the plant can furnish. Thus, it facilitates and expands the production of needed items by enabling plants to continue or resume production; and it relieves the distressed situation of the management of the plants and of the labor they employ.

In the field of priorities, WPB serves as an information bureau. The field offices are kept supplied with the most up-to-date information concerning priorities, and manufacturers, jobbers, retailers and individuals are asked to submit priority questions and problems to their district office.

WAR MANPOWER COMMISSION

WEST VIRGINIA STATE OFFICE

The War Manpower Commission was established by Executive Order of the President on April 18, 1942, for the purpose of transferring and coordinating certain functions to facilitate the mobilization and utilization of manpower. The order was amended on December 5, 1942, to include the Selective Service System, and was revised again on December 26, 1942.

The National Headquarters office of the War Manpower Commission formulates over-all manpower policy and programs, directs the administration of the Selective Service System, a national system of employment services, and programs for the training and effective utilization of manpower, and coordinates the action of all government agencies concerned with manpower problems. The Regional Offices supervise the state offices and through them carry out the manpower program.

All War Manpower Commission agencies and cooperating agencies within the state have been coordinated as the State War Manpower staff, with a State War Manpower Director responsible for the direction and supervision o the War Manpower Commission agencies and the coordination of the cooperating agencies with the War Manpower agencies. These agencies include:


(a) United States Employment Service; (b) Civil Service Commission; (c) Railroad Retirement Board Employment Service; (d) Vocational Schools (State Department); (e) Apprentice Training; (f) Training Within Industry; (g) Selective Service; (h) Farm Extension; (i) War Production Board.

The State War Manpower Commission Staff is responsible for:

- (1) Planning the general program for each specific community and labor market area.
- (2) Seeing that instructions issued to each agency and War Manpower Commission unit at the local level are supplementary and complimentary to each other.
- (3) Providing technical advice and assistance to the local agencies and War Manpower Commission units.
- (4) Providing line direction and supervision of War Manpower Commission agencies and units.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

MADE BY THE ORIGINAL THIRTEEN STATES IN CONGRESS AT PHILADELPHIA

UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED JULY 4, 1776

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the Powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security.—Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these States. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world. let facts be submitted to a candid world

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the State remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws

for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kent among us in times of peace standing armies without the consent.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies without the consent of our legislatures. f 224 1

He has affected to render the military independent of and superior to the

civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:
For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these States:
For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:
For imposing taxes without our consent:
For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:
For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:
For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:

absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our government:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here, by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has considered deprecial incurrentians, amongst us, and has endeavored to bring

brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions. In every state of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms: our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injuries. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and holds them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent States, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent States may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Preamble

WE THE PEOPLE of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I

Legislative Powers Vested in Congress

Section 1. All legislative Powers nerein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Composition of the House of Representatives

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature,

Qualifications of Representatives

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

Apportionment of Representatives and Direct Taxes-Census

*[Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free

^{*}The Constitution, •riginally consisting of a preamble and seven articles, was adopted September 17, 1787, at a convention in Philadelphia which had assembled on May twelfth of that year. On September 28, 1787, Congress directed that the Constitution be transmitted to the legislatures of the various States to be submitted for ratification or rejection to a convention of delegates chosen in each

State.

Under the language of the Constitution, ratification by nine States was necessary. On March 4, 1789, the date which had been fixed for commencing the operations of government under the new Constitution, it had been ratified by eleven of the thirteen original states, as follows: Delaware, December 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, December 12, 1787; New Jersey, December 19, 1787; Georgia, January 2, 1788; Connecticut, January 9, 1788: Massachusetts, February 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 25, 1788; and New York, July 26, 1788.

North Carolina ratified the Constitution on November 21, 1789, and Rhode Island on May 29, 1789. Vermont ratified the Constitution January 10, 1791, and was, by act of Congress approved February 18, 1791, admitted into the Union.

Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons.] †The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New-York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

Filling of Vacancies in Representation

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

Selection of Officers—Power of Impeachment

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Of the Senate

Section 3. *The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, [chosen by the Legislature] thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.

Classification of Senators—Filling of Vacancies

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; [and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies].*

Qualifications of Senators

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

Vice President to be President of Senate

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

Selection of Senate Officers-President pro tempore

The Senate shall chuse their other Officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

Senate to Try Impeachments

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried, the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of Honor, Trust, or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Control of Congressional Elections

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

Time for Assembling of Congress

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall.[be on the first Monday in December,] unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.*

Each House to be the Judge of the Election and Qualifications of Its Members—Regulations as to Quorum

Section 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns, and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House to Determine Its Own Rules

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Journals and Yeas and Nays

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Adjournment

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Compensation and Privileges of Members of Congress

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the

United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

Incompatible Officers—Exclusions

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been encreased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Revenue Bills to Originate in House

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Manner of Passing Bills-Veto Power of President

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Concurrent Orders or Resolutions, to be Passed on by President

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

General Powers of Congress-Taxation

Section 8. The Congress shall have Power To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

Borrowing of Money

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

Regulation of Commerce

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;

Naturalization and Bankruptcy

To establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject to Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

Money, Weights and Measures

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

Counterfeiting

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

Post Offices

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

Patents and Copyrights

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

Inferior Courts

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court;

Piracies, Felonies, Etc.

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

War-Marque and Reprisal

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

Armies

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

Navy

To provide and maintain a Navy;

Land and Naval Forces

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

Calling Out Militia

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrection and repel Invasions;

Organizing, Arming and Disciplining Militia

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

Exclusive Legislation Over District of Columbia

To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To Enact Laws Necessary to Enforce Constitution

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Migration or Importation of Certain Persons Not to be Prohibited Before 1808

Section 9. The Migration or Importation of Such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

Writ of Habeas Corpus not to be Suspended—Exception

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

Bills of Attainder and Ex Post Facto Laws Prohibited

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

Capitation and Other Direct Taxes

*No Capitation, or other direct, Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

Exports not to be Taxed

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference to be Given to Ports of Any State-Interstate Shipping

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another: nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

Money, How Drawn from Treasury—Financial Statements to be Published

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

^{*}See also the sixteenth amendment.

Titles of Nobility not to be Granted—Acceptance by Government Officers of Favors from Foreign Powers Prohibited

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

Limitations of the Powers of the Several States

SECTION 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit, make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

State Imposts and Duties

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection Laws; and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Controul of the Congress.

Further Restrictions on Powers of States

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II

Of the President-The Executive Power

SECTION 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows:

Appointment and Qualifications of Presidential Electors

Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

Original Method of Electing the President and Vice President

*[The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes

^{*}This paragraph has been superseded by amendment XII.

shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice President.]

Congress may Determine Time of Choosing Electors and Day for Casting Their Votes

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

Qualifications for the Office of President

No person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President: neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.

Filling Vacancy in Office of President

In case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the Same shail devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected

Compensation of the President

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be encreased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Oath to be Taken by the President

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

The President to be Commander in Chief of Army and Navy and Head of Executive Departments—May Grant Reprieves and Pardons

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject

relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

President May, with Concurrence of Senate, Make Treaties, Appoint Ambassadors—Appointment of Inferior Officers, Authority of Congress Over

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law: but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

President May Fill Vacancies in Office During Recess of Senate

The President shall have Power to fill up all Vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

President to Give Advice to Congress—May Convene or Adjourn it on Certain Occasions—To Receive Ambassadors—Have Laws Executed and Commission all Officers

Section 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

All Civil Officers Removable by Impeachment

Section 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III

Judicial Power—How Vested—Term of Office and Compensation of Judges

Section 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Jurisdiction of Federal Courts

Section 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties

made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty—and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States;—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

Original and Appellate Jurisdiction of Supreme Court

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

Trials of all Crimes, Except Impeachment, to be by Jury

The trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Treason Defined-Conviction of

Section 3. Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or, in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

Congress to Declare Punishment for Treason-Proviso

The Congress shall have power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attainted.

ARTICLE IV

Each State to Give Full Faith and Credit to the Public Acts and Records of Other States

Section 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Privileges of Citizens

Section 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

Extradition Between the Several States

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

Fersons Held to Labor or Service in One State, Fleeing to Another, to be Returned

No Person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.

New States

Section 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

Regulations Concerning Territory

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Republican Form of Government and Protection Guaranteed the Several States

Section 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

ARTICLE V

Ways in Which the Constitution can be Amended

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress: Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

ARTICLE VI

Debts Contracted Under the Confederation Secured

All debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

Constitution Laws and Treaties of the United States to be Supreme

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

Who Shall Take Constitutional Oath—No Religious Test as to Official Qualification

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any office or public Trust under the United States.

*ARTICLE VII

Constitution to be Considered Adopted When Ratified by Nine States

The Ratification of the Convention of nine States shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.

Resolved

That the preceding Constitution be laid before the United States in Congress assembled, and that it is the Opinion of this Convention, that it should afterwards be submitted to a Convention of Delegates, chosen in each State by the People thereof, under the Recommendation of its Legislature, for their assent and Ratification; and that each Convention assenting to, and ratifying the Same, should give Notice thereof to the United States in Congress assembled. Resolved, That it is the Opinion of this Convention, that as soon as the Conventions of nine States shall have ratified this Constitution, the United Staes in Congress assembled should fix a Day on which Electors should be appointed by the States which shall have ratified the same, and a Day on which the Electors should assemble to vote for the President, and the Time and Place for commencing Proceedings under this Constitution. That after such Publication the Electors should be appointed, and the Senators and Representatives elected: That the Electors should meet on the Day fixed for the Election of the President, and should transmit their Votes certified, signed, sealed and directed, as the Constitution requires, to the Secretary of the United States in Congress assembled, that the Senators and Representatives should convene at the Time and Place assigned; that the Senators should appoint a President of the Senate, for the sole Purpose of receiving. opening and counting the Votes for President; and, that after he shall be chosen, the Congress, together with the President, should, without Delay, proceed to execute this Constitution.

**AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

†AMENDMENT I

Freedom of Religion, of Speech, of the Press, and Right of Petition

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

AMENDMENT II

Right of People to Bear Arms Not to be Infringed

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

^{**}In order to clarify sections of the Constitution which seemed insufficiently explicit with reference to individual and State rights, Congress, at its first session in the City of New York, September 25, 1789, submitted to the States twelve proposed amendments. Ten of the amendments were ratified by a sufficient number of the states, such ratification being completed on December 15, 1791. Two of the amendments failed of ratification. The first ten amendments printed herewith constitute the ten original amendments, popularly known as "A Bill of Rights."

[†]Brackets enclosing an amendment number indicate that the number was not specially assigned in the resolution proposing the amendment. It will be seen, accordingly, that only amendments XIII, XIV, XV, and XVI, were thus technically ratified by number.

AMENDMENT III

Quartering of Troops

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

AMENDMENT IV

Persons and Houses to be Secure from Unreasonable Searches and Seizures

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

AMENDMENT V

Trials for Crimes—Just Compensation for Private Property Taken for Public Use

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment of indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

AMENDMENT VI

Civil Rights in Trials for Crimes Enumerated

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

AMENDMENT VII

Civil Rights in Civil Suits

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by jury, shall be otherwise reexamined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

AMENDMENT VIII

Excessive Bail, Fines and Punishments Prohibited

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

AMENDMENT IX

Reserved Rights of People

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

AMENDMENT X

Powers not Delegated, Reserved to States and People Respectively

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

AMENDMENT XI

Judicial Power of United States Not to Extend to Suits Against a State

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.

AMENDMENT XII

Present Mode of Electing President and Vice-President by Electors

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the persons voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;-The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted:—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. *[And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.]—The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.

AMENDMENT XIII

Slavery Prohibited

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Congress Given Power to Enforce This Article

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XIV

Citizenship Defined—Privileges of Citizens

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Apportionment of Representatives

Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Excutive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Disqualification for Office-Removal of Disability

Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Public Debt Not to Be Questioned—Payment of Debt and Claims Incurred in Aid of Rebellion Forbidden

Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Congress Given Power to Enforce this Article

Section 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

AMENDMENT XV

Right of Certain Citizens to Vote Established

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Congress Given Power to Enforce This Article

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XVI

Taxes on Income—Congress Given Power to Lay and Collect

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

AMENDMENT XVII

Election of United States Senators—Filling of Vacancies— Qualifications of Electors

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

AMENDMENT XVIII

Manufacture, Sale or Transportation of Intoxicating Liquors, for Beverage Purposes, Prohibited

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Congress and the Several States Given Concurrent Power to Pass Appropriate Legislation to Enforce This Article

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Provisions of Article to Become Operative When Adopted by Three-fourths of the States

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

AMENDMENT XIX

Right of Citizens to Vote Not to Be Denied on Account of Sex

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XX

Terms of President, Vice-President and Members of Congress

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice-President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

When Congress Shall Assemble

Section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Procedure Where President-Elect or Vice President-Elect Fails to Qualify

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Congress to Choose in Case of Death of President or Vice President

Section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Effective Date

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.

AMENDMENT XXI

Repeal of Eighteenth Amendment

Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Transportation and Importation

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Ratification

SECTION 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

AMENDMENTS RATIFIED BY LEGISLATURE OF WEST VIRGINIA

Since June 20, 1863—the date West Virginia was admitted to the Union—ten amendments to the Constitution of the United States have been submitted to the various legislatures for ratification or rejection. Nine of the amendments have been ratified, and the following table shows the date of ratification of each amendment by the legislature of West Virginia:

PROPOSED CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

The proposed Child Labor amendment, submitted June 2, 1924, was ratified by the legislature of West Virginia on January 8, 1934. The amendment has been ratified by twenty-eight states. Ratification by thirty-six states is necessary. The amendment is as follows:

SECTION 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate, and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

Section 2. The power of the several states is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of state laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress.

THE CONSTITUTION OF WEST VIRGINIA

Ratified in 1872

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ARTICLE I

Relations to the Government of the United States

1. The State of West Virginia is, and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

Internal Government and Police

2. The government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the States, are reserved to the States or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved by the States is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

Continuity of Constitutional Operation

3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in time of peace, and any departure therefrom, or violation, thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despotism.

Representatives to Congress

4. For the election of representatives to congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled; which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE II

The State

1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the Commonwealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz:

The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Mingo, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; in all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia and in the first constitution forty-four of the above named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should the constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising the counties. The districts adopted the constitution and these six counties became a part of the State.

The remaining five counties were created by acts of the legislature as follows: Mineral County, from Hampshire County, on February 1, 1866; Grant County, from Hardy County, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln County, from parts of Cabell, Putnam, Kanawha and Boone Counties, on February 23, 1867; Summers County, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette Counties, on February 27, 1871; and Mingo County, from Logan County, on February 23, 1895.]

Powers of Government in Citizens

2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

Requisites of Citizenship

3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

Equal Representation

4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and, in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto shall, as far as practicable, be preserved.

Provisions Regarding Property

5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

Treason, What Constitutes-Penalty

6. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

"Montani Semper Liberi"-State Seal

7. The present seal of the State, with its motto, "Montani Semper Liberi," shall be the great seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the Secretary of State, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

Writs, Commissions, Official Bonds-Indictments

8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State shall run in the name of, and official bond shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, "Against the peace and dignity of the State."

ARTICLE III

Bill of Rights

1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity, namely: the enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

Magistrates Servants of People

2. All power is vested in, and consequently derived from the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them.

Rights Reserved to People

3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms, that is the best which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

Writ of Habeas Corpus

4. The privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, *ex-post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

Excessive Bail Not Required

5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offense. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offense committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offense.

Unreasonable Search and Seizure Prohibited

6. The right of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

Freedom of Speech and Press Guaranteed

7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may, by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

Relating to Civil Suits for Libel

8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendant.

Private Property, How Taken

9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purposes of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged, for public use, or for the use of such corporations, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner as may be prescribed by general law: *Provided*, That when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

Safeguards for Life, Liberty and Property

10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

Political Tests Condemned

11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves by their own oaths, of past alleged offenses, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law of any right, or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

Military Subordinate to Civil Power

12. Standing armies, in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen, unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court, for any offense that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

Right of Jury Trial

13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any case than according to the rules of the common law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case be otherwise re-examined than according to the rules of common law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by ioint resolution of March

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by joint resolution of March 7, 1879, and was adopted at the general election in 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,482; against ratification, 34,073; majority, 22,409.]

Trial of Crimes-Provisions in Interest of Accused

14. Trials of crimes, and of misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be by a jury of twelve men, public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county where the alleged offense was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause shown, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, the accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witnesses against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defense; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

Religious Freedom Guaranteed

15. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief, but all men shall be free to profess, and, by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in no wise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support such private contract as he shall please.

Right of Public Assembly Held Inviolate

16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolate.

Courts Open to All-Justice Administered Speedily

17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

Conviction Not to Work Corruption of Blood or Forfeiture

18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Hereditary Emoluments, Etc., Provided Against

19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

Preservation of Free Government

20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

ARTICLE IV

Elections and Officers

1. The *male citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside but no person who is a minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.

Mode of Voting by Ballot

2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

Voter Not Subject to Arrest on Civil Process

3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as suitor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads or except in time of war or public danger to render military service.

Persons Entitled to Hold Office—Age Requirements

4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any State, county or municipal office; but the Governor and Judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the Attorney General and Senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

Oath or Affirmation to Support the Constitution

5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

Provisions for Removal of Officials

6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner

^{*}The woman suffrage amendment to the Constitution of the United States, declared in force August 26, 1920, provides that "the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of \sec "."

as may be prescribed by general law, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

General Elections, When Held-Terms of Officials

7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers, not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin, on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

[The original section provided, that the general election should be held on "the second Tuesday of October," and the change was made in order that the election of state officers would fall on the same day as the presidential election. The original section also provided that the terms of office of members of the legislature should begin on the first day of November next succeeding their election, but the amendment provided that the term should begin on the first day of December.

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by joint resolution of February 21, 1883, and ratified at the general election in 1884. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 66,181; against ratification, 25,422; majority, 40,759.]

Further Provisions Regarding State's Officers and Agents

8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this Constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

Impeachment of Officials

9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment. The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the President of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the Senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature for the trial of impeachments.

Fighting of Duels Prohibited

10. Any citizen of this State, who shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, either in, or out of the State, fight a duel with deadly weapons, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall, ever thereafter, be incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this State.

Safeguards for Ballots

11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested elections; and shall pass such

laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner upon the ballot.

Registration Laws Provided For

12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters in this State.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election because his name is not or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter."

The amendment was proposed by joint resolution of February 22, 1901, and adopted at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 55,196; against ratification, 25,379; majority, 29,817.]

ARTICLE V

Division of Powers

1. The Legislative, Executive and Judicial Departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

ARTICLE VI

Legislature

1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates. The style of their Acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia."

Composition of Senate and House of Delegates

2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[The Senate is now composed of thirty-two, and the House of Delegates of ninety-four members.]

Senators and Delegates—Terms of Office

3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and Delegates for the term of two years. The Senators first elected shall divide themselves into two classes, one Senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the Senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years, and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one-half of the Senators shall be elected biennially.

Division of State Into Senatorial Districts

4. For the election of Senators, the State shall be divided into twelve Senatorial districts which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as hereinafter provided. Every district shall elect two Senators, but where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The districts shall be compact formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the census of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the Senatorial Districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foreging provision.

[There are now sixteen senatorial districts, as provided by Acts of 1937, Ch. 128.]

Senatorial Districts Designated

5. Until the Senatorial Districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first Senatorial District; Marshall, Wetzel and Marion, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, Grant and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[By the provisions of the reapportionment act of 1937 (Acts 1937, Ch. 128) the number of senatorial districts was increased to sixteen, the number of senators to thirty-two, and the counties rearranged in the various districts.]

Provisions for Delegate Representation

6. For the election of Delegates, every county containing a population of less than three-fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a Delegate District.

[By the provisions of the Acts of 1901, Ch. 10, the House of Delegates consisted of eighty-six members, each county having at least one member. Since the general election of 1916, the House of Delegates has consisted of ninety-four members, each county having at least one member. See Ch. 30, p. 270, Acts 1915, Regular Session.]

Delegate Apportionment After Census

7. After every census the Delegates shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the State by the number of which the House is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every Delegate District, and of every county not included in a Delegate District, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of Delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this division, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional Delegates necessary to make up the number of which the House is to consist, shall then be assigned to those Delegate Districts, and counties not included in a Delegate District, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every Delegate District, and county not included in a Delegate District shall be entitled to at least one Delegate.

Designation of Delegate Districts

8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first Delegate District, and elect three Delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun the second, and elect two Delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor the third, and elect one Delegate; Randolph and Tucker the fourth, and elect one Delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster the fifth, and elect one Delegate; McDowell and Wyoming the sixth, and elect one Delegate.

[There are now no delegate districts, each county having at least one member.]

Further Apportionments

9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of Delegates to the counties not included in Delegate Districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such districts, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire, Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan,

Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties, one Delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two Delegates each.

To Kanawha County, three Delegates.

To Ohio County, four Delegates.

[Many changes have been made in this apportionment. Kanawha County, the largest in population, now has eight Delegates.]

Arrangement of Senatorial and Delegate Districts

10. The arrangement of the Senatorial and Delegate Districts, and apportionment of Delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census, taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such Districts shall be altered, and Delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

Additional Territory May Be Admitted Into State

11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of this State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the State, voting on the question. And in such case provision shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

Residence Requirements for Senators and Delegates

12. No person shall be a Senator or Delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the District or County from which he is elected; and if a Senator or Delegate remove from the District or County for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

Eligibility to Seat in Legislature

13. No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

Bribery Conviction Forfeits Eligibility

14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crime, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether State, county, township, district, or other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

Senators and Delegates Not to Hold Civil Office of Profit

15. No Senator or Delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

Oath of Senators and Delegates

16. Members of the Legislature before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability;" and they shall also take this further oath, to-wit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator (or Delegate), on any bill, resolution, or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate)." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or of a Circuit Court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the Secretary of State shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

Members of Legislature Privileged from Civil Arrest

17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

Time of Assembly of Legislature

18. The Legislature shall assemble at the seat of government biennially, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. The first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1875, and every two years thereafter, on the same day.

Convening of Legislature by Governor

19. The Governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three-fifths of the members elected to each house.

Seat of Government

 $20. \ \,$ The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

Provisions for Assembling of Legislature Othen Than at Seat of Government

21. The Governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it can not safely assemble at the seat of Government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health, shall require it.

*Length of Legislative Session

22. All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue for a period of sixty days from the date of beginning. But all regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house.

*This section originally read as follows: "No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of

the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each House."

Under the provisions of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 12, 1919, and ratified at the general election in 1920, the section was amended to read as follows: "All sessions of the Legislature other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period not exceeding fifteen days, from date of convening, during which time no bill shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the Governor and passed by a vote of four-fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon, a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On reassembling of the Legislature, no bills shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular session shall not continue longer than forty-five days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 182,744; majority, 38,185.

Under Joint Resolution No. 9, adopted in 1927, and ratified at the general election

in 1928, the section was again amended to read as set forth in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 275,374; against ratification, 85,123; majority,

Concerning Adjournment

23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

Rules Governing Legislative Proceedings

24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each House may provide. Each House shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a President; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a Speaker. Each House shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest delegate present shall call the House to order at the opening of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the Speaker thereof shall have been chosen and have taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate present at the commencement of each regular session thereof shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a President of the Senate shall have been chosen and have taken his seat.

Authority to Punish Members

25. Each House may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.

Provisions for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

26. Each House shall have power to provide for its own safety and the undisturbed transaction of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duty, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member, for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session and shall not prevent the punishment of any offense, by the ordinary course of law.

Accounting for State Monies

27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether State, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is or shall be to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the State or of any county, district, or municipal corporation, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction, and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

Origination of Bills

28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

Requirement for Reading of Bills

29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each House, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with: *Provided*, in all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read in each house.

Acts to Embrace But One Object-Time of Effect

30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the first session under this Constitution, shall take effect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

How Bills May Be Amended

31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one House, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journal; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

"Majority" Defined

32. Whenever the words, "a majority of the members elected to either House of the Legislature," or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

Compensation of Members

33. The members of the Legislature shall each receive for his services the sum of five hundred dollars per annum and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate, shall each receive an additional compensation of two dollars per day for each day they shall act as presiding officers. No other allowance or emolument than

that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatever.

[The amendment of sections 22 and 33, Art. VI, was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 12, 1919, and ratified at the general election November 2, 1920. The only change made in section 33 was to strike out the words "four dollars per day" and insert "five hundred dollars per annum." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 160,929; against ratification, 122,744; majority, 38,185.]

Distribution of Laws and Journals Provided For-Contracts for Printing

34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and printing paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the State, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the Governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a reletting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

State Not to Be Made Defendant in Any Court

35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity, except the State of West Virginia, including any subdivision thereof or any municipality therein, or any officer, agent, or employee thereof, may be made defendant in any garnishment or attachment proceeding, as garnishee or suggestee.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity." The amendment as above set forth was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted March 8, 1935, Acts 1935, p. 662, and was ratified at the general election in 1936.]

Lotteries Prohibited

36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State.

Terms of Office Not to Be Extended After Election

37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

Salaries of Officials Not to Be Increased During Official Term

38. No extra compensation shall be granted to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority by law; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their sureties be released from any debt or liability due to the State: *Provided*, The Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

Local Laws Not to Be Passed in Enumerated Cases

39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for

Granting divorces;

Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways:

Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds;

Locating, or changing county seats;

Regulating or changing county and district affairs;

Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;

Regulating the practice in courts of justice;

Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;

Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;

The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting; The sale or mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;

Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;

Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;

Changing the law of descent;

Regulating the rate of interest;

Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;

Releasing taxes;

Releasing title to forfeited lands.

The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and all other cases for which provision can be so made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give the relief asked for.

39-(a). No local or special law shall hereafter be passed incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending their charters. The Legislature shall provide by general laws for the incorporation and government of cities, towns and villages and shall classify such municipal corporations, upon the basis of population, into not less than two nor more than five classes. Such general laws shall restrict the powers of such cities, towns, and villages to borrow money and contract debts, and shall limit the rate of taxes for municipal purposes, in accordance with section one, article ten of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia. Under such general laws, the electors of each municipal corporation, wherein the population exceeds two thousand, shall have power and authority to frame, adopt and amend the charter of such corporation, or to amend an existing charter thereof, and through its legally constituted authority, may pass all laws and ordinances relating to its municipal affairs: Provided, That any such charter or amendment thereto, and any such law or ordinance so adopted. shall be invalid and void if inconsistent or in conflict with this Constitution, or the general laws of the State then in effect, or thereafter from time to time enacted.

[This section (39-a), added to Art. VI, was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted March 9, 1935, Acts 1935, p. 706, and was ratified at the general election in 1936, in

Limiting Powers of Court or Judge

40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for.

Each House to Keep Journal of Proceedings

41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one-tenth of those present, shall be entered on the journal.

Appropriation Bills to Be Specific

42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

Board or Court of Registration of Voters Prohibited

43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any board or court of registration of voters.

Viva Voce Vote Necessary in Election of Certain Officers

44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be viva voce, and be entered on its journals.

Bribery and Attempt to Bribe-Punishment

45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive, from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing or failing to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold as such member; and also to provide by law for compelling any person, so bribing or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offenses: Provided, That any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offense of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offenses specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

Manufacture and Sale of Liquors

46. The Legislature shall, by appropriate legislation, regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State, and any law authorizing the sale of such liquors shall forbid and penalize the consumption and the sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "On and after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred fourteen, the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale of malt, vinous or spiritous liquors, wine, porter, ale, beer or any intoxicating drink, mixture or preparation of like nature, except as hereinafter provided, are hereby prohibited in this State: *Provided, however*, That the manufacture and sale and keeping for sale of such liquors for medicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical, sacramental and scientific purposes, and the manufacture and sale of denatured alcohol for industrial purposes may be permitted facture and sale of denatured alcohol for industrial purposes may be permitted under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. The Legislature shall, without delay, enact such laws, with regulations, conditions, securities and penalties as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this section." The amendment as set forth above, which became effective March 1, 1935, was proposed by Senate Committee Substitute for Engrossed House Joint Resolution No. 1, adopted March 9, 1933, Acts Regular Session, 1933, p. 532, and was ratified at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 276,978; against ratification, 237,559; majority, 39,419.]

Incorporation of Religious Denominations Prohibited

47. No charter of incorporation shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purposes of such church, or religious denomination

Homestead Exemption

48. Any husband or parent residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in no wise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and *Provided*, *further*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

Property of Married Women

49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their husbands.

Plan of Proportional Representation

50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election rearrange the Senatorial Districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

*The Budget System

51. The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the following provisions:

Sub-Section A

Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter mentioned.

Sub-Section B

First: Within ten days after the convening of the Legislature, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature for the session at which the budget is to be submitted, the Board of Public Works, which shall consist of the Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Free Schools and Commissioner of Agriculture, shall submit to the Legislature two budgets, one for each of the ensuing fiscal years. Each budget shall contain a complete plan of proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the particular fiscal year to which it relates; and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of such year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (1) the revenues and expenditures for each of the two fiscal years next preceding; (2) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the State; (3) the debts and funds of the State; (4) an estimate of the State's financial condition as of the beginning and end of each of the fiscal years covered by the two budgets above provided; (5) any explanation the Board of Public Works may desire to make as to the important features of any budget and any suggestion as to methods for the reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

Second: Each budget shall be divided into two parts, and the first part shall be designated "Governmental Appropriations" and shall embrace an itemized

estimate of the appropriations: (1) for the Legislature as certified to the Board of Public Works in the manner hereinafter provided; (2) for the Executive Department; (3) for the judicial department, as provided by law, certified to the Governor by the Auditor; (4) to pay and discharge the principal and interest of any debt of the State of West Virginia hereafter created in conformity with the Constitution and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (5) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (6) for the aid of the public schools in conformity with the laws of the State; (7) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and laws made in pursuance thereof.

Third: The second part shall be designated "General Appropriations," and shall include all other estimates of appropriations.

The Board of Public Works shall deliver to the presiding officer of each House the budgets and a bill for all proposed appropriations of the budgets clearly itemized and classified; and the presiding officer of each House shall promptly cause said bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill." The Board of Public Works may, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement either of said budgets to correct an oversight or in case of an emergency, with the consent of the Legislature by delivering such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officers of both Houses; and such amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of said budget bill as an addition to the items of said bill or as modification of or a substitute for any item of said bill such amendment or supplement may affect.

The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or diminishing the items therein relating to the Legislature, and by increasing the items therein relating to the judiciary, but except as hereinbefore specified, may not alter the said bill except to strike out or reduce items therein: *Provided*, *however*, That the salary or compensation of any public officer shall not be increased or diminished during his term of office; and such bill when and as passed by both Houses shall be a law immediately without further action by the Governor.

Fourth: The governor and such representatives of the boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for State's money as have been designated by the Board of Public Works for this purpose, shall have the right, and when requested by either House of the Legislature it shall be their duty to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill during the consideration thereof, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

Sub-Section C-Supplementary Appropriation Bills

Neither House shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both Houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following:

(1) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called herein a supplementary appropriation bill; (2) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in said bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenue available; (3) no supplementary appropriation bill shall become a law unless it be passed in each House by a vote of a majority of the members present, and the yeas and nays recorded on its final passage. Each supplementary appropriation bill shall bepresented to the Governor of the State as provided in section fourteen of article seven of the Constitution and thereafter all the provisions of said section shall apply.

Nothing in this amendment shall be construed as preventing the Legislature-from passing in time of war an appropriation bill to provide for the payment of any obligation of the State of West Virginia within the protection of sections ten of article one of the Constitution of the United States.

Sub-Section D-General Provisions

First: If the "Budget Bill" shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the Governor may, and it shall be his duty to issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of such bill; but no other matter than such bill shall be considered during such extended session except a provision for the cost thereof.

Second: The Board of Public Works for the purpose of making up its budgets shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to require from the proper State officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state monies and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such times as said board shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each House, of the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the Auditor, and for the public schools, as provided by law, shall be transmitted to the Board of Public Works, in such form and at such times as it shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

The Board of Public Works may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies, and all institutions applying for state monies. After such public hearings, it may, in its discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments, and for the public schools as provided by law.

Third: The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its provisions.

Fourth: In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, except amendments thereto heretofore made and ratified by the people, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the Governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature, as provided by section seven of article seven, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

ARTICLE VII

Executive Department

1. The Executive Department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture and Attorney General, who shall be, ex-officio, reporter of the Court of Appeals. Their terms of office shall be four years, and shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. They shall reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices, and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "The Executive Department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, who shall be ex-officio Reporter of the Court of Appeals. Their terms of office, respectively shall be four years, and shall commence on the fourth day of March, next after their election. They shall, except the Attorney General reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

form such duties as may be prescribed by law.

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, adopted June 3, 1933, Acts First Extraordinary Session, 1933, p. 506; and was adopted at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 251,965; against ratification, 145,787; majority, 106,178.]

Election

2. An election for Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "An election for Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901, and adopted at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 59,509; against ratification, 22,022; majority, 37,487.]

Certification of Election Returns-Contests

3. The returns of every election for the above named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the Secretary of State, directed to "the Speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the House, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each House of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the Hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of Governor shall be determined by both Houses of the Legislature by joint vote, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The effect of the amendment was to strike out the following at the end of the original section: "The Secretary of State shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall continue in office, unless sooner removed, until the expiration of the official term of the Governor by whom he shall have been appointed." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Eligibility

4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "Neither the Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, nor Attorney General, shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall be ineligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Chief Executive-Powers

5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the Governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

Governor's Message

6. The Governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money received and paid out by him from any funds, subject to his order, with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

Extraordinary Legislative Sessions

7. The Governor may on extraordinary occasions convene, at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

Governor to Nominate Certain Officers

8. The Governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for, and no such officer shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

Recess Vacancies-How Filled

9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the Governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office, and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nominated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

Governor's Power of Removal

10. The Governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

Remission of Fines and Penalties by Governor

11. The Governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital punishment and, except when the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, of punishment commuted and of reprieve or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

Governor Commander-in-Chief of Military Forces

12. The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State, (except when they shall be called into the service of the United States) and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion

Official Bond of State Officers

13. When any State officer has executed his official bond, the Governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required, his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

How Bills Become Laws

14. Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the

House in which it originated, which House shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that House agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that House, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each House shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the Governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after such adjournment, or become a law.

Respecting Appropriations of Monies

15. Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor; if he disapproves the bill, or any item or appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the House in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless re-passed by a majority of each House according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills.

Vacancy in Governorship, How Filled

16. In case of the death, conviction or impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the Governor, the President of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as Governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for Governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

Vacancies in Other Executive Departments

17. If the office of Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, State Superintendent of Free Schools, or Attorney General, shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all monies received or disbursed by them, respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed, and make a semi-annual report thereof to the Governor under oath or affirmation; and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The only change in the original section was the insertion of the words "Secretary of State" in the first line and by substitution of the words "prescribed" for the word "provided." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2 of this article.]

Executive Heads to Make Reports

18. The subordinate officers of the Executive Department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall, at least ten days preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the Governor, who shall

transmit such report to the Legislature; and the Governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of State institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

Salaries of Officials

19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office, or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the State treasury.

[This section, prior to amendment, read as follows: "The Governor shall receive for his services a salary of twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as Governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The Secretary of State shall receive one thousand; the State Superintendent of Free Schools, fifteen hundred; the Treasurer, fourteen hundred; the Auditor, two thousand; and the Attorney General, thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance except as herein otherwise provided, shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution adopted February 13, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 459) and was ratified at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,280; against ratification, 23,513; majority, 32,767.]

ARTICLE VIII

Judicial Department

1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court of appeals, in circuit courts and the judges thereof, in such inferior tribunals as are herein authorized and in justices of the peace.

[The amendment of this entire article was proposed by joint resolution of March 6, 1879 (Acts 1879, p. 175) and ratified at the general election in 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 57,941; against ratification, 34,270; majority, 23.671.7

Supreme Court of Appeals

2. The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of *four judges, any three of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. They shall be elected by the voters of the State and hold their office for the term of twelve years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by this Constitution, except that the judges in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of their present term of office.

Scope of Jurisdiction

3. It shall have original jurisdiction in cases of habeas corpus, mandamus, and prohibition It shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases where the matter in controversy, exclusive of costs, is of greater value or amount than one hundred dollars; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land, the probate of wills, the appointment or qualification of a personal representative, guardian, committee or curator; or concerning a mill, road, way, ferry or landing; or the right of a corporation or county to levy tolls or taxes; and, also in cases of quo warranto, habeas corpus, mandamus, certiorari, and prohibition, and in cases involving freedom or the constitutionality of a law.

^{*}The Supreme Court of Appeals now consists of five judges, under the provisions of the "Judicial Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution, and Acts 1903, ch. 19, amending and reenacting section 1 of chapter 113 of Warth's Code of 1899.

It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases where there has been a conviction for felony or misdemeanor in a circuit court, and where a conviction has been had in any inferior court and been affirmed in a circuit court, and in cases relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as the defendant, and such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

Binding Authority of Decisions

. 4. No decision rendered by the supreme court of appeals shall be considered as binding authority upon any of the inferior courts of this State, except in the particular case decided, unless such decision is concurred in by at least three judges of said court.

Reversal or Affirmance of Judgments

5. When a judgment or decree is reversed or affirmed by the supreme court of appeals, every point fairly arising upon the record of the case shall be considered and decided; and the reasons therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record of the case; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case concurred in by three of the judges thereof, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

Writ of Error, Supersedeas and Appeal

6. A writ of error, supersedeas, or appeal shall be allowed only by the Supreme Court of Appeals, or a judge thereof, upon a petition assigning error in the judgment or proceedings of the inferior court and then only after said court or judge shall have examined and considered the record and assignment of errors, and is satisfied that there is error in the same, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

Provision for Filling Supreme Court Vacancies

7. If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the Supreme Court of Appeals, the Governor shall issue a writ of election to fill such vacancy at the next general election for the residue of the term, and in the meantime he shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a judge is elected and qualified. But if the unexpired term be less than two years the Governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

Officers of Supreme Court

8. The officers of the Supreme Court of Appeals, except the reporter, shall be appointed by the court, or in vacation by the judges, thereof, with the power of removal; their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law.

Terms of Supreme Court

9. There shall be at least two terms of the Supreme Court of Appeals held annually at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

Circuit Courts

10. The State shall be divided into *thirteen circuits. For the circuit hereinafter called the first, two judges shall be elected, and for each of the other circuits one judge shall be elected by the voters thereof. Each of the judges so elected shall hold his office for the term of eight years unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed in this Constitution. The judges of the circuit courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of the term for which they have been elected in the circuit in which they may

^{*}Now twenty-four.

respectively reside, unless sooner removed as aforesaid. A vacancy in the office of a judge of the circuit court shall be filled in the same manner as is provided for in the case of a vacancy in the office of a judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals. During his continuance in office the judge of a circuit court shall reside in the circuit of which he is judge. The business of the first circuit may be apportioned between the judges thereof, and such judges may hold courts in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times as may be prescribed by law.

Terms of Circuit Court

11. A circuit court shall be held in every county in the State at least three times in each year, and provisions may be made by law for holding special terms of said court. A judge of any circuit may hold the courts in another circuit.

Circuit Court Jurisdiction

12. The circuit court shall have the supervision and control of all proceedings before justices and other inferior tribunals, by mandamus, prohibition and certiorari. They shall, except in cases confined exclusively by this Constitution to some other tribunal, have original and general jurisdiction of all matters at law where the amount in controversy, exclusive of interest, exceeds fifty dollars; of all cases of habeas corpus, mandamus, quo warranto and prohibition; and of all cases in equity, and of all crimes and misdemeanors. They shall have appellate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or supersedeas may be allowed to the judgment or proceedings of any inferior tribunal. They shall also have such other jurisdiction, whether supervisory, original, appellate or concurrent, as is or may be prescribed by law.

Division of State Into Circuits

13. Until otherwise provided by law, the State shall be divided into the following circuits: The counties of Brooke, Hancock, Ohio and Marshall shall constitute the first circuit; the counties of Monongalia, Marion and Harrison, the second; the counties of Preston, Taylor, Barbour, Tucker and Randolph, the third; the counties of Wetzel, Tyler, Ritchie and Doddridge, the fourth; the counties of Wood, Wirt and Pleasants, the fifth; the counties of Clay, Gilmer, Jackson, Roane and Calhoun, the sixth; the counties of Putnam, Kanawha and Mason, the seventh; the counties of Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln and Logan, the eighth; the counties of McDowell, Mercer, Raleigh, Wyoming and Boone, the ninth; the counties of Greenbrier, Monroe, Summers, Fayette and Pocahontas, the tenth; the counties of Upshur, Lewis, Braxton, Nicholas and Webster, the eleventh; the counties of Grant, Hardy, Hampshire, Mineral and Pendleton, the twelfth; the counties of Jefferson, Berkeley and Morgan, the thirteenth

[By various acts of the Legislature, authorized by section 14 following, the division of the State into circuits has been changed and the number increased to twenty-four.]

Rearrangement of State Into Circuits

14. The Legislature may rearrange the circuits herein provided for at any session thereof, next preceding any general election of the judges of said circuits, and after the year one thousand eight hundred eighty-eight, may, at any session, increase or diminish the number thereof.

Special Terms and Judges of Circuit Courts

15. The Legislature shall provide by law for holding regular and special terms of the circuit courts, where from any cause the judge shall fail to attend, or, if in attendance, can not properly preside.

Salaries of and Limitation on Judges

16. All judges shall be commissioned by the Governor. The *salary of a judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals shall be two thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and that of a judge of the circuit court shall be one thousand eight hundred dollars per annum; and each shall receive the same mileage as members of the Legislature: *Provided*, That Ohio county may pay an additional sum per annum to the judges of the circuit court thereof; but such allowance shall not be increased or diminished during the term of office of the judges to whom it may have been made. No judge, during his term of office, shall practice the profession of law or hold any other office, appointment or public trust, under this or any other government, and the acceptance thereof shall vacate his judicial office. Nor shall he, during his continuance therein, be eligible to any political office.

How Judges May Be Removed

17. Judges may be removed from office by a concurrent vote of both Houses of the Legislature, when from age, disease, mental or bodily infirmity or intemperance, they are incapable of discharging the duties of their office. But two-thirds of all the members elected to each House must concur in such vote, and the cause of removal shall be entered upon the journal of each House. The judge against whom the Legislature may be about to proceed shall receive notice thereof, accompanied with the cause alleged for his removal, at least twenty days before the day on which action is proposed to be taken therein.

Clerk of Circuit Courts

18. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties and compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law; and when a vacancy shall occur in the office, the circuit court or the judge thereof in vacation shall fill the same by appointment until the next general election. In any case in respect to which the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act, the said court shall appoint a clerk to act therein. The clerks of said courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein for the term for which they were elected, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

Courts of Limited Jurisdiction

19. The Legislature may establish courts of limited jurisdiction within any county, incorporated city, town or village, with the right of appeal to the circuit court, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law; and all courts of limited jurisdiction heretofore established in any county, incorporated city, town or village, shall remain as at present constituted until otherwise provided by law. The municipal court of Wheeling shall continue in existence until otherwise provided by law, and said court and the judge thereof, shall exercise the powers and jurisdiction heretofore conferred upon them; and appeals in civil cases from said court shall lie directly to the supreme court of appeals.

Regarding Participation in Civil War

20. No citizen of this State who aided or participated in the late war between the government of the United States and a part of the people thereof, on either side, shall be liable in any proceding, civil or criminal; nor shall his property be seized or sold under final process issued upon judgments or decrees

heretofore rendered, or otherwise, because of any act done in accordance with the usages of civilized warfare in the prosecution of said war. The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for giving full force and effect to this section.

Parts of Common Law Effective

21. Such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force when this article goes into operation, and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of the State until altered or repealed by the Legislature. All civil and criminal suits and proceedings pending in the former circuit courts of this State, shall remain and be proceeded in before the circuit courts of the counties in which they were pending.

County Courts

22. There shall be in each county of the State a county court, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such times as may be fixed upon and entered of record by the said court. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said court.

Terms of Office of County Commissioners

23. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for the term of six years, except at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise, in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for the term of two years. one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years. But no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. And if two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president, and each shall receive two dollars per day for his services in court, to be paid out of the county treasury.

Powers of County Courts

24. The county courts, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall have jurisdiction in all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings, ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: Provided, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. They shall in all cases of contest judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such courts may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. And provision may be made under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, for the probate of wills, and for the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators during the recess of the regular sessions of the county court. Such tribunals as have been heretofore established by the Legislature under, and by virtue of the thirty-fourth section of the eighth article of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, for police and fiscal purposes, shall, until otherwise provided by law, remain and continue as at present constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established, and shall be and act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of the county court created by this article until otherwise provided by law. And, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in the twenty-sixth section of this article, shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties heretofore conferred on, or required of, any court or tribunal established for judicial purposes under the said article and section of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, or the clerk of such court or tribunal respectively, respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record, matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices.

Removal of Causes

25. All actions, suits and proceedings not embraced in the next preceding section, pending in a county court when this article takes effect, together with the records and papers pertaining thereto, as well as all records and papers pertaining to such actions, suits and proceedings, as have already been disposed of by said courts, shall be transmitted to and filed with the clerk of the circuit court of the county, to which office all process outstanding at the time this article goes into operation shall be returned; and said clerk shall have the same power and shall perform the same duties in relation to such records, papers and proceedings as were vested in and required of the clerk of the county court on the day before this article shall take effect. All such actions, suits and proceedings so pending as aforesaid, shall be docketed, proceeded in tried, heard and determined in all respects by the circuit court, as if such suits and proceedings had originated in said court.

Clerk of County Court

26. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county court, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be prescribed by law. But the clerks of said courts, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Districting of County-Election of Justices of the Peace

27. Each county shall be laid off into districts, not less than three nor more than ten in number, and as nearly equal as may be in territory and population. There shall be elected in each district containing a population not exceeding twelve hundred, one justice of the peace, and if the population exceeds that number, two such justices shall be elected therein. Every justice shall reside in the district for which he was elected and hold his office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law. The districts as they now exist shall remain till changed by the county court.

Jurisdiction of Justice of the Peace

28. The civil jurisdiction of a justice of the peace shall extend to actions of assumpsit, debt, detinue and trover, if the amount claimed, exclusive of interest, does not exceed three hundred dollars. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend throughout their county; they shall be conservators of the peace and have such jurisdiction and powers in criminal cases as may be prescribed by law. And justices of the peace shall have authority to take the acknowledgment of deeds and other writings, administer oaths, and take and certify depositions. And the Legislature may give to justices such additional civil jurisdiction and powers within their respective counties as may be deemed

expedient, under such regulations and restrictions as may be prescribed by general law, except that in suits to recover money or damages, their jurisdiction and powers shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars. Appeals shall be allowed from judgments of justices of the peace in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Reformation of County Courts

29. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county court established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county court created by this article; and in such case all the provisions of this article in relation to the county court shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said court. And when such tribunal has been established it shall continue to act in lieu of the county court until otherwise provided by law.

County Court to Fill Vacancies

30. The office of commissioner and justice of the peace, shall be deemed incompatible. Vacancies in the office of commissioner, clerk of the county court and justices of the peace, shall be filled by the county court of the county until the next general election.

ARTICLE IX

County Organization

1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

Constables, Coroners and Overseers of the Poor

2. There shall also be elected in each district, of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout their county. The assessor shall, with the advice and consent of the county court, have the power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor, and surveyors of roads shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

Sheriffs-Consecutive Terms Prohibited

3. The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff, nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor; nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.

Malfeasance and Misfeasance in Office

4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malfeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty and upon conviction thereof, their offices shall become vacant.

Commissioning of Officers Not Otherwise Provided for in Constitution

5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in this Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

Compensation—Deputies

6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

Conservators of the Peace

7. The president of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

Formation of New Counties

8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an area of less than four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand; nor shall any county from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county and voting on the question.

ARTICLE X

Taxation and Finance

1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including live stock, while owned by the producer, and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or bona fide tenants, one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other such property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the Legislature shall further provide by general law for increasing the maximum rates authorized to be fixed by the different levying bodies upon all classes of property by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty percent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty percent the maximum rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the Legislature among the levying units of the State in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including live stock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have authority to tax

privileges, franchises and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time, and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the Legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the State now existing.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "Taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property, from which a tax may be collected, shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; but property be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries and public property may, by law, be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have power to tax, by uniform and equal laws, all privileges and franchises of persons and corporations."

The amendment as above set forth was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted August 6, 1932 (Acts Ex. Sess., 1932, p. 16) and was ratified at the general election in 1932. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 335,482; against ratification, 43,931; majority, 291,551.]

Capitation Tax

2. The Legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each male inhabitant of the State who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools. Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from this tax.

Receipts and Expenditures of Public Monies

3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the Auditor; nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public monies shall be published annually.

Limitation on Contracting of State Debt

4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State; to suppress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

Power of Taxation

5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the State debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State, but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

Credit of State Not to Be Granted in Certain Cases

6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.

Duties of County Authorities in Assessing Taxes

7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per one hundred dollars valuation except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

Bonded Indebtedness of Counties, Etc.

8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years: Provided, That no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

Municipal Taxes to Be Uniform

9. The Legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

ARTICLE XI

Corporations

1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: *Provided*, That nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio River by the line of the James River, Greenbrier, New River and Great Kanawha.

Corporate Liability for Indebtedness

2. The stockholders of all corporations and joint stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

Exclusive Privileges Prohibited

3. All existing charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatever: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any bona fide contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this State.

Rights of Stockholders

4. The Legislature shall provide by law that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him. for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock, shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

Street Railroads

5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

Banks

6. The Legislature may provide by general law for the creation, organization, and regulation of banking institutions.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "The Legislature may [This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "The Legislature may provide, by general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stock held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while they are such stockholders."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 16, 1937, (Acts 1937, p. 581), and was ratified at the general election in 1938. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 139,985; against ratification, 62,241; majority, 77,744.]

Railroads

7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the condition of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by suitable penalties the provisions of this section.

Rolling Stock Considered Personal Property

8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any railroad company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

Railroads, Public Highways

9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall, from time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freights, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discrimination between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

Stations to Be Established

10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accommodation of the trade and travel of said town or village.

Competing Lines—Legislative Permission

11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

Right of Eminent Domain

12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized, and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

ARTICLE XII

Education

1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

State Superintendent of Free Schools

2. The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall have a general supervision of free schools, and perform such other duties in relation thereto as may be prescribed by law. If in the performance of any such duty imposed upon him by the Legislature he shall incur any expenses, he shall be reimbursed therefor: *Provided*, The amount does not exceed five hundred dollars in any one year.

County Superintendents

3. The Legislature may provide for county superintendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

Existing Permanent and Invested School Fund

4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accruing to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands; and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the State of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this State's just share of the literary fund of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the State of Virginia for educational purposcs; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir; and of all escheated lands; the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporation; all monies that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called the "School Fund," and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities can not be obtained, then said "School Fund" shall be invested in such other solvent, interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the Governor, Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor and Treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "Board of the School Fund," to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of a fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "School Fund": Provided, That all the taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[This section is modified by the "Irreducible School Fund Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

Support for Free Schools

5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "School Fund," the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof; the State capitation tax, and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

School Districts

6. The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law.

Levies for School Purposes

7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector, who shall make annual settlements with the county court, which tettlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Mixed Schools Prohibited

8. White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school.

Certain Acts Prohibited

9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under State control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or profits of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented, by such person.

Creation of Independent Free School Districts

10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

Appropriation for State Normal Schools

11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any State normal school, or branch thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

Legislature to Foster General School Improvements

12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvement; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provision for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

ARTICLE XIII

Land Titles

1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

Land Entry Prohibited

2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

Forfeited Lands

3. All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited, waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said States at sales made for the non-payment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has, or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color or claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the State taxes thereon for any five years during such possession; or if there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865; and have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.

Waste and Unappropriated Lands

4. All lands in this State, waste and unappropriated, or heretofore or hereafter for any cause forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released, transferred or otherwise disposed of, the title whereto shall remain in this State till such sale as is hereinafter mentioned, be made, shall by proceedings in the circuit court of the county in which the lands, or a part thereof, are situated, be sold to the highest bidder.

Former Owner's Privilege

5. The former owner of any such land shall be entitled to receive the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable thereon, since the formation of this State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the costs of the proceedings, if his claim be filed in the circuit court that decrees the sale within two years thereafter.

Land Books-Taxes

6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or of an undivided interest therein, to have such land, or such undivided interest therein entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with taxes legally levied thereon and pay the same. When, for any five successive years, the owner of any tract of land, or undivided interest therein, shall not have been charged on such land books with State, county and district taxes thereon, then, by operation hereof, the land, or undivided interest therein, shall be forfeited and title vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner of such land, or of any undivided interest therein, shall have been charged with State, county, and district taxes on any part of such land, such part thereof, or undivided interest therein, shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein, at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest, charged on such land books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein, for the year one thousand eight hundred sixty-three, and every year thereafter, with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum, and pay all taxes and interest thereon for such years, and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: Provided, That such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "It shall be the duty of every owner of land to have it entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with the taxes thereon, and pay the same. When for any five successive years after which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with the taxes thereon, and pay the same. When for any five successive years after the year 1869, the owner of any tract of land containing one thousand acres or more, shall not have been charged on such books with State tax on said land, then by operation hereof, the land shall be forfeited and the title thereto vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner shall have been charged with State tax on any part of the land, such part thereof shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest charged on such books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein for the year 1863, and every year thereafter with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum; and pay all taxes and interest thereon for all such years and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: *Provided*, Such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 4, adopted January 22, 1934 (Acts Second Ex. Sess. 1933, p. 583) and was ratified at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 257,090; against ratification, 177,796; majority, 79,294.]

ARTICLE XIV

Amendments

1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of a law, passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each House of the Legislature and providing that polls be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of

calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention until at least one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

How Amendments Are Made

2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either House of the Legislature; and if the same, being read on three several days in each House be agreed to on its third reading, by two-thirds of the members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays thereon, shall be entered on the Journals, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law, for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. And if a majority of the qualified voters, voting upon the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as a part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The Judicial Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1901, p. 462). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 54,676; against ratification, 24,710; majority, 29,966.]

The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five, and the Governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five. The judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals and of the circuit court shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

The Irreducible School Fund Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 28 (Acts 1901, p. 465). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,694; against ratification, 24,763; majority, 31,931.]

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this amendment, and all money to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest on said fund, shall be used for the support of the free schools of this State. All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provisions of said section four, to the credit of the school fund shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1920

[Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1919, p. 502). Ratified November 2, 1920. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 248,689; against ratification, 130,569; majority, 118,120.]

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the State, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1928

[Proposed by House Joint Resolutions No. 17 (Acts 1927, p. 361). Ratified November 6, 1928. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 360,597; against ratification, 92,885; majority, 267,712.]

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing or for assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Prohibition amendment, prohibiting forever the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors within the State. Rejected. Vote for, 41,668; against, 76,555.

Legislative amendment, providing that no session of the Legislature should continue longer than sixty days without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each House. Rejected. Vote for, 30,445; against, 79,631.

1902

Registration law amendment, providing for the enactment of registration laws by the Legislature. Adopted. Vote for, 55,196; against, 25,379.

Executive Department amendment, providing for the election and qualification of a Secretary of State. Adopted. Vote for 59,509; against, 22,022.

Salary amendment, providing for the payment of such salaries to officials as may be established by law. Adopted. Vote for, 56,280; against, 23,513.

Judicial amendment, providing that the Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges, who shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law. Adopted. Vote for, 54,676; against, 24,710.

Irreducible school fund amendment, relating to the permanent and invested school fund. Adopted. Vote for, 56,694; against, 24,763.

1908

Qualification amendment, eliminating appointive officials from the provisions of section 4, Article IV of the Constitution. Rejected. Vote for, 39,162; against, 40,626

Salary increase amendment, providing for an increase in compensation for county commissioners. Rejected. Vote for, 31,059; against, 51,445.

1910

Qualification amendment, providing for the appointment of female citizens to certain offices within the State. Rejected. Vote for, 44,168; against, 45,044.

Supreme Court amendment, increasing the number of Supreme Court judges to seven. Rejected. Vote for, 36,427; against, 52,578.

1912

Prohibition amendment, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating, malt, vinous or spirituous liquors. Adopted. Vote for, 164,945; against, 72,603.

1916

County court amendment, providing for increase in compensation for county commissioners. Rejected. Vote for, 80,674; against, 130,023.

1918

Budget amendment, providing for adoption of a budget system. Adopted. Vote for, 51,405; against, 26,651.

1920

Good roads amendment, providing for a fifty million dollar bond issue for the construction and maintenance of good roads. Adopted. Vote for, 248,689; against, 130,569.

1922

Legislative amendment, providing for a split session of the Legislature, and for payment to each member of five hundred dollars per annum. Adopted. Vote for, 160,929; against, 122,744.

1926

Budget amendment, providing for amendment to section 51 of Article VI. Rejected. Vote for, 126,125; against, 134,842.

Property qualification amendment, providing for collection of taxes on money, notes, accounts receivable, and bonds, at a rate not to exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars actual value. Rejected. Vote for, 111,927; against, 159,653.

1928

Good roads amendment, providing for a bond issue of thirty-five million dollars for the construction of good roads. Adopted. Vote for, 360,597; against, 92,885.

Legislative amendment, providing for a legislative session of sixty days. Adopted. Vote for, 275,374; against, 85,123.

1930

Lieutenant-governor amendment, providing for the election of a lieutenant-governor. Rejected. Vote for, 48,781; against, 172,703.

Probate commissioner amendment, providing for the appointment of a probate commissioner in each county. Rejected. Vote for, 50,674; against, 173,447.

Budget amendment, providing for an amendment to section 51, Article VI. Rejected. Vote for, 50,226; against, 171,464.

Circuit Court amendment, providing for the division of the State into circuits by the Legislature. Rejected. Vote for, 49,902; against, 170,220.

1932

Tax limitation amendment, providing for the classification of property for taxation purposes. Adopted. Vote for, 335,482; against, 43,931.

1934

Prohibition amendment, providing for the repeal of the prohibition amendment. Adopted. Vote for, 276,978; against, 237,559.

Capitation tax amendment, providing that the payment of capitation tax may be made a qualification for voting in elections. Rejected. Vote for, 124,232; against, 313,330.

Lame duck amendment, providing that terms of the Governor and other members of the Executive Department shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. Adopted. Vote for, 251,965; against, 145,787.

Land book assessment amendment, providing for the separate assessment of individual interests in lands. Adopted. Vote for, 257,090; against, 177,796.

1936

Garnishee amendment, providing for the garnishment of wages of officers, agents, or employees of the State, including any subdivision thereof and municipality therein. Adopted. Vote for, 161,386; against, 61,472.

Municipal home rule amendment, providing uniform law for incorporation of municipalities with population in excess of two thousand, and for amendment of existing charters by municipal corporations. Adopted. Vote for, 150,370; against, 59,580.

1938

Banking institutions amendment, providing for the creation, organization and regulation of banking institutions. Adopted. Vote for, 139,985; against, 62,241.

1940

Judiciary amendment, providing for the establishment by the Legislature of a summary court in each county in the State. Rejected. Vote for, 133,256; against, 300,979.


Elective Officers amendment, providing for the election of Governor, Auditor and Attorney General and for appointment by the Governor of the heads of such executive departments as may be established by law. Rejected. Vote for, 86,402; against, 311,096.

Budget bill amendment, relating to the biennial budget bill. Rejected. Vote for, 95,094; against, 298,333.

1942

Good Roads amendment, limiting the use of all revenue derived from motor vehicles and motor fuels to road purposes. Adopted. Vote for, 228,828; against, 38,651.

WEST VIRGINIA CHILDREN'S HOME

Elkins

Superintendent: Dee B. Gainer. Assistant Superintendent and Secretary: Murtle C. Gainer. Inmates: 75.

West Virginia Children's Home, located in the City of Elkins, was established by an act of the Legislature and constructed at a cost of \$20,000. Formally opened in 1911. In 1935, \$68,500 was appropriated for the second unit. Formerly served as a home for mentally retarded girls, but now serves as home for orphans and neglected children, both boys and girls, from the age of six to fourteen years. Erected on a 20-acre tract, the institution owns a total of 147 acres. All meat, milk, vegetables and poultry consumed in the home are raised on the farms. The children receive regular schooling, religious and occupational training.

WEST VIRGINIA COLORED CHILDREN'S HOME

Huntington

Superintendent: Marsden W. Cabell, Sr., (acting in absence of C. Shelby Martin, now in military service). Financial Secretary: Arminta Miller. Inmates: 44.

West Virginia Colored Children's Home, located in the City of Huntington, was incorporated in 1900 as West Virginia Normal and Industrial School for Colored Orphans. Purchased by the State in 1911 at which time name was changed to West Virginia Colored Orphans' Home. The name was later changed to West Virginia Colored Children's Home. For some years the institution was supported by private contributions raised by the general manager and friends and by income from the boarding hall and farm. In 1903 the Legislature made a yearly appropriation of \$1,500 and in 1910 this was raised to \$3,000. The purpose of this institution is to provide for colored orphans under the age of 16 and such other children of like age that may be surrendered by their parents in case the latter be invalid, to be kept, maintained, educated and trained until they can be placed in foster homes. The operating program of this institution provides for the total development of the total child to effective citizenship. Provisions have been made for pupils in the institution completing high school work to attend West Virginia State College or Bluefield State College.

WEST VIRGINIA HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED MEN AND WOMEN

(Formerly McKendree Emergency Hospital)

McKendree

Superintendent: G. A. Banks, M. D. Acting Secretary: I. M. D. Thornhill. Patients: 80.

The West Virginia Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Men and Women, now located at McKendree in Fayette County, three and a half miles north of Prince and 15 miles north of Beckley, on the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, was established by an act of the Legislature in 1923. The institution was established in Charleston and in December 1928 was moved to Huntington. Overcrowded conditions and other reasons made it necessary to move the institution again, and on September 13, 1941, it was moved to McKendree, and is now occupying the

buildings and grounds of what formerly was McKendree Emergency Hospital. There is sufficient accommodation for 90 inmates. Purpose is to furnish home and comfort for unfortunate old people. Religious and social programs are provided and those physically able are given odd jobs in and around the institution. The home is maintained by the State, with each county paying a monthly fee for each person it sends to the home.

WEST VIRGINIA TRAINING SCHOOL

St. Marys

Superintendent: O. L. Quillen, M. D. Financial Secretary: Ralph Higgins. Inmates: 120, (100 on waiting list).

West Virginia Training School, located three miles north of St. Marys on State Route 2, was established in 1921 by an act of the Legislature. The farm contains 694 acres and is an ideal location for the institution. The purpose of the institution is the treatment, training and readjustment of mentally defective children. Because of the limited capacity of the institution, admissions are restricted to boys between the ages of 7 to 14, inclusive.

In the last year, 40 female inmates from the West Virginia Children's Home have been moved to this institution. In order to take care of the additional inmates it was necessary to completely remodel the large mansion house on the grounds into a 40-bed dormitory complete. The institution is now divided into a male and female unit. The boys and girls are completely separated from each other.

CORRECTIONAL

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL HOME FOR GIRLS

Industrial

Superintendent: Mrs. Ava Stanard. Financial Secretary: Bliss Yerkey. Enrollment: 224.

West Virginia Industrial Home for Girls is located two miles west of Salem. on U. S. Route 50, and is served by the main line of the B. & O. Railroad. It was established by an act of the Legislature on February 18, 1897, and formally opened May 5, 1899. It is built on a 73-acre tract of which 38 acres were donated by the citizens of Salem in 1897. From Jones Cottage, the first building, the plant has grown to include the following: McCullough Cottage, built in 1905; Silver Hall, opened in 1914; Sutton Cottage, opened in 1928, and in 1942 an administration building and dormitory named "Ava Stanard Dormitory" in honor of the superintendent. Girls in the school receive standard elementary and high school training, religious and vocational education. Starting with one graduate in 1937, to date 76 girls have graduated from high school. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt attended this year's graduation. In their workshops are made the sheets and pillow cases for all State institutions. Among courses offered are commercial work, dress-making, art, music, journalism, home economics, physical education, library science, beauty culture and weaving. Domestic training is most thorough. The school has its own clinic. In recent years a major improvement has been inauguration of a program of constructive discipline in place of corrective discipline. Locks and bars have been removed; the recreational program has been broadened; and a parole program made more efficient and workable by inclusion of the new dormitory in which parole eligibles are segregated and given intensified training.

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL HOME FOR COLORED GIRLS Huntington

Superintendent: Mary E. Brooks. Financial Secretary: Magnolia Hill. Inmates: 26

West Virginia Industrial Home for Colored Girls, located near the City of Huntington, off Route 60, was established by an Act of the Legislature of 1921, and was opened on March 11, 1926. The main plant consists of a three-story brick fireproof building, erected at a cost of \$95,000, built on a 15-acre tract and will accommodate, uncrowded, an average of 32 persons.

The standard elementary course as provided by the school department is available to all, and some have continued the high school courses.

The present program provides utilitarian training planned to meet the future needs of the individual girl. Marked interest by the girls is manifest in the following: music, sewing, hand-craft and needlework. Practical discipline and a spirit of fair play permeates all activities of the school.

Improvements of the grounds and buildings have been utilized to the fullest degree. The rudiments of good housekeeping find a fixed place in the weekly routine; cleaning, laundry, sewing, cooking, etc. The outside training program includes the care of the grounds, poultry houses, barn and chickens. While the canning season is considered one of the most interesting and well liked seasons of all. A well planned recreational program is in use at all times as a stimulus to both physical and mental health, and contributes much in the development of a normal, well balanced life in the home and community.

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR BOYS

Pruntytown

Superintendent: Robert H. Mollohan. Financial Secretary: Rufus L. Yost, Enrollment: 230.

West Virginia Industrial School for Boys is located at Pruntytown, two miles west of Grafton, on U. S. Route 50. It was established by an act of Legislature in 1889 and was formally opened July 21st, 1891. In addition to the principal school buildings which are located on the main campus, consisting of approximately fifty acres, the school owns and operates a farm of approximately 1,900 acres on which there are located numerous modern farm buildings. The boys are given training in vocational trades in addition to the regular academic schooling. In 1941 a well equipped elementary school, operated on State-approved standards, was established with the cooperation of the State Department of Education and the College of Education of West Virginia University. Beginning with the school year 1942 a junior high school was established. A well planned recreation and physical education program has been placed in operation. Put into effect in 1941 is a social service department which classifies each boy upon his commitment, presents him for parole, and maintains liaison between County and State authorities throughout the State. A separate cottage for segregating the small boys of the Institution is being provided.

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR COLORED BOYS Lakin

Superintendent: S. Brady Briggs. Enrollment: 95.

West Virginia Industrial School for Colored Boys, located ten miles north of Point Pleasant on State Route 62, was established in 1921 by an act of the Legislature. It is a correctional institution for delinquent Negro boys. Work activi-

ties are centered on the 1,272-acre farm which furnishes a greater part of the school's food and also the food used at Lakin State Hospital. Average enrollment is 100.

PENAL

WEST VIRGINIA PENITENTIARY

Moundsville

Warden: M. E. Ketchum. Financial Secretary: Lillian R. Yost. Inmates: 1,330. Prisoners assigned to road camps and other institutions: 751.

West Virginia Penitentiary, located in the City of Moundsville just off State Route 2, was established in 1866 by an act of the Legislature. The Penitentiary itself is a six-acre enclosure on a ten-acre tract of land surrounded by a solid wall of hand-cut sandstone, 675 by 395 feet, 24 feet high, 7 feet wide at base tapering to 28 inches at top, on which is a stone walk-way 42 inches wide. For several years the prison has been badly overcrowded, but development of Medium Security Prison, at Huttonsville, and construction of new unit at Moundsville now are relieving this congestion. Aimed at reducing the hazards of involuntary idleness several small prison industries are being developed through authority of the 1939 Legislature. These shops are now making commodities for which there is a constant demand in the prison and other state institutions. None of items produced is being sold on open market. Also contributing greatly to relief of congestion and idleness is utiliation of prisoners on road construction projects.

MEDIUM SECURITY PRISON

Huttonsville

Deputy Warden: John B. McGhee. Financial Secretary: C. L. Ferrell. In-mates: 360.

The Medium Security Prison, located at Huttonsville, 18 miles south of Elkins, on U. S. Route 219 and 250, was established by an act of the Legislature in 1937. Designed to relieve overcrowding at the State Penitentiary and to aid in the rehabilitation of prisoners. The inmates are given duties to keep them occupied and an honor system under which freedom of movement is dependent upon good behavior. All prisoners are housed in modernly equipped dormitories in which there are no cells. Each dormitory is equipped with showers, a recreation room and a private reading room. There is also a library for the use of all, and an auditorium with complete stage equipment, seating 715 people. There are church services every Sunday night and a picture show once a week. It is located on a 3,000-acre farm, which consists of 1,950 acres of timber, 670 acres cultivated, 375-acres pasture, and 5 acres swamp.

The farm now produces approximately \$90,000 worth of vegetables, fruits, beef, poultry, pork, hay, corn, wheat and other farm products. Has 600 head of cows, calves and beef cattle, 512 hogs and shoats, 21 head of horses and mules, and 2400 chickens.

Value of feed raised on farm and mostly consumed by live stock, \$46,000.00. Vegetables, milk, eggs, pork and beef produced and consumed at Institution, \$20,126.00. Stock and vegetables sold to other State institutions, \$22,734.00. The Medium Security Prison is deemed a part of the Penitentiary, and all provisions of law applicable to the Penitentiary are in effect except that criminal proceedings against inmates of the institution are brought in the Circuit Court of Randolph County.

HOSPITALS AND SANITARIUMS BERKELEY SPRINGS SANITARIUM

Berkeley Springs

Berkeley Springs Sanitarium is located in the City of Berkeley Springs. It offers baths and swimming pools which utilize the warm and medicinal waters of Berkeley Springs. Histories of colonists mentioned the qualities of the water as early as 1736. The 1939 Legislature authorized the Board of Control to lease this institution and grounds to private interests to encourage restoration of the spa to the position of national importance that it held from the time of President Washington until the Civil War. The temperature of the spring water is 74.3 degrees and is invariable, and is said to be helpful in the treatment of rheumatism, gout, diabetes, and skin diseases. The sanitarium has no facilities for housing patients, but for those who visit Berkeley Springs for baths, there are adequate hotel and boarding house facilities.

DENMAR SANITARIUM

(Negro Tuberculosis)

Denmar

Superintendent: J. H. Nelson, Jr., M. D. Financial Secretary: M. J. Roane. Patients: 123.

Denmar Sanitarium, located approximately 15 miles south of Marlinton, five miles off U. S. Route 219 in Pocahontas County, was established by an act of the Legislature in 1917 for the care and treatment of persons of the Negro race afflicted with tuberculosis. The hospital is healthfully situated on a 185-acre tract of land at about 2,200 feet above sea level on an eminence overlooking the Greenbrier River in the Allegheny Mountains.

FAIRMONT EMERGENCY HOSPITAL

(Surgical)

Fairmont

Superintendent: Chesney M. Ramage, M. D., F. A. C. S. Financial Secretary: Rae Carroll. Patients: 55.

Fairmont Emergency Hospital was established in 1899 for the purpose of treating, free of charge, persons injured at their usual occupations. The hospital accepts surgical and maternity pay cases and is the surgical clinic for the Industrial School for Boys at Pruntytown, the Industrial School for Girls at Salem, the West Virginia Training School at St. Marys, the Industrial School for Colored Boys at Lakin, and the Children's Home at Elkins, as well as all other cases from the various State Institutions needing hospitalization and surgery. No charge whatever is made for these cases. The work of the current year at regular hospital prices represents more than the total cost of the operation of this institution. The purpose of the institution at present, as outlined by the West Virginia Board of Control, is rapid service surgical rehabilitation. The hospital is fully approved by the American College of Surgeons and maintains a training school for nurses.

HOPEMONT SANITARIUM

(Tuberculosis)

Hopemont

Superintendent: David Salkin, M. D. Financial Secretary: J. W. H. Browning. Patients: 475.

Hopemont Sanitarium, located on State Route 7 at Hopemont in Preston County, was established in 1911 by an act of the Legislature. It is a hospital for the treat-

ment of pulmonary tuberculosis. The institution consists of five hospital buildings, six cottages, recreation hall, seven residences, laundry, main dining hall, apartment house for staff physicians, post office, nurses home, and a 600-acre tract of land. The hospital is affiliated with the school of medicine of West Virginia University and is approved by the medical council on education of the American Medical Association and by the American College of Surgeons.

HUNTINGTON STATE HOSPITAL

(Insane)

Huntington

Superintendent: C. T. Taylor, M. D. Financial Secretary: Homer E. Peyton. Patients: 941.

Huntington State Hospital, located in the City of Huntington, was established in 1897 by an act of the Legislature as Home for Incurables. The institution's name was changed in 1901 to West Virginia Asylum and in 1916 to Huntington State Hospital. The hospital is devoted to the care and treatment of nervous and mental diseases, and has received provisional recognition by the American College of Surgeons for its care of the insane, the epileptic, and the mental defective persons in West Virginia.

The plant is comprised of seven buildings for patients, an office building quarters for employees, residence for the superintendent, main kitchen, shops, power house, laundry and a recreational building, totaling 14 main structures. In addition there are four small utility buildings. The clinic building, which offers accommondations to voluntary patients who are in need of neuro-psychiatric care, is well equipped with facilities for examination and treatment, including laboratory, X-ray, operating room, dental office and special rooms devoted to physiotherapy of various types. The prevailing methods of treatment are regularly employed. The grounds, 35 acres in extent, are well shaded by several hundred virgin trees with numerous shrubs and recent plantings.

The hospital farm, which consists of 698 acres, is located on the Guyandotte-River a mile southeast of Barboursville and is served by State Route No. 10. Thirty-two structures, including residences, barracks for working patients, barns, storage houses, chicken houses, shops and many utility buildings have been provided on the farm.

LAKIN STATE HOSPITAL

Lakin

Superintendent: Dr. E. L. Youngue. Financial Secretary: B. G. Womack. Patients: 397.

Lakin State Hospital is located at Lakin in Mason County, approximately 10 miles north of Point Pleasant on State Route 62. It is a mental hospital for the care of Negro patients. It serves as a clearing house for the West Virginia Industrial School for Colored Boys, Industrial Home for Colored Girls, Colored Children's Home, Home for Agcd and Infirm Colored Men and Women and the Schools for Deaf and Blind. Patients are thoroughly examined, physically and mentally, and treated by drugs and baths of different varieties. Occupational and recreational therapies are practiced. Correctional surgery has been recently instituted along with several other improvements on buildings and grounds. Pay and charity patients are admitted for treatment. The hospital is recognized by the American College of Surgeons, West Virginia State Hospital Association, National Medical Association, American Medical Association and American Hospital Association.

PINECREST SANITARIUM

(Tuberculosis)

Beckley

Superintendent: E. H. Hedrick, M. D. Financial Secretary: George W. Ballard. Pinecrest Sanitarium, located in Raleigh County at Beckley, was authorized by an act of the Legislature in 1927 and formally opened March 18th, 1930. At that time the sanitarium was known as Rutherford Sanitarium but at the session of the 1934 Legislature was changed to Pinecrest Sanitarium.

Pinecrest Sanitarium is located just outside the city limits of Beckley on Federal Routes 19-21 and State Highway 3-41 with hourly bus service connecting with the city and the Atlantic Greyhound bus lines, also with the C. & O. Railway in Beckley and Prince, West Virginia.

The sanitarium has a fifty-acre campus, and a 250-acre farm, which is modernly equipped for farming, and a dairy herd of 140 Guernsey cows supplying milk for the institution, also a large number of hogs supply pork and pork products all consumed by the institution.

Pinecrest Sanitarium is composed of four modern fireproof units all connected under one roof, with 665 beds for patients, a modern fireproof nurses home, 4 modern dwellings for staff physicians, 7 cottages for employees, a central heating plant, dairy barn, hog barn, laundry and numerous outside buildings.

The hospital is approved by the Medical Council on Education of the American Medical Association and the American College of Surgeons.

Various departments of the hospital fulfill the standard requirements of these organizations.

Patients admitted to Pinecrest Sanitarium are assigned to individual physicians who carry out therapeutic procedures that are recommended by the entire staff. In this manner, the patient is given the benefit of consultation by the entire medical staff.

The Pinecrest Staff is composed of a Superintendent, Medical Director, five full time physicians, one X-ray technician and two laboratory technicians, with ample office employees.

The ambulatory patients have the privilege of being entertained in the modern auditorium, to moving pictures and plays produced by local talent. They also take their meals cafeteria in a spacious dining room.

The Sanitarium is modern in every respect, with the most modern equipment available for the treatment of tuberculosis.

SPENCER STATE HOSPITAL

(Insane)

Spencer

The Spencer State Hospital, located in the City of Spencer, was authorized by an act of the Legislature May 7, 1887, and formally opened July 18, 1893. The original appropriation was \$59,839.70 for the grounds and the first buildings. It was designated as the Second Hospital for the Insane. Gradual enlargements by construction of new buildings and wings have been carried out and within the past few years the program has included a 55-bed Hospital Clinic built at the cost of \$147,000.

Limited therapeutic and surgical facilities are available for patients. In addition to patients committed by the State, pay patients are admitted and treated on a voluntary basis or they may be committed as meets the wishes of the family. The institution is a member of the West Virginia Hospital Association.

WELCH EMERGENCY HOSPITAL

Welch

Welch Emergency Hospital, located in the City of Welch, was established in 1899, on a three-acre tract given to the State by J. J. Sperry for this purpose. Its particular service was to miners in that region, but now takes care of a large part of the charity cases of Southern West Virginia. No improvements have been made for several years due to war conditions, but some are anticipated in the near future. An accredited training school for nurses has been maintained in connection with the hospital since 1914, but was discontinued January 1, 1944.

WESTON STATE HOSPITAL

(Mental)

Weston

Superintendent: Harry A. Garrison, M. D. Clinical Director: H. O. Van Tromp, M. D. Financial Secretary: M. R. Haymond. Patients: 1,770.

Weston State Hospital, located in the City of Weston, is West Virginia's oldest State Institution, and the only public building in Western Virginia authorized by the Virginia Assembly. Establishment of the institution, to have been known as the Trans-Alleghany Lunatic Asylum, was authorized March 22, 1858, by an act of the Virginia Assembly which appropriated \$25,000 for the purchase of land and materials. Delayed by the outbreak of the Civil War, the hospital was not opened until November 12, 1864.

The hospital and its outlying farms occupy more than 500 acres of ground in Lewis County. Substantial improvements have been made in the past few years with buildings, fireproofing the North Wing, new equipment, new laundry, and the addition of a psychiatric unit. As an addition to the hospital, the State has purchased one of the finest Jersey herds in the State.

The hospital holds a grade A rating with the American Hospital Association and the West Virginia Hospital Association, and Member of the American College of Surgeons.

The new psychiatric unit, opened in 1942, is the result of exhaustive study and consultation with some of the nation's foremost psychiatrists. It is believed to be the first of its kind in the country to include under one roof all of the essential facilities for the rehabilitation of mental patients. It is designed to give patients a feeling of freedom, to develop good living habits, to administer many different treatments and to provide occupational therapy.

WESTON STATE HOSPITAL

Barboursville Unit

(Mental)

Barboursville

Superintendent: Dr. L. C. Richmond. Assistant Superintendent: Mrs. Virginia Comstock. Financial Secretary: Charles E. Evans. Patients: 302.

The Barboursville Unit of Weston State Hospital, located at Barboursville, and reached by Route 60, was opened January 20, 1942, to meet an urgent demand for hospitalization of mentally defective people being kept in county jails because of overcrowded conditions at Weston. On August 1, the hospital was practically filled to its capacity, with a total of 270 patients. The State in 1941 purchased the two buildings which formerly housed Morris Harvey College, and patients have been moved into the hospital as quickly as each section has been reconditioned and equipped. The Barboursville Unit is termed an institution for custodial care of mental defectives.

The University maintains the following schools and colleges: A graduate school; college of arts and sciences; college of education; college of law; college of engineering, offering courses leading to degrees in civil, electrical, mechanical, and chemical engineering, and in industrial education; college of agriculture, including a division of home economics and a division of forestry; school of mines; school of medicine (two years); school of music; school of physical education; college of pharmacy; school of journalism; division of military science and tactics; experiment stations; and extension departments. Member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the Association of American Universities.

A new Mineral Industries building was completed in 1942.

March 1, 1943, a contingent of Pre-Flight soldiers, (200), was assigned to this college for special training in academic subjects by members of the faculty, and for military training under Army officers.

The college operates a training school for dental hygienists. Its preprofessional courses in medicine and dentistry are approved by the American Medical Association and the American Dental Association. CLASS I, II AND III CITIES

Under the provisions of Chapter 56, Acts of the Legislature, regular session, 1939, municipal corporations are classified by population as follows: (1) Population in excess of 50,000, Class I city; population more than 10,000 and not more than 50,000, Class II city; and population more than 2,000 and not more than 10,000, Class III city. Municipal corporations not included in these classifications are known as towns or villages.

Transition from one to another class of municipal corporation occurs automatically when the requisite population qualification has been met. Population is determined on the basis of the last preceding census taken under the authority of the Congress of the United States or the Legislature of West Virginia. Census of 1940 is used as basis in determining class of cities listed in Register.



DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL PLATFORM

(Adopted at Chicago, July 20, 1944)

The Democratic Party stands on its record in peace and in war.

To speed victory, establish and maintain peace, guarantee full employment and provide prosperity—this is its platform.

We do not here detail scores of planks. We cite action.

Π

Beginning March, 1933, the Democratic Administration took a series of actions which saved our system of free enterprise.

It brought that system out of collapse and thereafter eliminated abuses which had imperiled it.

It used the powers of Government to provide employment in industry and to save agriculture.

It wrote a new Magna Charta for labor.

It provided social security, including old-age pensions, unemployment insurance, security for crippled and dependent children and the blind. It established employment offices. It provided federal bank deposit insurance, flood prevention, soil conservation and prevented abuses in the security markets. It saved farms and homes from foreclosure and secured profitable prices for farm products.

It adopted an effective program of reclamation, hydro-electric power and mineral development,

It found the road to prosperity through production and employment.

We pledge the continuance and improvement of these programs.

Before war came, the Democratic Administration awakened the nation, in time, to the dangers that threatened its very existence.

It succeeded in building, in time, the best-trained and equipped Army in the world, the most powerful Navy in the world, the greatest Air Force in the world, and the largest merchant marine in the world.

It gained for our country, and it saved for our country, powerful allies.

When war came, it succeeded in working out with those allies an effective grand strategy against the enemy.

It set that strategy in motion, and the tide of battle was turned.

It held the line against war-time inflation.

It insured a fair share-and-share-alike distribution of food and other essentials.

It is leading our country to certain victory.

The primary and imperative duty of the United States is to wage the war with every resource available to final triumph over our enemies, and we pledge that we will continue to fight side by side with the United Nations until this supreme objective shall have been attained and thereafter to secure a just and lasting peace.

Tζ

That the world may not again be drenched in blood by international outlaws and criminals, we pledge:

To join with the other United Nations in the establishment of an international organization based on the principle of the sovereign equality of all peace-loving States, open to membership by all such States, large and small, for the prevention of aggression and the maintenance of international peace and security.

To make all necessary and effective agreements and arrangements through which the nations would maintain adequate forces to meet the needs of preventing war and of making impossible the preparation for war and which would have such forces available for joint action when necessary.

Such organization must be endowed with power to employ armed forces when necessary to prevent aggression and preserve peace.

We favor the maintenance of an international court of justice, of which the United States shall be a member, and the employment of diplomacy, conciliation, arbitration and other like methods, where appropriate, in the settlement of international disputes.

World peace is of transcendent importance. Our gallant sons are dying on land, on sea, and in the air. They do not die as Republicans. They do not die as Democrats. They die as Americans. We pledge that their blood shall not have been shed in vain. America has the opportunity to lead the world in this great service to mankind. The United States must meet the challenge. Under Divine Providence, she must move forward to her high destiny.

V

We pledge our support to the Atlantic Charter and the Four Freedoms and the application of the principles enunciated therein to the United Nations and other peace-loving nations, large and small.

We shall uphold the Good Neighbor policy, and extend the trade policies initiated by the present Administration.

We favor the opening of Palestine to unrestricted Jewish immigration and colonization, and such a policy as to result in the establishment there of a free and democratic Jewish commonwealth.

We favor legislation assuring equal pay for equal work, regardless of sex.

We recommend to Congress the submission of a constitutional amendment on equal rights for women.

We favor federal aid to education, administered by the States without interference by the Federal Government.

We favor federal legislation to assure stability of products, employment, distribution and prices in the bituminous coal industry to create a proper balance between consumer, producer and mine worker.

We endorse the President's statement recognizing the importance of the use of water in arid-land States for domestic and irrigation purposes.

We favor nondiscriminatory transportation charges and declare for the early correction of inequalities in such charges.

We favor enactment of legislation granting the fullest measure of self-government for Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico and eventual statehood for Alaska and Hawaii.

We favor the extension of the right of suffrage to the people of the District of Columbia.

VΤ

We offer these post-war programs:

A continuation of our policy of full benefits for ex-servicemen and women, with special consideration for the disabled. We make it our first duty to assure employment and economic security to all who have served in the defense of our country.

Price guarantees and crop insurance to farmers, with all practical steps.

To keep agriculture on a parity with industry and labor.

To foster the success of the small independent farmer.

To aid the home ownership of family-sized farms.

To extend rural electrification and develop broader domestic and foreign markets for agricultural products.

Adequate compensation for workers during demobilization.

The enactment of such additional humanitarian, labor, social and farmlegislation as time and experience may require, including the amendment or repeal of any law enacted in recent years which has failed to accomplish its nurrose.

Promotion of the success of small business.

Earliest possible release of war-time controls.

Adaptation of tax laws to an expanding peace-time economy, with simplified structure, and war-time taxes reduced or repealed as soon as possible.

Encouragement of risk capital, new enterprise, development of natural resources in the West and other parts of the country and the immediate reopening of the gold and silver mines of the West as soon as manpower is available.

We reassert our faith in competitive private enterprise free from control by monopolies, cartels, or any arbitrary private or public authority.

VII

We assert that mankind believes in the Four Freedoms.

We believe that the country which has the greatest measure of social justice is capable of the greatest achievements.

We believe that racial and religious minorities have the right to live, develop and vote equally with all citizens and share the rights that are guaranteed by our Constitution. Congress should exert its full constitutional powers to protect those rights.

We believe that without loss of sovereignty, world development and lasting peace are within humanity's grasp. They will come with the greater enjoyment of those freedoms by the peoples of the world, and with the freer flow among them of ideas and goods.

We believe in the world right of all men to write, send and publish news at uniform communication rates and without intereference by governmental or private monopoly and that that right should be protected by treaty.

To these beliefs the Democratic Party subscribes.

These principles the Democratic Party pledges itself in solemn sincerity to maintain.

Finally, this convention sends its affectionate greetings to our beloved and matchless leader and President, Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

He stands before the nation and the world, the champion of human liberty and dignity. He has rescued our people from the ravages of economic disaster. His rare foresight and magnificent courage have saved our nation from the assault of international brigands and dictators. Fulfilling the ardent hope of his life, he has already laid the foundation of enduring peace for a troubled world and the well-being of our nation. All mankind is his debtor. His life and services have been a great blessing to humanity.

That God may keep him strong in body and in spirit to carry on his yet unfinished work is our hope and our prayer.

REPUBLICAN NATIONAL PLATFORM

(Adopted at Chicago, June 27, 1944)

The tragedy of the wars is upon our country as we meet to consider the problems of government and our people. We take this opportunity to render homage and enduring gratitude to those brave members of our armed forces who have already made the supreme sacrifice, and to those who stand ready to make the same sacrifice that the American course of life may be secure.

Mindful of this solemn hour and humbly conscious of our heavy responsibilities, the Republican Party in convention assembled presents herewith its principles and makes these covenants with the people of our Nation.

The War and the Peace:

We pledge prosecution of the war to total victory against cur enemies in full co-operation with the United Nations and all-out support of our Armies and the maintenance of our Navy under the competent and trained direction of our General Staff and Office of Naval Operations without civilian interference and with every civilian resource. At the earliest possible time after the cessation of hostilities we will bring home all members of our armed forces who do not have unexpired enlistments and who do not volunteer for further overseas duty.

We declare our relentless aim to win the war against all our enemies: (1) for our own American security and welfare; (2) to make and keep the Axis powers impotent to renew tyranny and attack; (3) for the attainment of peace and freedom based on justice and security.

We shall seek to achieve such aims through organized international cooperation and not by joining a World State.

We favor responsible participation by the United States in post-war cooperative organization among sovereign nations to prevent military aggression and to attain permanent peace with organized justice in a free world.

Such organization should develop effective co-operative means to direct peace forces to prevent or repel military aggression. Pending this, we pledge continuing collaboration with the United Nations to assure these ultimate objectives.

We believe, however, that peace and security do not depend upon the sanction of force alone, but should prevail by virtue of reciprocal interests and spiritual values recognized in these security agreements. The treaties of peace should be just; the nations which are the victims of aggression should be restored to sovereignty and self-government; and the organized co-operation of the nations should concern itself with basic causes of world disorder. It should promote a world opinion to influence the nations to right conduct, develop international law and maintain an international tribunal to deal with justifiable disputes.

We shall seek, in our relations with other nations, conditions calculated to promote world-wide economic stability, not only for the sake of the world, but also to the end that our own people may enjoy a high level of employment in an increasingly prosperous world.

We shall keep the American people informed concerning all agreements with foreign nations. In all of these undertakings we favor the widest consultation of the gallant men and women in our armed forces who have a special right to speak with authority in behalf of the security and liberty for which they fight. We shall sustain the Constitution of the United States in the attainment of our international aims; and pursuant to the Constitution of the United States any treaty or agreement to attain such aims made on behalf of the United States with any other nation or any association of nations, shall be made only by and with the advice and consent of the Senators present concur.

We shall at all times protect the essential interests and resources of the United States.

Western Hemisphere Relations:

We shall develop Pan-American solidarity. The citizens of our neighboring nations in the Western Hemisphere are, like ourselves, Americans. Co-operation with them shall be achieved through mutual agreement and without interference in the internal affairs of any nation. Our policy should be a genuine Good Neighbor policy commanding their respect, and not one based on the reckless squandering of American funds by overlapping agencies.

Postwar Preparedness:

We favor the maintenance of post-war military forces and establishments of ample strength for the successful defense and the safety of the United States, its possessions and outposts, for the maintenance of the Monroe Doctrine, and for meeting any military commitments determined by Congress. We favor the peace time maintenance and strengthening of the National Guards under State control with Federal training and equipment as now provided in the National Defense Act

Domestic Policy:

We shall devote ourselves to re-establishing liberty at home.

We shall adopt a program to put men to work in peace industry as promptly as possible and with special attention to those who have made sacrifice by serving in the armed forces. We shall take government out of competition with private industry and terminate rationing, price fixing and all other emergency powers. We shall promote the fullest stable employment through private enterprise.

The measures we propose shall avoid federalization of government activities, to the end that our States, schools and cities shall be free, shall avoid delegation of legislative and judicial power to administrative agencies, to the end that the people's representatives in Congress shall be independent and in full control of legislative policy; and shall avoid, subject to war necessities, detailed regulation of farmers, workers, businessmen and consumers, to the end that the individual shall be free. The remedies we propose shall be based on intelligent co-operation between the Federal Government, the States and local government and the initiative of civic groups—not on the panacea of federal cash.

Four years more of New Deal policy would centralize all power in the President, and would daily subject every act of every citizen to regulation by his henchmen; and this country could remain a Republic only in name. No problem exists which cannot be solved by American methods. We have no need of either the communistic or the fascist technique.

Security:

Our goal is to prevent hardship and poverty in America. That goal is attainable by reason of the productive ability of free American labor, industry and agriculture, if supplemented by a system of social security on sound principles

We pledge cur support of the following:

- 1. Extension of the existing old-age insurance and unemployment insurance systems to all employees not already covered.
- 2. The return of the public employment-office system to the States at the earliest possible time, financed as before Pearl Harbor.
- 3. A careful study of Federal-State pregrams for maternal and child health, dependent children, and assistance to the blind, with a view to strengthening these programs.
- 4. The continuation of these and other programs relating to health, and the stimulation by Federal aid of State plans to make medical and hospital service available to those in need without disturbing doctor-patient relationships or socializing medicine.
- 5. The stimulation of State and local plans to provide decent low-cost housing properly financed by the Federal Housing Administration, or otherwise, when such housing cannot be supplied or financed by private sources.

Labor:

The Republican Party is the historical champion of free labor. Under Republican administrations American manufacturing developed, and the American workers attained the most progressive standards of living of any workers in the world. Now the Nation owes those workers a debt of gratitude for their magnificent productive effort in support of the war.

Regardless of the professed friendship of the New Deal for the workingman, the fact remains that under the New Deal American economic life is being destroyed.

The New Deal has usurped selfish and partisan control over the functions of Government agencies where labor relationships are concerned. The continued perversion of the Wagner Act by the New Deal menaces the purposes of the law and threatens to destroy collective bargaining completely and permanently.

The long series of executive orders and bureaucratic decrees reveal a deliberate purpose to substitute for contractual agreements of employers and employees the political edicts of a New Deal bureaucracy. Labor would thus remain organized only for the convenience of the New Deal in enforcing its orders and inflicting its whims upon labor and industry.

We condemn the conversion of administrative boards, ostensibly set up to settle industrial disputes, into instruments for putting into effect the financial and economic theories of the New Deal.

We condemn the freezing of wage rates at arbitrary levels and the binding of men to their jobs as destructive to the advancement of a free people. We condemn the repeal by executive order of the laws secured by the Republican Party to abolish "contract labor" and peonage. We condemn the gradual but effective creation of a Labor Front as but one of the New Deal's steps toward a totalitarian state.

We pledge an end to political trickery in the administration of labor laws and the handling of labor disputes; and equal benefits on the basis of equality to all labor in the administration of labor controls and laws, regardless of political affiliation.

The Department of Labor has been emasculated by the New Deal. Labor bureaus, agencies and committees are scattered far and wide, in Washington and throughout the country, and have no semblance of systematic or responsible organization. All governmental labor activities must be placed under the direct authority and responsibility of the Secretary of Labor. Such labor bureaus as are not performing substantial and definite service in the interest of labor must be abolished.

The Secretary of Labor should be a representative of Labor. The office of the Secretary of Labor was created under a Republican President, William Howard Taft. It was intended that a representative of labor should occupy this Cabinet office. The present administration is the first to disregard this intention.

The Republican Party accepts the purposes of the National Labor Relations Act, the Wage and Hour Act, the Social Security Act and all other Federal statutes

Relief and Rehabilitation:

We favor the prompt extension of relief and emergency assistance to the peoples of the liberated countries without duplication and conflict between government agencies.

We favor immediate feeding of the starving children of our Allies and friends in the Nazi dominated countries and we condemn the New Deal administration for its failure, in the face of humanitarian demands, to make any effort to do this.

We favor assistance by direct credits in reasonable amounts to liberated countries to enable them to buy from this country the goods necessary to revive their economic systems.

Bureaucracy:

The National Administration has become a sprawling, overlapping bureaucracy. It is undermined by executive abuse of power, confused lines of authority, duplication of effort, inadequate fiscal controls, loose personnel practices and an attitude of arrogance previously unknown in our history.

The times cry out for the restoration of harmony in government, for a balance of legislative and executive responsibility, for efficiency and economy, for pruning and abolishing unnecessary agencies and personnel, for effective fiscal and personnel controls, and for an entirely new spirit in our Federal government.

We pledge an administration wherein the President, acting in harmony with Congress, will effect these necessary reforms and raise the Federal service to a high level of efficiency and competence.

We insist that limitations must be placed upon spending by government corporations of vast sums never appropriated by Congress but made available by directives, and that their accounts should be subject to audit by the General Accounting Office.

Two Term Limit for President:

We favor an amendment to the Constitution providing that no person shall be President of the United States for more than two terms of four years each.

Equal Rights:

We favor submission by Congress to the States of an amendment to the Constitution providing for equal rights for men and women. We favor job opportunities in the post-war world open to men and women alike without discrimination in rate of pay because of sex.

Veterans:

The Republican Party has always supported suitable measures to reflect the nation's gratitude and to discharge its duty toward the veterans of all wars.

We approve, have supported and have aided in the enactment of laws which provide for re-employment of veterans of this war in their old positions, for mustering-out-pay, for pensions for widows and orphans of such veterans killed or disabled, for rehabilitation of disabled veterans, for temporary unemployment benefits, for education and vocational training, and for assisting veterans in acquiring homes and farms and in establishing themselves in business.

We shall be diligent in remedying defects in veterans legislation and shall insist upon efficient administration of all measures for the veteran's benefit.

Racial and Religious Intolerance:

We unreservedly condemn the injection into American life of appeals to racial or religious prejudice.

We pledge an immediate Congressional inquiry to ascertain the extent to which mistreatment, segregation and discrimination against Negroes who are in our armed forces are impairing morale and efficiency, and the adoption of corrective legislation.

We pledge the establishment by federal legislation of a permanent Fair Employment Practice Commission.

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Anti-Poll Tax:

The payment of any poll tax should not be a condition of voting in federal elections and we favor immediate submission of a Constitutional amendment for its abolition.

Anti-Lynching:

We favor legislation against lynching and pledge our sincere efforts in behalf of its early enactment.

Indians:

We pledge an immediate, just and final settlement of all Indian claims between the Government and the Indian citizenship of the Nation. We will take politics out of the administration of Indian affairs.

Problems of the West:

We favor a comprehensive program of reclamation projects for our arid and semi-arid States, with recognition and full protection of the rights and interests of those States in the use and control of water for present and future irrigation and other beneficial consumptive uses.

We favor (a) exclusion from this country of live stock and fresh and chilled meat from countries harboring foot and mouth disease or Rinderpest; (b) full protection of our fisheries whether by domestic regulation or treaties; (c) consistent with military needs, the prompt return to private ownership of land acquired for war purposes; (d) withdrawal or acquisition of lands for establishment of national parks, monuments and wild life refuges, only after due regard to local problems and under closer controls to be established by the Congress; (e) restoration of the long established public land policy which provides opportunity of ownership by citizens to promote the highest land use; (f) full development of our forests on the basis of cropping and sustained yield; cooperation with private owners for conservation and fire protection; (g) the prompt reopening of mines which can be operated by miners and workers not subject to military service and which have been closed by bureaucratic denial of labor or material; (h) adequate stock-piling of war minerals and metals for possible future emergencies; (i) continuance, for tax purposes, of adequate depletion allowances on oil, gas and minerals; (j) administration of laws relating to oil and gas on the public domain to encourage exploratory operations to meet the public need; (k) continuance of present Federal laws on mining claims on the public domain, good faith administration thereof, and we state our opposition to the plans of the Secretary of the Interior to substitute a leasing system; and (1) larger representation in the Federal Government of men and women especially familiar with Western problems.

Hawaii:

Hawaii, which shares the nation's obligations equally with the several States, is entitled to the fullest measure of home rule looking toward statehood; and to equality with the several States in the rights of their citizens and in the application of all our national laws.

Alaska:

Alaska is entitled to the fullest measure of home rule looking toward State-hood.

Puerto Rico:

Statehood is a logical aspiration of the people of Puerto Rico who were made citizens of the United States by Congress in 1917; legislation affecting Puerto Rico, in so far as feasible, should be in harmony with the realization of that aspiration.

Palestine:

In order to give refuge to millions of distressed Jewish men, women and children driven from their homes by tyranny, we call for the opening of

approaches a period fraught with graver responsibilities, more far-reachin possibilities and during which more possible disastrous results may occur throug unqualified, inexperienced, and faltering leadership than at any time in previou history. The man equipped with greater experience, possessing higher respec endowed with a thorough knowledge of national and world conditions, truly abl to lead this nation to victory, and to a lasting peace, is again found within th ranks of the Democratic party our standard bearer for the fourth time—Frankli D. Roosevelt. We again congratulate the citizenship of West Virginia upon it opportunity to follow his enlightened leadership, and that of Harry S. Trumar the candidate for Vice President.

National

We approve the platform adopted by the National Convention at Chicago, an commend it, in its entirety, to the electorate of the state.

We give our unqualified and enthusiastic endorsement to the excellent record of our senior Senator, Harley M. Kilgore. His tireless and brilliant discharge of duty has given to him a place of national prominence.

We likewise commend West Virginia's Democratic Congressmen, Joe L. Smith Jennings Randolph and John Kee. Though regretting the decision of Congress man Smith not to seek re-election, we heartily approve of his selection as Statchairman and pledge to him our full confidence and support. We call for the re election of Messrs. Randolph and Kee, and for the election of the other Democratic candidates for Congress, that illustrious statesman and our presen Governor, Matthew M. Neely, Honorable Cleveland M. Bailey, Judge E. B. Penny backer and Dr. E. H. Hedrick.

State

Twelve years ago, the people of West Virginia turned to the Democratic party for relief from Republican so-called leadership. The history of our state is filled with the noble accomplishments of three great Democratic Governors and their administrations since that time.

The ability, character and record of each of the Democratic candidates on the state ticket are well known. They merit the unequivocal support of the people of West Virginia. They are not newcomers. They are experienced. Their honesty integrity, sincerity and loyalty have never been questioned. These serious times demand that the administration of the affairs of our great state be placed in the hands of competent and experienced men.

We accept the grave responsibility of leadership, and with justifiable pride present to the people of West Virginia cur state ticket, headed by Judge Clarence W. Meadows, of Raleigh County, our candidate for Governor. Young and energetic, his wealth of experience in public life, as a lawyer, a Legislator, a Prosecuting Attorney, twice Attorney General of the State, and as a Circuit Judge attest his unquestioned ability and the high esteem in which he is held by his fellow citizens. His sincerity, warm personality, his demonstrated ability to deal with people and problems fairly and justly, and to the best interests of the state fit him in every way to become an outstanding Chief Executive of West Virginia

The re-election of William S. O'Brien for Secretary of State, W. W. Trent for Superintendent of Free Schools, R. E. Talbott for Treasurer, Edgar B. Simms for Auditor, J. B. McLaughlin for Commissioner of Agriculture, and the election of Ira J. Partlow for Attorney General, will assure a seasoned Board of Public Works which will work harmoniously with our candidate for Governor and for the good of our entire people. We likewise call for the re-election of Judge Jo N. Kenna to the Supreme Court of Appeals.

The Present War and Post-War Period

We shall unqualifiedly dedicate the full might of our state government and its resources to the winning of this war and the peace to follow. We pledge full cooperation with the national government and our military leaders, to the end that West Virginia may play its full part in this great struggle and that our

citizens may prosperously continue their peace-time pursuits when the war is ended. Each and every stated purpose in this platform shall be subservient to and harmonious with the purposes here stated.

Schools and Education

We proudly point to the fact that it was a democratic administration which advocated and enacted legislation removing politics from our schools, made possible the continuing contract for teachers, and provided a retirement program for their benefit.

We unqualifiedly favor full nine-month terms for every public school. The temporary salary advance of twenty-five dollars a month for teachers should be made permanent. We pledge further equitable increases to offset increased living costs, such increases to be commensurate with the state and counties' ability to pay. Legislation should be enacted permitting West Virginia to share in federal funds for salaries or maintenance purposes, the expenditure of such funds to be controlled by local and state agencies. The Teachers' Retirement Act should be broadened to provide disability payments to those who become disabled prior to retirement age, and to permit the inclusion of certain employees not now covered by the act, but who serve the school system. A wise, but extensive, repairing program is desirable following the close of the war. A broadened and enlarged school program is needed with the coming of peace, particularly in the field of vocational training and to provide attractive and ample educational facilities for our returned veterans, particularly the boys and girls whose educational careers were cut short by entry into the service. The principle of free textbooks is fully established. This program should be accelerated and extended throughout all elementary and high schools as soon as possible.

The programs of our state supported institutions of higher learning must be so arranged as to give every West Virginia boy and girl the ready opportunity to procure the best in higher education in his or her home state. We propose to spensor the cooperative plan of education in our institutions of higher learning, whereby the ambitious but financially handicapped student may defray the expenses of his or her education by alternate periods of work and study. We propose to maintain every such institution, in the matter of administration and scholastics, upon a high and unassailable plane comparable to other institutions of like character in our nation. We unqualifiedly pledge our party to the enactment of such legislation and to the appropriation of such monies as shall fully and adequately accomplish these purposes.

Roads

We advocate a planned program of post-war building and maintenance of state highways. We must have modern and adequate through state highways, but special emphasis must be placed upon secondary and all-weather farm to market roads. We believe a proper allocation of existing state surpluses should be made for this purpose. Such an enlarged program, in cooperation with the Federal government and in keeping with the state's finances, will not only add permanent value to our state and resultant prosperity to its citizens, but will be the means of furnishing employment to our people during the post-war period with respect to which the returned veteran shall receive preference.

Labor and Capital

The inalienable right of labor to organize and bargain collectively must be preserved. We believe in furnishing fair, just and ample protection, safeguards and opportunities for both labor and capital in and about their legitimate rights and activities. Each is dependent upon the other, being component parts of our Democratic system, and equally essential to the life of the other and to the welfare of our state. We advocate full cooperation by the state government with labor and capital, to the end that their relationship may be harmonious and mutually profitable, each bearing its just responsibility to the state and its citizens. Class legislation, we condemn as undemocratic, and we shall always

seek the advice, counsel and help of the constituted representatives of both labor and capital in matters of legislation, administration and state policy pertaining to their respective interests.

Agriculture

We recognize the hard plight of the farmer during these strenuous times. Our responsibility is clear. The success and prosperity of our great farming industry is vital to our continued progress, peace and welfare. We shall urge a greater devotion to the promotion of the science of agriculture and the welfare of the farmer, which must include adequate financial assistance to all state departments, schools and agencies, designed to benefit our citizens who till the soil. Farm to market roads and adequate market prices and facilities, full cooperation with the farmer and the public utilities in the extension of public utility services to farming areas shall all receive our particular attention.

Aviation

The Democratic party being fully aware of the part which the airplane is to play in the future of our state and nation, pledges its full efforts in behalf of a program for the development of aviation in West Virginia.

Taxation

We hold that a just and equal assessment and distribution of the tax burden is essential to the well-being of our citizens. Our tax structure we believe generally to be sound. In light of future events, any refinements or adjustments which become necessary shall be made. At present we conceive that the heavy cost of war in the form of federal taxation demands that any adjustment of the present state tax structure shall be downward. New revenues are not needed at present.

State Finances

We assert that the Democratic party, through inspired leadership and constructive legislation, salvaged the finances of this state. In 1933, an appalling deficit created by the Republican officeholders faced a new administration. Our state's financial history since that time has been one of steady unprecedented, unparalleled improvement until today the State of West Virginia is debt free and has a large surplus with which it can confidently look to the post-war period.

Today the bonds and obligations of our state are cutstanding for their value and marketability, demanding the highest premiums with investors in glitedged securities. There can be no better recommendation to the people of our state than this sterling record of financial improvement and the absolute soundness of the state's credit.

Our standard bearer, Judge Clarence W. Meadows, in the conduct of his statesmanlike and unprecedentedly victorious campaign for nomination, unequivocally stated that efficiency in government means economy in government and that every state officer and employee presently employed or otherwise must meet the acid test of efficiency, capability and honesty in the administration of state affairs. We reaffirm these principles and wholeheartedly endorse such a program.

Social Security

We advocate the maximum extension of the social security program commensurate with the ability of the state and in keeping with a sound tax structure, in order that adequate and proper care may be bestowed upon the aged and needy. We pledge full cooperation with the federal government in this program.

Conservation

We recognize in our heritage of forests, streams and wild life, climate, in our scenery and outdoor recreational advantages, a great and invaluable natural resource. The opportunities for their protection and development are unlimited.

Such can be made a major attraction not only for tourists, sportsmen and those of leisure, but a source of pleasure and pride for all our citizens, and the means of bringing much added wealth into our state. We pledge an extended, sound and scientifically planned conservation program, in charge of practical, experienced personnel, encompassing proper protection for all our natural resources, the elimination of pollution from our beautiful streams, and the wholly adequate stocking of these streams with fish and our forests and fields with game. To this end, we shall seek the advice and cooperation of business interests and particularly the rod and gun clubs of this state and their membership. Our fine system of state parks must be continued and expanded.

Veterans

We assert that to no other group of our citizens will we owe so much than to the returned veterans. The most we can do for them will be so little in repayment for their sacrifices. We pledge the full cooperation of our state with such federal programs as are now or may hereafter be designed for the benefit and welfare of the veteran in keeping with the state's ability so to do. We believe it the obligation of the state to give preference to the returned veteran in the matter of employment, in the matter of education, and in all things which will insure a prompt and orderly return to the normal pursuits of peacetime life. We unqualifiedly endorse Judge Meadows' campaign promise of a sound and constructive post-war program to meet the problems of unemployment and our full obligation to the veterans.

State Institutions

Our state institutions must be kept upon the highest plane in the matter of service to our citizens and the administration of their affairs. We demand the best for West Virginians in the matter of institutional care. We hold that the heads of our state institutions and their staffs should meet the acid test of competency and efficiency, and that political consideration with respect thereto must be entirely secondary. We advocate seeking the advice and cooperation of the medical association of our state in matters pertaining to the administration and conduct of these institutions.

Development of Industry

We recognize that much of West Virginia industry has long been supplied with capital from without our borders. Not minimizing the desirability of such development of our natural resources, all of which has contributed greatly to our prosperity, but realizing that with each passing year our God-given resources are rapidly being depleted, we unqualifiedly endorse the announced program of our candidate for Governor, advocating a special study of this problem to the end that the state government, cooperating with labor and capital, Chambers of Commerce, industrial and business organizations, with the unqualified help of the research facilities of our state institutions, may attract within our borders the numberless industries which can make full use of our natural resources and the unlimited byproducts therefrom. We hold that West Virginia, with its abundant natural wealth, transportation facilities and native labor, can become one of the great centers of industrial development in the chemical, synthetic and plastic era which must follow the present war.

Civil Liberties and Equal Rights

We favor the absolute protection of all the civil liberites and the preservation of equal rights and privileges for all citizens regardless of race or color or creed. We pledge to each a fair and just representation in matters of government and of employment in state affairs.

Women

As never before the womanhood of West Virginia has, during these trying war years, demonstrated an unparalleled ability to fill the places of their men-folk in

the normal pursuits upon the home front. We pay undying tribute to them, and we reaffirm our faith in their high ability by unqualifiedly pledging to them full recognition in the matter of positions and places of trust in the state government, with equal pay for equal duties. We pledge to them proper protection and safeguards in all lines of private enterprise.

Civil Service

We advocate the perfecting of the administration of civil service where it now exists and we pledge the extension thereof to such other departments of state as an unbiased study from the standpoint of efficiency and economy in government reasonably require.

Conclusion

Proud of past accomplishments, the redemption of promises made, and the vindication of pledges given, and relying upon the guidance of Divine Providence, and having full faith and confidence in the ability and integrity of our leadership, we firmly believe the liberal minded and progressive thinking men and women of this state will overwhelmingly approve the principles of this platform and will march forward with us in a united front to four more years of truly faithful discharge of duties.

WEST VIRGINIA REPUBLICAN STATE PLATFORM

(Adopted at Parkersburg, July 22, 1944)

The Republican Party of West Virginia enters this campaign confident of victory. We believe that the people of the nation, as well as West Virginians, are tired of mismanagement and reckless theories and are eager to cast their vote for a Republican administration.

With this victory will come grave responsibilities that must be borne. The people will demand of our candidates in office, that they give them good government, and restore integrity and honesty to high places. To this end the Republican Party makes a solemn pledge.

The Republican Party of West Virginia adheres to the American way of life as grounded upon certain basic principles which are written in the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State.

The underlying purpose of constitutional law is to protect the people against government, and to afford a safe and definite harbor for the individual at all times, and particularly in a time of trouble, such as war. We believe that constitutional law is applicable equally to both those in public office and those in the private walks of life, and that is a pernicious doctrine that constitutional provisions may be ignored in times of exigency or national emergency. For Americans there is no higher law than the Constitution of the United States, as written.

In Chicago, Republicans adopted a platform setting forth the plans and aims of the party. That platform, carefully drafted, covers all of the important issues of the day in a straightforward manner and in language easy to comprehend. The West Virginia Republicans in convention hereby endorse the national platform in its entirety, and attach it hereto as part of this document.

The Republicans of West Virginia call special attention to the labor plank in the Republican national platform, a plank which many labor leaders have described as the most satisfactory declaration of policy on labor problems contained in any political platform in 20 years. We unreservedly endorse this plank not merely as a declaration of policy on a national level, but also as defining our attitude on such labor legislation as falls more particularly within the sphere of the State. To protect the independence of the individual worker, we express our opposition to efforts by Communists to arrogate to themselves the ungranted right to speak politically for labor as a whole.

In state government the Republicans promise the people of West Virginia that when we are again in office we will reduce state expenditures by paring the biennial budget at least ten million dollars; that we will select only competent employees, men and women trained for their jobs. We promise to eliminate duplication in departments and cast out hundreds of payrollers. We, the Republicans, recognize that good government requires public officials who are honest and who are capable to fill their jobs by training, rather than by the way they vote.

There are about two hundred thousand West Virginians serving in the armed forces. These noble young men and women upon leaving the armed service of their country should be aided in securing employment, completing their education, and getting into normal life regardless of race, creed or color. To this end the Republican party pledges itself.

We Republicans promise better "farm to market" roads so that the producer of food may be able to get to his selling place in all kinds of weather. We also propose to liquidate eventually the revolving road bonds, by paying some of them each year so that subsequently we can put the highway system on a pay-as-you-go basis.

The State Department of Agriculture will give its support to the Land Grant College in assisting and cooperating with the Agricultural Experiment Station,

College of Agriculture and Extension Service and will seek counsel from the farmers in all educational and legislative programs.

We Republicans recognize that the school system in West Virginia has become involved in partisan politics, from the elementary grades to the university, and are opposed to such a state of affairs. It is a recognized fact that in some counties a teacher purchases his job and in others must pay a percentage of his scant wage into a political slush fund. These vicious practices will stop when the Republicans are in office.

West Virginia has enough revenue to provide excellent schools for all sections, staffed by well-prepared teachers for both colored and white. The Republican party recognizes that to retain a good teacher, he must be compensated on a level equal to what he could earn in another occupation. It is imperative that school management hold such a viewpoint or the schools will continue to decline in quality.

We Republicans believe that free school books should be furnished every child in elementary grades. We believe that the present system of supplying free school books only to pupils who are unable to buy them, is vicious and unfair to the under-privileged child. In public schools there should be no distinctions.

West Virginia University should not be under the dictation of the governor. The law provided a proper method of governing that institution, and personal petty jealousies have no part in good government. The Republicans promise that once we are in power we will separate the University, and the other state schools, from partisan personal control.

The municipalities need financial relief, and the State's penal institutions need reorganizing. The Republicans pledge themselves to meet these needs as speedily and completely as possible upon being entrusted with the responsibility and authority of State Government.

The State's mental hospitals have long neglected to take advantage of tested and proved developments in the treatment of mental disease. The Republicans pledge themselves to provide an admission hospital where all State patients would be thoroughly examined and classified before being assigned to the best available institution for carrying out the properly prescribed medical treatment; and to obtain for these hospitals the best medical and nursing staffs that can be obtained on the basis of professional competence rather than political patronage.

With the prospect of large-scale highway construction and other public works on a basis of Federal-State co-operation, the Republicans pledge themselves to take full advantage of all opportunities to have West Virginia participate to the fullest possible extent in this postwar program.

And West Virginia needs an intelligent conservation program. Reforestation and prevention of soil erosion should be planned over a long period, and started immediately. The summer camps and public parks should be developed, while the hunting and fishing should be supervised more closely. The Republicans promise the hunters and fishermen that when they are in office every dollar collected in license fees will be used for stocking streams, securing and maintaining forests, propagating and restocking game and game animals.

The Republicans take pride in calling attention to the faithful service in the House of Representatives of Rep. Andrew Schiffler of the First District, Rep. E. G. Rohrbough of the Third District, and Rep. Hubert Ellis of the Fourth District and of Senator Chapman Revercomb in the United States Senate.

The Republicans of West Virginia pledge their candidates for State office to the support of this platform, reaffirm their complete acceptance of the Republican national platform, and commit themselves to united support of the Republican nominees for Congress in the six districts of West Virginia and to the election of Thomas E. Dewey of New York as President and John W. Bricker of Ohio as Vice President.





WEST VIRGINIA

DESCRIPTION OF THE STATE

West Virginia became a State in 1863 after separating from Virginia at the time of the Civil War. It is bounded on the north by Ohio, Pennsylvania and Maryland; on the south by Virginia and Kentucky; and on the West by Kentucky and Ohio. West Virginia has been termed "the most northern southern state, the most eastern western state, the most western eastern state and the most southern northern state."

It is essentially mountainous, the Appalachian Range having several spurs therein. Its western parts drain into the Ohio River and its eastern portions drain into the Potomac. The climate is moderate.

The State is the largest coal-producing State in the Union and ranks high in the production of petroleum, natural gas, iron ore, iron and steel products, glass and glassware, chemicals and chemical products. The Kanawha Valley now is recognized as the Nation's chemical center.

West Virginia produces more hardwood than any other State, excepting Arkansas, and has vast timber wealth, including yellow poplar, birch, ash, oak, spruce, hemlock and walnut. Chief agricultural products are wheat, corn, oats, hay, potatoes, tobacco, apples, peaches, plums and grapes.

Although it is believed that some white settlers crossed the Potomac and located on or near the site of Shepherdstown as early as 1719, Morgan Morgan is credited with being the first white man to build a permanent home in this State, near Bunker Hill, Berkeley County in 1726. Out of the groups of French and English settlers and the struggle between them, came the French and Indian War, and the first armed conflict on West Virginia soil. Dunmore's war followed, in which the pioneers took part, and the battle of Point Pleasant, most important on record for West Virginians, was hailed as the first battle of the Revolution. That battle took place at the mouth of the Great Kanawha River in 1774. In the Revolutionary War that followed, no region sent more men to the East under Washington and his sub-commanders, or did more valiant defense of the "back door" of the embryonic United States, than did the men from West Virginia.

The Civil War, which brought about the separation of western Virginia from the mother State, saw the men of West Virginia in the middle of the fighting. The first battle of the conflict between the States was fought at Philippi, in Barbour County, and the famous John Brown "Insurrection" took place at Harpers Ferry. The State provided leaders on both sides. General Thomas J. ("Stonewall") Jackson, brilliant Confederate leader and the most prominent West Virgianian of them all, hailed from Lewis County, while the State contributed to the Union Generals Lightburn, Kelley and Harris.

The State's mountains, forests and streams offer attractive recreational facilities. There are two national forests (Monongahela and George Washington), in addition to numerous State parks that offer cabins and facilities to the public.

White Sulphur Springs, in Greenbrier County, is world famous. The year 1941 saw it converted from a spa, however. Shortly after the United States entered the War, representatives of enemy nations were concentrated there, awaiting return to their home countries. On September 1, 1942, it again came under Federal control, to be used as a hospital and sanitarium for Americans wounded in the War.

Principal institution of learning in the State is West Virginia University. Other State-owned colleges are Marshall, Fairmont, West Liberty, West Virginia Institute of Technology, Concord, Glenville, Potomac State, and West Virginia State and Bluefield, the latter two Negro. Principal private and denominational colleges are: Alderson-Broaddus, Beckley, Bethany, Davis and Elkins, Morris Harvey, Salem and Wesleyan.

CAPITOL BUILDING

West Virginia's Capitol Building, one of the most beautiful in the Nation, was completed in February, 1932, at a cost of \$9,491,180.03.

Made up of three wings, the main one of which faces the Great Kanawha River, the building covers 16 acres of ground and has 333 rooms. Floor space is 535,000 square feet. The Building contains 10,300,000 cubic feet. Exterior of the building is Indiana buff limestone and interior is Imperial Danby Vermont marble. Nearly 5,000 tons of steel went into the construction. The dome, covered with 22½ caret gold leaf, is 300 feet high.

Other interesting facts about the building are:

Chandelier in dome weighs 4,000 pounds, has 15,000 candle power, and is suspended 180 feet above floor by a gold chain 54 feet long.

Rug in Governor's reception room weighs 1,809 pounds and measures $26~{\rm by}~60$ feet.

Chandeliers in House and Senate chambers each are made up of 10,000 separate pieces of rock crystal.

Bronze doors on porticos weigh 2,800 pounds each.

HISTORY OF STATE CAPITOLS

The above description of West Virginia's magnificent Capitol building, completed in February, 1932, calls attention to the history of the state's former capitols. None, it is true, was so elaborate but each in itself is interesting because of its historical background.

The first capitol building was the Linsly Institute Building in the city of Wheeling, which was used under lease of the new state government. It was small but picturesque and for its day fairly commodious. On June 20, 1863, the first governor of the state, Arthur I. Boreman delivered his inaugural address in front of this building, and on that day the first Legislature of West Virginia convened within its chambers. For six years this building served as the State Capitol.

An act of the Legislature, effective April, 1870, made the city of Charleston the seat of government for the state. A Charleston stock company was hastily organized to build a temporary building to provide offices for the state officials. This three-story structure, however, was not completed on time and the various departments were housed in churches, school rooms, banks and other buildings until the temporary capitol was ready for occupancy. A packet was chartered by Charlestonians to transport the government officials and all state documents to the new capitol home in Charleston. It required three days for the boat to make the trip from Wheeling and, because of this, it was referred to as the "floating capitol."

Five years later, 1875, the Legislature moved the capitol back to its original location—Wheeling—and the archives of state and the state officials were again transported by steamboat, thus giving West Virginia another "floating capitol." The selection of Wheeling by the Legislature was of a temporary nature but in appreciation of its return Wheeling presented the state with a beautiful \$80,000 stone building for its capitol. This building is still used by the city of Wheeling and Ohio County. Linsly Institute, however, served as a capitol until the completion of the permanent building. Twice Linsly Institute served as the capitol of the commonwealth.

Historians point out that although political considerations and sectionalism were present the constant changing of capitol sites for West Virginia was due in most part to the underlying fact that the bigger portion of its population resided along the great water courses, and Wheeling, though on the northern edge of the state, was the largest and most important city. Despite these conditions it was

seen by members of the Legislature and by citizens of the state that with the development of railroads a more central location would of necessity have to be chosen. On August 7, 1877, the people of the state by an overwhelming majority voted to make the City of Charleston the permanent capital.

The capitol building costing \$390,000, which was for the time a splendid building for its purpose, was opened for the transaction of business for the state on May 1, 1885. For thirty-six years this building remained the capitol of our state but on January 3, 1921, it was totally destroyed by fire of an unknown origin. Temporary quarters in city buildings and churches were used until a 166-room wood building, known as the "pasteboard capitol", was ready for occupancy in February, 1921. On May 2, 1927, the pasteboard capitol passed away in the smoke of another total fire. Once again the state was forced to house its officials in temporary locations throughout the city.

During this time the Legislature authorized the erection of the new capitol to be built of stone and marble under the direction of one of America's leading architects, Cass Gilbert. Although West Virginia has been the state of many capitols it now possesses one nationally known for its beauty and magnificence.

THE GREAT SEAL AND COAT-OF-ARMS OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal and Coat-of-Arms of West Virginia, adopted by the Legislature on September 26, 1863, was designed by Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Saint Clara, Doddridge County, who served as Commissioner of Immigration under Governor Boreman and who was a member of the Legislature of 1864. (See obverse of Great Seal on front cover.)

The seal design is described in full detail by the following report of the legislative committee on suggestions and designs submitted by the designer.

"The disc of the Great Seal is to be two and one-half inches in diameter; the obverse to bear the legend, 'The State of West Virginia,' the constitutional designation of our Republic, which with the motto, 'Montani Semper Liberi-Mountaineers always free'-is to be inserted in the circumference. In the center a rock with ivy, emblematic of stability and continuance, and on the face of the rock the inscription, 'June 20, 1863', the date of our foundation, as if graven with a pen of iron in the rock forever. On the right of the rock a farmer clothed in the traditional hunting garb, peculiar to this region, his right arm resting on the plow handles, and his left supporting a woodman's axe, indicating that while our territory is partly cultivated, it is still in the process of being cleared of the original forest. At his right hand a sheaf of wheat and a cornstalk on the left hand of the rock, a miner, indicated by a pick-axe on his shoulder, with barrels and lumps of mineral at his feet. On his left an anvil, partly seen, on which rests a sledge hammer, typical of the mechanic arts, the whole indicating the principal pursuits and resources of the State. In front of the rock and the hunter, as if just laid down by the latter and ready to be resumed at a moment's notice, two hunters' rifles, crossed and surmounted at the place of contact by the Phrygian cap, or cap of liberty, indicating that our freedom and liberty were won and will be maintained by the force of arms.

"The reverse of the Great Seal is to be encircled by a wreath composed of laurel and oak leaves, emblematical of valor and strength, with fruits and cereals, productions of the State. For device, a landscape. In the distance, on the left of the disc, a wooded mountain, and on the right a cultivated slope with the log farmhouse peculiar to this region. On the side of the mountain, a representation of the viaduct on the line of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad in Preston County, one of the great engineering triumphs of the age, with a train of cars about to pass over it. Near the center a factory, in the front of which a river with boats, on the bank and to the right of it nearer the foreground, a derrick and a shed, appertaining to the production of salt and petroleum. In the foreground a meadow with cattle and sheep feeding and reposing, the whole indicating the leading characteristics, productions and pursuits of the State at

this time. Above the mountain, etc., the sun merging from the clouds, indicating that former obstacles to our prosperity are now disappearing. In the rays of the sun the motto 'Libertas et Fidelitate'—Freedom and Loyalty—indicating that our liberty and independence are the result of faithfulness to the Declaration and the National Constitution."

The Constitution of West Virginia, Article II, Section 7, provides that: "The present seal of the State, with its motto 'Montani Semper Liberi,' shall be the Great Seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the Secretary of State, to be used by him, officially as directed by law."

The reverse of the Great Seal has not been in use in recent years.

WEST VIRGINIA STATE FLAG

The present design for the West Virginia State Flag was adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929. The proportions are the same as those of the United States ensign.

The field is pure white, upon the center of which is emblazoned in proper colors the coat-of-arms of the State, upon which appears the date of the admission of West Virginia into the Union and the motto "Montani Semper Liberi."

Above the coat-of-arms of the State of West Virginia there is a ribbon lettered, "State of West Virginia," and a wreath of *rhododendron maximum* in proper colors is arranged appropriately around the lower part thereof. The field of pure white is bordered by a strip of blue on four sides.

THE STATE FLOWER

The rhododendron, or big laurel (rhododendron maximum), was named as the official State Flower under the provisions of a joint resolution adopted by the Legislature of West Virginia on January 23, 1903, during the administration of Governor Albert Blakeslee White. AERONAUTICS

WEST VIRGINIA BOARD OF AERONAUTICS

Powers and Duties of Board

The Board shall have general supervision and control over all airports and landing fields used for commercial purposes, and all State, County and Municipal Airports, all schools of aviation and all other phases of aerial activities. The Board is hereby given the power and authority to make such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary and advisable for the public safety, governing the designing, laying out, locating, building, equipping, and operating of all landing fields and airports within the State. Such Board is given the power and authority to make different ratings of airports and prescribe the proper uses for which the different classes of ratings are given.

The Board is empowered to make rules and regulations governing the personnel and operation of schools of aviation, for the purpose of protecting the health and safety of students therein and insuring the public safety through the proper training and instruction of student aviators and mechanics. It shall adopt and enforce the provisions of the Federal Government now in force or as hereafter amended, so as to make applicable as far as possible the provisions of that Act.

Maintenance of Emergency Fields

The Board of Aeronautics has maintained several emergency fields where local municipalities lacked necessary funds to keep fields safe for landings. It erected 250 aerial markers, thus eliminating most of the hazards in navigation that are prevalent in mountainous terrain.

During the war emergency the Board of Aeronautics rendered valuable assistance by cooperating with the O. C. D. and the Civil Air Patrol.

Civil Air Patrol was transferred from the Office of Civilian Defense to the War Department by Executive Order No. 9339 of the President of the United States, April 29, 1943. The Commanding General, Army Air Forces, was charged with the supervision and direction of the operations on behalf of the Secretary of War by A G O Memorandum W95-12-43, May 4, 1943. The main objectives being Coastal Patrol, Island Missions, Forest Patrol, Army Courier Service, Recruiting U.S.A.A.F., Cadets, W.A.C. Recruiting and the training of 3,800 cadets for future aviation.

Civil Air Patrol Cadets

The first large-scale assignment which came after CAP was made an auxiliary of the Army Air Forces was the recruiting of Aviation Cadets. The tremendous growth of plane production called for more and more air crew candidates. The whole organization tackled the job with successful results which have led to the broadening of our responsibility in this work.

The main source of recruits is among the 17-year-olds, who, on passing their mental and physical tests, are placed in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve for call to active duty after reaching 18 years of age. We accepted the task not only of signing up these young men, but of giving them preliminary training in the Cadets.

For the Future

When the war ends, the problem of employment for the hundreds of thousands of airmen and aircraft workers is one for which it is the duty of everyone now in aviation on the home front to help prepare. Through CAP, the collapse of civilian aviation has been prevented so that its development can begin immediately. Only through it has aviation been kept alive in many communities. Airports would have closed had not CAP members volunteered as guards and clearance officers to comply with expensive regulatory requirements. Local operators, stripped of their contracts and unable to sell flight time to the public, due to WPB orders and requisitioning of planes for CAA, could not, in many instances, have carried on without this aid. At a number of points, CAP units have taken over the operation of airports entirely or constructed their own fields.

By giving ground courses to tens of thousands of adults and much larger numbers of young people, this organization has created a nationwide demand for flight instruction.

Correspondingly, the post-war market for all types of air services has been broadened. Beyond that, CAP has pioneered new methods and new air services. Its courier systems have demonstrated the feasibility of feeder lines which can bring air mail, express, and passenger services from the main terminals into every community.

For the manning of air power in the remainder of the war, for the release of military planes for combat duty, and for the building of America's future in the air, Civil Air Patrol is an organization which is fitted for the task. CAP is now starting its third year of service with a brilliant record behind it and with ever broadening opportunities ahead.

National Headquarters, Civil Air Patrol, has set our quota as 3,800 cadets by January 1, 1945.

There have been approximately 350 Army Air Force pilots that have been trained by the Civil Air Patrol from the State of West Virginia, excluding those that enlisted directly from ranks of Civil Status without this training.

POST WAR PLANS

The State of West Virginia to date has 22 existing airports. Post war plans call for 66 additional airports, air parks and landing strips located in various sections of West Virginia, each serving a community of at least 5,000 population. These airports will receive priority ratings for Federal funds, if and when they are available. There are at present 15 feeder lines making applications to Civil Aeronautics Board and West Virginia Board of Aeronautics to establish certain routes that will carry mail, freight, express and passengers, feeding into main-line operations. At present, we have two airlines and one airmail pickup, serving West Virginia.

West Virginia, originally a part of Virginia, was admitted to the Union as the thirty-fifth State in June, 1863 Its population on April 1, 1940, according to the sixteenth census, was 1,901,974, which represents an increase of 172,769, or 10 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1930.

The following table shows the population of West Virginia from 1870 to 1940, inclusive, together with the increase in each decade. The population at each census prior to 1870 of that part of Virginia which was later taken to form West Virginia, was as follows: 1860, 376,688; 1850, 302,313; 1840, 224,537; 1830, 176,924; 1820, 136,808; 1810, 105,469; 1800, 78,592; 1790, 55,873.

CONSERVATION

WEST VIRGINIA'S WAR-TIME CONSERVATION PROGRAM

Hunting and fishing license sales during the 1943-44 fiscal year netted the State \$378,897.50, a sum which, with the exception of a banner 1941 year, established an all-time high. This record was compiled despite the fact that more than 175,000 West Virginians, at least, were absent from the State in the service of their country.

State parks and forests have also enjoyed a banner year, with reservations the highest in the history of the system, despite travel and war time restrictions.

These are but two of several indications that there is a growing interest among West Virginians in the recreational advantages and facilities afforded them through the work of the Conservation Commission of West Virginia.

Reorganized under the provisions of House Bill No. 215, by an act of the 1943 session of the Legislature, which became effective June 5, 1943, the newly created seven man administrative commission, which replaced a five man advisory commission, has just completed its first year under the provisions of the new setup.

Headed by its Chairman, the Commission places in its Executive Director the authority and responsibility of directing the work and personnel of the various divisions of the Commission.

Created by the Legislature "to provide an organization for the protection, beautification, development, and use of lands, forests, parks, fish, game, waters, plant and animal life and the natural scenic resources of the State," the Commission's activities are highly diversified. The work of the Commission is financed largely out of funds received from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. The Legislature makes the following appropriations: \$17,000 for the fisheries division; \$60,000 for forest fire suppression; \$127,000 for state parks, with the understanding the division of state parks collect \$40,000, and \$27,080 for state forests. Some Federal assistance is realized from the Weeks and Clark-McNary laws, but the bulk of financing comes from license fees.

The Commission carries on its work through several divisions. These include—Parks, Game, Fish, Forestry, Law Enforcement and Education. The State has five major parks known as vacation parks because they are completely equipped to meet the recreational and other needs of the vacationer. In addition, there are eight parks maintained largely as day-use areas—some of these being battle-field memorials, and others containing particularly attractive scenic features.

Because of priorities and other war-time handicaps, the Commission has been unable to carry on much planned improvement work in the parks in the last three years—its efforts being confined mainly to maintenance work.

It did succeed in remodeling the administration building at Watoga State Park, and minor improvements were effected in some of the other parks. A big need is for more cabins in all of the parks, but this need hardly can be met until the war ends and manpower and materials become available for construction.

Of the seven state forests, four are equipped with vacation cabins. These cabins have many, but not all of the conveniences found in the park cabins. The forests also lack swimming pools and other similar recreational facilities to be had in the parks. Two major forests, however, have swimming facilities in lakes, and are generally in more rugged and wild territory. There are good fishing waters in most of the forests or near them, and good hunting in season is available. State forests are maintained and operated for multiple use—for timber production, recreation and designated as wildlife refuges.

The forestry division is concerned mainly with protecting from fire, approximately ten million acres of forest land. As measures in fire control, the state owns and operates during the fire season 50 fire towers in six districts, each of the latter being under a district forest protector. In the state fire control setup there are 15 county protectors operating in all counties of the state. To facilitate fire control, the Conservation Commission has recruited 3,500 public-spirited citizens to act as forest protectors, who are paid 40 cents per hour when actually fighting fires. In addition to its fire prevention work, the forestry division seeks to encourage proper forest management practices on privately-owned forest lands in the state. It also operates the forest tree nursery at LeSage, where tree seedlings for reforestation and afforestation purposes throughout the state. Each year sees an increasing demand by individuals for nursery-grown planting stock.

Each of the state forests is under the administration of a custodian. As timber matures it is sold for lumber or other forest products.

The divisions of the Commission that touch more directly the largest number of persons are those of game and fish. Their purpose is to keep the woods and fields supplied with game and the streams with fish.

Through years of parctice, research and experiments, this work has been expanded and improved methods have been adopted until today there is in effect a well-rounded program that seems to be giving very satisfactory results. The Commission's game and fish technicians, however, are constantly on the alert for further improvements.

Restocking of game is resorted to when any species seems to be decreasing. Rabbits, raccoon and deer were restocked last year, and a program for restocking wild turkeys was inaugurated. Restocking and careful management practices are held responsible for the fact that the state now has a deer herd estimated officially at 100,000. The state also has a limited but increasing wild turkey population. Last year, for the first time in many years, the deer season was increased to six days, and hunting was permitted in five southern counties that heretofore had been closed.

In dealing with deer and turkeys, it is the aim of the Commission to extend hunting territory as rapidly as possible and to make these animals and birds available in every part of the state. In pursuit of this policy a new game refuge was established last year on Blue Creek in Kanawha and Clay counties, and the stocking of it with deer was begun. The turkey stocking program calls for a state-wide survey, with the placing of turkeys wherever conditions seem propitious.

With respect to fish, the Commission is following a policy similar to that relating to game. By limiting fishing seasons and by restocking streams regularly, it seeks to assure a steady, or even an increasing supply of game fish. In distributing trout, bass, and other species, the division tries to see that they are placed where they will thrive and afford the greatest amount of sport to the largest number of fishermen. Each county gets its share of the kind of fish best suited to conditions in its streams. Last year a total of 1,981,623 fish were stocked in the state. These included rainbow, brook and lock leven trout, smallmouth and largemouth bass, sunfish, channel cats, bluegills, crappies and others. The total of fish distributed in waters of the state was boosted to 2,088,220 by Federal agencies with which the Commission has an arrangement by which it obtains from these a certain number of fish each year. In addition to a large number of fingerlings, the division annually stocks thousands of legal-sized trout. This policy, which was begun several years ago, helps to assure fishermen of a good supply of catchable fish at the beginning of the season.

Heading the law enforcement division is the chief game protector. Under the latter, normally 56 district and county game protectors operate. It is the duty of these to see to the enforcement of the Conservation, Game, Fish and Forestry laws. They assist also in stocking fish and game, planting food and cover crops, feeding game during the winter, investigating forest fires, and generally, in checking on conditions affecting wildlife. Game protectors are appointed by the executive director, their qualifications being fixed by law. It is provided that only "men interested and experienced in the work for which they are selected",

may be named, and they must be men "of good moral character" and "not of intemperate habits." They receive a flat monthly salary which is fixed by the Commission. The Commission furnishes them with uniforms and affords them a limited expense account while they are on patrol work.

Primarily, the purpose of the education division is to acquaint West Virginians with what is being done to make the great outdoors of their state and its wonderful resources beneficially available to them; also to foster public interest in conservation work generally, for unless this work has popular support little can be accomplished. Booklets and folders describing the work are prepared and distributed to individuals, schools and other organized groups. In addition, the division has a number of slides showing scenes in state parks and forests, as well as others depicting native game, birds, flowers, etc. It also operates a film lending library and publishes a monthly magazine, "West Virginia Conservation." An additional duty has devolved upon it as a result of legislative action refusing a new appropriation to the West Virginia Publicity Commission, which caused the latter to cease functioning last year. Hundreds of letters addressed to the Commission continue to arrive at the Capitol. These are referred to the Division of Education of the Conservation Commission. They come from all parts of the United States and from some foreign countries requesting literature, pictures and information of various kinds relating to West Virginia. Some of the writers are planning vacations in the state. Others are industrial leaders considering establishing plants in West Virginia and wanting certain data to aid them.

Realizing that conservation is a big subject, and one demanding wise treatment if future generations are to benefit from the natural resources with which nature has so richly endowed their state, the Conservation Commission plans its work on a long-range basis. The future, as well as the present, must be taken care of in a program designed to be of continuing and lasting benefit. In their planning, the seven commissioners and the executive director invite and welcome suggestions and recommendations from sportsmen and other groups, as well as from interested individuals. The cooperation of farmers, who constitute a vital link in conservation work is sought. This they are receiving to an encouraging degree.

Although considerably hampered by war-time conditions, the Commission is trying to keep its program on a sound basis. Cutting corners to the detriment of long-range benefits is avoided. Once the war is ended, the ground work for carrying forward conservation work on a broad front will be ready; meantime the Commission is not neglecting the needs of returning service men and women. When these thousands of West Virginians get back home, the Commission intends that they shall find in their native hills and valleys ample opportunity to forget war and indulge their recreation desires in ways beneficial to them physically and mentally.

Facilities: Supervised swimming, picnic area, overnight lodging, fishing, riding, trails, children's playground, scenic overlooks, restaurant, tennis, volleyball, badminton, archery, horseshoe courts, nature study and recreation leadership. Elevation, 1,000 to 2,600 feet. Acreage, 3,231. Post office, Landisburg.

WATOGA

(Pocahontas County) From north or south, leave U. S. 219 at Marlinton, thence to Huntersville, on W. Va. 39. Follow W. Va. secondary Route 21, surfaced road, six miles south from Huntersville to park entrance. 24 cabins. Facilities: Supervised swimming, boating, fishing, picnic area, riding, bicycling, children's playgrounds, trails, scenic overlooks, horseshoes, archery, and restaurant. Elevation, 2,000 to 3,200 feet. Acreage, 10,048. Post office, Seebert.

CACAPON

Harry L. Sharp, Acting Custodian

(Morgan County) From north following U. S. 522 from Berkeley Springs 10 miles south to park entrance on right. From Winchester follow U. S. 522, 24 miles north to park entrance on left. Surfaced highway throughout. Nineteen cabins. Facilities: Overnight lodging, supervised swimming, boating, fishing, picnic area, riding, bicycling, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, tennis, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, lawn games, restaurant, naturalist and recreation leadership. Elevation, 825 to 2,300 feet. Acreage, 5,725. Post office, Berkeley Springs.

LOST RIVER

(Hardy County) From east follow U. S. 220 to Moorefield; thence 17 miles over gravel secondary road marked successively W. Va. 7 and W. Va. 12 to park entrance, (check left and right turns at Moorefield before motoring across mountains); or W. Va. 55 to Baker, thence 259 to Mathias, 36 miles. From Winchester follow U. S. 50 to one mile west of Gore, turn left on Va. 259 to Wardensville, Baker and Mathias, thence 4 miles to park entrance on W. Va. secondary 12. From Harrisonburg follow Va. 260 (changing to W. Va. 259) to Mathias thence to park as noted above. Sixteen cabins. Facilities: Supervised swimming, boating, fishing, picnic area, riding, bicycling, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, tennis, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, lawn games, restaurant, naturalist and recreation leadership. Elevation, 1,800 to 3,200 feet. Acreage, 3,851. Post office, Mathias.

HOLLY RIVER

(Webster County) From north follow W. Va. 20 from Buckhannon through Rock Cave to park entrance on left a mile north of Hacker Valley. From South follow W. Va. 20 from Webster Springs north one mile beyond Hacker Valley to park entrance on right. Nine cabins. Facilities: Supervised swimming, fishing, picnic area, children's playground, trails and scenic overlooks, tennis, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, lawn games, restaurant, naturalist and recreation leadership. Elevation, 1,450 to 2,500 feet. Acreage, 7,320. Post office, Hacker Valley.

DROOP MOUNTAIN

(Pocahontas County) Follow U. S. 219 from Marlinton (if from North) or Lewisburg (if from South) to park entrance at Spice. Surfaced highway throughout. Three cabins. Facilities: Picnic area, trails, scenic overlooks. Elevation, 3,000 to 3,100 feet. Acreage, 265. Post office, Spice.

HAWKS NEST

John Crump, Custodian

(Fayette County) From east or west along U. S. 60, park is located along highway 1½ miles west of Ansted. Day-use facilities only, no cabins. Picnic area with fireplace and tables. Grille, toilets, picnic shelter, museum, trails, and scenic overlook. The latter, a very splendid view of New River. Elevation, 1,120 to 1,530 feet. Acreage, 48.

TOMLINSON'S RUN

C. L. Long, Custodian

(Hancock County) From north leave U. S. 30 at junction 2 miles east of Chester driving South on W. Va. 2 approximately 5 miles to park. From south on W. Va. 2 park entrance lies one mile northeast of Pughtown on highway. Picnicking facilities including tables and benches, fireplaces, modern sanitary facilities and water supply are available at this park. A naturalist-recreation leader is on duty during summer months. The remainder of the park, including a large dam which backs up 29½ acres of water, completed. Swimming, boating and fishing during 1943 season. Elevation, 750 to 1,270 feet. Acreage, 1,229.

BLACKWATER FALLS

Asbury Cleaver, Caretaker

(Tucker County) From the north or south leave U. S. 219 at Thomas following W. Va. 32 several miles east to right-hand turnoff, then approximately ½ mile to park. Picnicking facilities, overlook development at falls, road leading to edge of canyon affording fine view. No overnight facilities. Elevation, 3,150 to 3,190 feet. Acreage, 446.

PINNACLE ROCK

Gordon Butts, Caretaker

(Mercer County) Park is located along U. S. 52 about 5 miles northwest of Bluefield. Picnicking facilities, shelter, toilets, drinking water. No overnight accommodations. Area noted for the rocky outcrops which jut from this mountain top. Elevation, 2,660 to 3,100 feet. Acreage, 32.

CARNIFEX FERRY BATTLEFIELD

(Nicholas County) From the north or south leave U. S. 19 at Drennen thence over secondary road approximately five miles southeast to park. No development at present except toilets and small speaker's stand arrangement for commemorative gatherings. Area noteworthy as a Civil War battlefield. Elevation, 1,500 to 1,630 feet. Acreage, 275.

GRANDVIEW

Thomas S. Haney, Caretaker

(Raleigh County) From north or south leave U. S. 19 at Beaver (2 miles south of Beckley) thence approximately twelve miles over secondary road to park. Noted for view of New River Gorge. Picnicking development (tables, benches, freplaces, parking area, toilets and trails) is under way. No overnight accommodations. Elevation, 2,430 to 2,555 feet. Acreage, 52.

CATHEDRAL STATE PARK

(Preston County) On U. S. Route 50 between Brookside and Aurora. Purchased in 1942 and as yet no developments have been accomplished. Planned for development as a picnic and recreational center which will preserve a small, authentic example of the splendid timber which once dominated most of West Virginia. Elevation, 2,600 feet. Acreage, 118. Post office, Aurora.

STATE FORESTS

Seneca

(Pocahontas County) From south follow U. S. 219 to Marlinton, thence on W. Va. 28 to its junction with W. Va. secondary 11 (gravel) six miles east of Marlinton. Follow gravel road north ten miles to forest entrance. From north follow various main U. S. and W. Va. routes to Dunmore on W. Va. 28, thence south five miles on W. Va. secondary 11 (gravel) to forest entrance. Eight cabins. Facilities: Swimming, boating, fishing, picnic area, trails, motor drives, scenic overlooks. Elevation, 2,700 to 3,500 feet. Acreage, 11,049. Post office, Clover Lick.

Cabwaylingo

(Wayne County) From north follow U. S. 52 to Missouri Branch, thence east on W. Va. secondary 35 two miles to forest entrance. From south on U. S. 52 to Missouri Branch, thence as noted above. Thirteen cabins. Facilities: Swimming, fishing, picnic area, trails, motor drives, scenic overlocks. Elevation, 761 to 1,500 feet. Acreage, 6,167. Post office, Missouri Branch.

Kumbrabow

(Randolph County) From north or south follow U. S. 219 to forest sign marker at Elkwater thence west on forest gravel road five miles to forest entrance. Five cabins. Facilities: Fishing near forest, picnic area, trails, motor drives, scenic overlooks. Elevation, 2,100 to 3,800 feet. Acreage, 9,424. Post office, Pickens.

Greenbrier

(Greenbrier County) From west or north follow U. S. 60 or U. S. 219 respectively to Lewisburg, thence to Caldwell on U. S. 60, thence three miles east of Caldwell on U. S. 60 to juncture with secondary gravel road, thence south 1½ miles to forest entrance. From west follow U. S. 60 to 200 yards of polo field (so marked) just west of White Sulphur Springs. Turn left on secondary gravel road thence to forest as noted above. Secondary gravel road may be identified by underpass (C. & O. Railroad) 100 yards from U. S. 60. Four cabins. Facilities: Fishing near forest, picnic area, trails, motor drives, scenic overlooks: Elevation, 1,850 to 3,400 feet. Acreage, 5,004. Post office, White Sulphur Springs.

Coopers Rock

(Monongalia and Preston Counties) From Morgantown follow U. S. Route 119, State Route 73 north. Route 73 bisects Coopers Rock State Forest. The road leading to the recreational area is a right-hand intersection at the Preston-Monongalia County line. Has day-use facilities, swimming, boating and fishing on Cheat Lake near the forest, picnic area and grilles, foot and motor trails, impressive view of Cheat River, Cheat Lake at foot of mountain. Elevation, 900 to 2,700 feet. Acreage, 13,030. Post office, Pisgah.

Kanawha

Kaawha State Forest is reached from Route 119 at Hernshaw or from Charleston through South Hills through Loudendale on Davis Creek. Turn left on Davis Creek Road and continue to State Forest. The Forest has day-use recreational facilities. Swimming, picnic area and foot trails. Elevation, 750 to 1,800 feet. Acreage, 6,705. Post office, Charleston.

Panther Creek

(McDowell County) From north or south, U. S. 52 to intersection of hard surface road one mile north of Iaeger identified by directional sign "To Panther." Parallel to Tug Fork to Litwar, cross under N. & W. R. R. tracks, sharp left turn. Cross Tug Fork, turn sharp to right and parallel Tug Fork on the west side to Panther. Continue on dirt road five miles paralleling Panther Creek to Panther Creek State Forest. Elevation, 988 to 2,050 feet. Acreage, 7,715. Post office, Panther.

OPEN SEASONS AND BAG LIMITS

(Furnished by Conservation Commission)

Squirrels—Gray, Black or Fox—All counties—October 12, 1944, to November 25, 1944, inclusive.

Ruffed Grouse (Native "Pheasant")—All counties—October 12, 1944 to December 25, 1944, inclusive.

*Wild Turkey-October 12, 1944 to November 25, 1944, inclusive.

Open in the following counties or portions of counties: Berkeley, Clay, Grant, Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, Morgan, Pocahontas, Randolph, Tucker, Nicholas, Greenbrier, except that area west of Meadow River and west of Big Clear Creek, which area is closed.

Monroe, Peters Mountain only. Webster, only that area beginning at the Nicholas county line east of the State Route 20 to the junction of State Route 15 to the Randolph county line. Pendleton, east of the South Branch of the Potomac River and west of the North Fork of the Potomac River.

Quail-All counties-November 11, 1944 to December 25, 1944, inclusive.

Cottontail Rabbit—All counties—November 11, 1944 to January 15, 1945, inclusive. †Ringneck Pheasant—Hancock, Brooke, Ohio and Marshall counties—Cocks only, November 11, 1944 to November 18, 1944, inclusive.

Raccoon, Opossum, Skunk, Muskrat and Mink—All counties—November 11, 1944 to January 31, 1945, inclusive.

Deer—December 4, 1944 to December 9, 1944, inclusive, in the following counties only: Morgan, Hampshire, Hardy, Tucker and Taylor.

Barbour county, east of U. S. Route 250 and 119 south of Taylor county line to Philippi, thence east of Tygart River to mouth of Middle Fork River, thence east of Middle Fork River to Randolph county line;

Grant county, north of Pendleton county line and west of State Route 28 to junction with Jordan Run Road, thence west of Jordan Run Road to junction with State Route 42, thence north and east of Lunice Creek to mouth, thence east of Mill Creek to junction of North and South Mill Creek, thence east of South Mill Creek to the Pendleton county line;

Greenbrier county, east of Greenbrier River and north of U. S. Route 60 only; Lewis county, west of U. S. Route 19 to Weston, thence north of U. S. Routes 33 and 119 to Upshur county line;

Marion county, from the Monongalia county line east and south of the Monongahela River to junction with U. S. Route 250, thence south and west of U. S. Route 250 to Mannington, thence east of the Mannington-Bingamon Road to Bingamon, thence east of the Bingamon-Wyatt Road to the Harrison county line;

Mineral county, south and west of State Route 28;

Monongalia county, east of Monongahela River, except that all lands within the boundary lines at Cooper's Rock State Forest will be closed to deer hunting when the quota for the State Forest has been reached;

Pendleton county, from the Grant county line east of U. S. Route 220 to Virginia State line, thence north of Virginia State line to South Fork River, thence west of South Fork (Moorefield) River to Fort Seybert, thence north and west of the Moorefield Road (State Route 3) from Fort Seybert to the Hardy county line;

Pocahontas County, all east of U. S. Route 219 and south of U. S. Route 250 and west of U. S. Route 219 north of the Williams River road to the Black Mountain CCC camp, north of CCC road to junction with State Route 17, thence north of State Route 17 to Edray;

Preston county, entire county except that all lands within the boundary lines of Cooper's Rock State Forest will be closed to deer hunting when the quota for the State Forest has been reached;

Randolph county, east and north of the Tygart River from the Barbour county line to Elkins, north of U. S. Route 33 to Harman, west of State Route 32 to the Tucker county line; east of U. S. Route 219 and south of U. S. Route 250, south of the junction of routes at Huttonsville; south of State Route 15;

Webster county, from the Randolph county line south and west of the watersheds of Little Sugar Creek and Desert Fork of Right Fork of Holly River to the junction with State Route 20, thence east of State Route 20, south to the junction with the Williams River Road, thence north of the Williams River Road to the Pocahontas county line.

Deer-December 8 and 9, 1944, inclusive, in the following part of counties:

Logan county, east and south of U. S. Route 119 above the mouth and including the watershed of Rum Creek;

Mercer county, entire county;

McDowell county, north and east of U. S. Route 52;

Raleigh county, from New River at the mouth of Piney River, south and east of Piney River to the junction with U. S. Routes 19 and 21 at the town of Raleigh, except for Grandview State Park and the watersheds of Mill Creek and River Branch, thence north and east of U. S. Routes 19 and 21 to Ghent, thence south of the hard surface road to Odd, thence south of the Odd-Besoco-Killarney road to the junction with State Route 16, thence east of State Route 16 to the Wyoming county line:

Summers county, east of New River;

Wyoming county, east and north of U.S. Route 52.

Red Fox—No open season for killing or trapping, but may be chased for sport only in the following counties: Boone, Cabell, Calhoun, Doddridge, Gilmer, Harrison, Jackson, Lewis, Mercer, Mingo, McDowell, Pleasants, Roane, Taylor, Upshur, Wayne and Wood.

Red Fox—May be killed or trapped November 11, 1944 to January 31, 1945, inclusive, in the following counties: Barbour, Braxton, Clay, Fayette, Lincoln, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Ritchie, Summers, Wetzel, Wirt and Wyoming.

Red Fox—In counties not named above is not protected at any time. Be it understood that any landowner or bona-fide tenant may kill red foxes on his own land at any time, by any means other than poisons or the destruction of den or burrow by explosives.

Elk, Beaver, Otter, Snowshoe Rabbit and Imported Game Birds—No open season. Migratery Game Birds and Waterfowl—Federal regulations will apply, except that there shall be no open season on Mourning Dove or Wood Duck.

No hunting of any kind or carrying of firearms on any State Park, State Forest, Game Refuge, or Game Breeding Area on National Forest Lands.

(See exceptions-Controlled public shooting areas, noted below).

BAG LIMITS

Squirrels, Gray, Black or Fox-4 squirrels a day, twenty-four the season.

Ruffed Grouse, (Native "Pheasant")-3 grouse a day, twelve the season.

Wild Turkey—One turkey a day, one the season. Must be reported to the Conservation Commission within 20 days after date of kill, setting forth the date, time, place where killed and whether the turkey was male or female.

Quail—8 quail a day, thirty-five the season.

Cottontail Rabbit—Six cottontails a day, forty the season.

Deer—One buck with one or both antlers branched. One a day, one the season. Must be checked at checking station by game protector and be tagged with legal deer tag before it is removed from county where killed.

Raccoon 2 raccoons a day, ten the season. Two a day in any 24-hour period starting at noon for one person or group of persons hunting in a party.

Ringneck Pheasant—Cock birds only, one per day, three the season. Must be reported to the Executive Director within 20 days after date of kill.

Black Bear—One per day, one the season. Bear shall weigh 100 pounds or more. Woodchuck, Muskrat, Mink, Opossum, Red Fox and Skunk—No bag limits.

CONTROLLED PUBLIC SHOOTING AREAS

Certain areas within the boundaries of the State Forests named below will be set aside and plainly posted as refuges on which no hunting will be permitted. The territories outside these areas will be open to public shooting under regulations prescribed by the Executive Director of the Conservation Commission. The following State areas will be open for controlled hunting of specified game species:

Cooper's Rock State Forest—Deer, Ruffed Grouse, Cottontail Rabbit and Gray Squirrel.

Kumbrabow State Forest-Ruffed Grouse only.

Seneca State Forest—Deer, Ruffed Grouse, Cottontail Rabbit and Gray Squirrel. Cabwaylingo State Forest—Cottontail Rabbit, Quail and Gray Squirrel.

Watoga State Park—Open for hunting of deer with bow and arrow only, November 27, 1944 to December 2, 1944, inclusive.

All hunters MUST secure a permit at the Forest Office or Checking Station each day before entering the open shooting areas. Bag quotas and regulations for each particular area will be posted at the Forest Office or Checking Station giving full information applicable to the respective forests.

As a public safety measure no permits will be issued to persons under 15 years of age during the open deer season on these areas.

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 1, Chapter 20, Code of West Virginia as Amended Revised to March 6, 1943, the woodchuck, commonly known as ground-hog is hereby defined as a game animal subject to the following regulations, effective October 1, 1944.

Woodchuck, commonly known as groundhog, open season, effective October 1, 1944, extending to December 31, 1944, inclusive. The regular closed season shall then extend from January 1, 1945, to June 30, 1945, inclusive, in the following counties: Barbour, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Clay, Fayette, Grant, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Mingo, Monongalia, McDowell, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Raleigh, Randolph, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wetzel, Wood and Wyoming.

In the counties named above the woodchuck may be dug out of its den or killed in any manner, at any time, by landowners or occupants of farms or by members of their family, when such dens are located in their cultivated fields and said animals may also be dug out of dens in cultivated fields and killed in any manner, during the regular open season, in counties outlined above, by any other person if such person shall first have obtained specific permission from the owner or occupant of said farm and shall immediately after the removal thereof replace the earth and level off the area dug out.

In counties not named above the woodchuck may be killed at any time and in any manner except that it may be dug out of dens only when such dens are in cultivated fields.

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 1, Chapter 20, Code of West Virginia as Amended Revised to March 6, 1943, the Black Bear is defined as a game animal, subject to the following regulation, effective October 1, 1944, in all counties of the State:

Black Bear may be killed only from November 13, 1944 to December 2, 1944, inclusive. In such instances as bear killing livestock, the owner of said livestock shall, within 48 hours notify the nearest county game protector in whom is hereby vested the authority to supervise the killing of said animal. The bear may be trapped by the game protector if such procedure is advisable, otherwise the game protector may form, or authorize the formation of a hunting party to pursue and kill said animal. THE ABOVE SHALL APPLY IN ALL INSTANCES EXCEPT THAT BEAR MAY BE KILLED AT ANY TIME BY ANYONE WHEN SEEN IN ACT OF KILLING SHEEP OR OTHER LIVESTOCK.

Effective October 1, 1944, the bag limit for the open season shall be one bear weighing 100 pounds or more. One a day, one the season.

FISHING STREAMS AND SPECIES

(Compiled by B. D. Wills, Acting Fish Technician, Conservation Commission)

For the benefit of anglers who desire information relative to stocked fishing streams and nearest towns in which hotel accommodations can be found, the following list has been prepared. Numerous other streams and tributaries other than these listed have received substantial stockings of fish. These, however, are the largest, most important and probably the most capable of supporting extra heavy angling pressure. It must be understood that the order in which they are listed does not indicate the number of fish placed in the stream, or the anglers chances of catching fish. Fishing in any of these streams does not necessarily indicate that the Conservation Commission promises the limit of fish to each fisherman. This is intended merely as a guide.

EDUCATION

State Superintendent of Free Schools

West Virginia's schools in 1943-44 continued their many and varied contributions to America's war effort: more effective teaching of the fundamentals; extended health and physical education programs; addition of special pre-induction courses, along with increased enrollment in special vocational courses; hot lunches served to over 45,000 children daily in 664 schools; and bond and stamp sales in the schools totaling almost twelve million dollars. These are among the ways in which the schools of our State aided in winning the war.

The State contribution toward the support of education for 1943-44 totaled \$15,663,960.50.

Elementary Schools

Elementary schools in West Virginia had a gross enrollment of 277,283 pupils in 1943-44, a decrease of 8,226 from 1942-43. Elementary teachers employed were 10.064, a decrease of 341.

With the war emergency came supervisory problems presented by the emergency teacher. Great progress in solving these problems was made in 1943-44 through (1) a state-wide study to determine the type of help needed by emergency teachers; (2) seventeen regional conferences aimed at the improvement of supervision; and (3) in-service training classes and summer workshops on the college level.

Every teacher-training institution in the State cooperated by making available to nearby counties one or more instructors, who worked with the county administrative staff in leading teacher discussion groups, studying curriculum handbooks and other teaching aids, and doing actual classroom "laboratory" work in the basic subjects.

High Schools

For the school year 1943-44, West Virginia had 270 classified public high schools; 96 classified public junior high schools; and 14 private and parochial high schools. Enrollment in these totaled 123,963, as compared with 133,344 for the year 1942-43. The drop in enrollment was accompanied by a decrease in the percentage of pupils finishing high school.

Continued growth is found in the preparation and training of principals. Of secondary school principals, 86.1% now hold principals' certificates. An acute shortage of teachers temporarily lowered standards of teacher preparation: it was sometimes necessary to permit teachers to teach courses outside their certified fields, and in a few instances to approve for one-year emergency certificates teachers with training below that of a bachelor's degree.

Special objectives for the year for the division of secondary schools were (1) thoroughness in mastery of subject matter, especially those courses contributing to the war effort; (2) special preinduction courses, including physical fitness; (3) improving libraries and library services; and (4) curriculum revision.

Special preinduction classes were organized in mathematics, radio, electricity, mechanics, aviation, and driver education. Schools not large enough to organize special courses placed special emphasis on these topics in such regular courses as science and mathematics.

Certification of Teaching

Despite the war, standards for certification of regular teachers were not lowered. Teachers failing to meet renewal requirements were issued provisional certificates valid for a one-year period. There were 739 of these. Emergency certificates were granted to 2,512 teachers. Valid for one year only, emergency certificates cannot be renewed; they may be reissued, however, upon the request of a county superintendent. Acute teacher shortages still existed at the year's end in industrial arts, mathematics, science, and physical education.

The Single Curriculum, through which prospective teachers may receive the Public School Certificate for teaching in elementary and secondary schools, was the subject of a work conference at West Virginia Wesleyan College in September, 1943. Studying further ways to provide a training based chiefly upon the needs common to all teachers, the conference presented group reports which proved of inestimable aid in making more effective West Virginia's teacher-training program.

Schoolhouse Planning

A survey of school building needs showed an estimated \$26,000,000 in new schoolhouse construction needed in West Virginia. In preparation for post-war construction, the West Virginia Council on Schoolhouse Construction was set up, charged with the duty of preparing standards that would aid the counties in securing school buildings that are educationally efficient as well as structurally sound. A tentative draft entitled "Proposed Standards for Schoolhouse Construction" was submitted by the Council on July 1, 1944.

Transportation

West Virginia continued to lead the nation in extent and efficiency of its school transportation program. Every day, 133,901 children were taken to and from school in 1,176 school buses.

Although normal replacement requirements call for the purchase of approximately 125 new school buses each year, wartime restrictions allowed the purchase of only six during the school year 1943-44. Despite this, West Virginia achieved an outstanding record for school bus efficiency and safety. This record can be credited to the following: (1) High standards for the design and equipment of school buses. (2) An effective program of preventive maintenance. Forty county boards of education own and operate their own bus repair shops. (3) Careful selection and examination of bus drivers, involving both a written examination and a practical test before a special school bus driver's license is issued. A safety certificate is issued to each school bus driver operating his bus for a year without an accident for which he is responsible. (4) Training schools for bus driver instructors. In 1943-44, instructors were trained at three such schools. (5) A regular, state-wide school bus inspection program. In September, 1943, out of 1,172 buses inspected, 53 failed to pass; in December, 1,171 buses were inspected and 57 rejected; in March, 1944, 1,176 buses were inspected and 32 rejected. Buses rejected are made to conform with the standards, and then reinspected, before being used to transport children.

Vocational Rehabilitation

The vocational rehabilitation service of the State Department of Education was greatly expanded and accelerated within the fiscal year ending June 30, 1944. This development came about as a result of an increased appropriation by the West Virginia Legislature of 1943 and the enactment by the 78th Congress of the "Vocational Rehabilitation Act Amendments of 1943."

The major changes in the Federal Vocational Rehabilitation law through the amendments of 1943 were as follows:

1. The scope of services available to disabled persons was broadened to include any services necessary to render them capable of engaging in remunerative

employment or to render them more advantageously employable. These services include surgical or medical care, hospitalization, therapeutic treatment, artificial appliances, vocational guidance and training, maintenance during training, and placement in employment. Specific provisions were made for the rehabilitation of the blind and war disabled civilians. The latter are defined to include members of the citizens defense corps, aircraft warning service, civil air patrol, and the merchant marine. Mentally as well as physically disabled individuals are now eligible for rehabilitation.

2. The fiscal provisions were liberalized. Grants to the states are now based on actual requirements and the amount of state funds available for matching, rather than on the basis of population. The Federal Government assumes the entire cost of the administration of state programs. In contrast to the previous requirement of matching on a 50-50 basis, it assumes one-half of the cost of medical examinations, surgical and therapeutic treatment, hospitalization, prosthetic appliances, transportation, occupational tools and licenses, rehabilitation training and maintenance. The entire cost of these services are assumed by the Federal Government in the case of war disabled civilians. Sole responsibility for the administration, supervision, and control of this program rests with the State Board of Education.

Within the last fiscal year, the rehabilitation service had a total case load of 5,777. Of this number, a total of 2,613 were closed and transferred out during the year, leaving a net live roll at the end of the year of 3,164 cases.

Of the 2,613 cases which were closed and transferred out, 691 were rehabilitated; each of these disabled persons was prepared for a job and placed in permanent employment at standard wages. The remaining 1,922 cases of those closed and transferred out received partial rehabilitation service but were not given sufficient assistance to be closed as rehabilitated cases.

The net live roll at the end of the year of 3,164 cases was in the process of rehabilitation and classified as follows: 1,708 were in the reported status; 750 in the interviewed status; 153 in appliances being fitted; 208 in school training; 10 in employment training; 36 in other training; 54, ready for job prepared; 2, ready for job placement only; 4 in temporary employment; 29 in rehabilitation employment; 57, training interrupted; 4, other service interrupted.

Vocational Education

The vocational agriculture, home economics, trade and industrial education, distributive education, and occupational information and guidance services continued to stress education and training of both youth and adults for war-time activities in agriculture, industry, homemaking, and business.

Teachers of vocational agriculture emphasized increased production of needed agricultural commodities in their day classes for high school boys and in their evening classes for adult farmers. Instruction was given in the production of dairy products, poultry and eggs, swine, beef, sheep, farm crops, and fruit and vegetables; in the repair of farm machinery and equipment; and in the production and conservation of food for family use. Vocational agriculture teachers served as supervisors or instructors of courses operated under the Food Production War Training Program. Sixty-seven of the seventy-eight white departments and three of the five Negro departments conducted such courses, a majority of which were farm machinery repair and food preservation courses.

Nutrition and health, and the processing of food for family use, were emphasized by teachers of vocational home economics. Many of these served as teachers or supervisors of food preservation courses in school-community food preservation centers.

Trade and industrial teachers conducted day vocational classes for high school boys to prepare them for jobs in industry and for induction into the armed services. Also evening and part-time classes were conducted by these teachers for employed workers to increase their efficiency in their present occupations.

Day trade schools to give pre-employment training to high school boys for employment in the mining industry were established in a number of centers.

In the field of distributive education teachers gave preemployment training to high school boys and girls to prepare them for employment in retail stores and service occupations. Evening classes were conducted by these teachers for persons employed in distributive occupations. Many of these employees were in new positions due to older employees leaving for the armed services and other employment.

The occupational information and guidance service combined to assist schools in organizing guidance programs within the schools and in the communities Emphasis was placed on the counseling of youth about to be inducted into the armed services, or who were leaving school through graduation or for other reasons.

In addition to the longer established programs of vocational education, agriculture, home economics, trades and industry, distributive education, and occupational information and guidance listed above, the State Board of Education was responsible for the administration of two war-time vocational training programs: (1) Food Production War Training, (2) Vocational Education for War Production Workers. Teachers, teacher trainers, and supervisors of the vocational education services devoted much time and effort to these two war-time programs in addition to their regular duties.

Food Production War Training

During the fiscal year ending June 30. 1944, under provisions of Public Law 135, the U. S. Office of Education allotted the State \$219,502.70 for the operation of the Food Production War Training Program. Of this total, \$43,425.50 was earmarked for the purchase of necessary additional equipment and rental of space.

Through the medium of this program 553 courses in auto-mechanics, metalwork, woodwork, electricity, farm machinery repair, commodity production, and food conservation were operated in 40 counties, and also at West Virginia University, Potomac State School, and West Virginia State College. Of this number, more than 60% of the total number of courses offered were courses in farm machinery repair.

The total gross enrollment for the year was 9,003, of which 349 were female trainees and 219 Negroes. More than 60% of the total number of trainees were enrolled in the farm machinery repair courses alone; and more than a half million trainee hours were completed in all the courses offered. Interest was centered largely in the farm machinery repair and food processing courses. Due to the acute shortage of farm labor and available new farm equipment and parts, this machinery repair course played a vital role in the Food for Freedom campaign. Literally thousands of pieces, ranging from plow points to mowing machines and tractors, were repaired and put into service in the various training centers throughout the farm areas of the State.

Food Processing Courses operated in 15 counties. School canning plants, cooperatively equipped with local and Federal funds, were established in Barbour, Berkeley, Grant, Lewis, McDowell, Preston and Raleigh counties. Others are in the process of construction in Cabell, Greenbrier, Hardy, Monroe, Jackson, Mercer, Monongalia, Roane, Wirt, and Wyoming counties, and at West Virginia State College. These plants are an integral part of the local high schools, and are under the supervision of the departments of Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics.

Vocational Training for War Production Workers

A total of 10,275 persons received in 1943-44 training for war production in such fields as machine shop, welding, electricity, mechanical drawing, automotive mechanics, aircraft sheet metal working, and aircraft woodworking. A new program of importance to West Virginia initiated within the year is the training program for mine mainatenance mechanics, with courses established at Logan, Bluefield, and Beckley.

THE STATE TEACHER RETIREMENT SYSTEM

In 1941 the legislature of West Virginia made educational history by passage of a modern teacher retirement law.

The following classes of employees are eligible for membership: in the public schools and state supported colleges including the state university, members of the administrative, research, extension, library, and instructional staff, and any person regularly employed for instructional service; the state superintendent of schools, all employees of the department of education and the state board of education who perform services of an educational nature; the secretary of the retirement board; and county school attendance directors holding West Virginia teachers' certificates.

The general administration and responsibility for the operation of the State Teachers Retirement System and for making effective the provisions of the retirement act of 1941 are vested in the Teachers Retirement Board composed of seven members: the governor, who is chairman ex officio, the state superintendent of free schools, the state treasurer, the state insurance commissioner, and three teacher-members elected for three-year terms by members of the retirement system. The manner and mode of such election is determined by the retirement board. Vacancies occurring in term of elected members are filled for unexpired periods by the governor upon the recommendation of the state superintendent of schools. Members of the board serve without salary, receiving, however, salaries from their employers and reimbursements for expenses while performing board duties. The attorney general of the state is the legal adviser of the board.

The board employs an executive secretary and the technical and administrative employees necessary to carry out the provisions of the act. Individual accounts are kept, showing each member's contributions and accrued interest at three percent compounded annually. At least once within the first three years of the operation of the law and each quinquennial period thereafter, the board is required to employ a competent actuary to make an evaluation of the system. Annual reports showing the condition of the various funds are made.

Beginning with the school year 1941-42 in July, each member contributed monthly to his individual account four percent of that part of his salary which did not exceed two thousand five hundred dollars. The employer makes the deduction, and reports such amounts quarterly to the retirement board. The latter deducts the member's contribution from the employer's appropriation or state aid, and credits each individual account in the Teachers' Accumulation Fund. The amount to match the teacher's payment is transferred from the appropriation of the retirement system, and deposited in the Employer's Accumulation Fund. Voluntary contributions may be made at any time in multiples of one hundred dollars, interest at three percent being compounded annually.

When a member retires, the accumulated contributions of the member and employer with interest are transferred to the Benefit Fund from which all annuities and pensions are paid. Expenses of operating the system are disbursed from the Expense Fund; a Reserve Fund is also established from which interest and needed transfers are paid to other funds.

Each member files with the retirement board a statement of his length of service for which he claims credit for service as a teacher prior to July 1, 1941. Upon vertification of such claims, the retirement board issues certificates for the "prior service" verified. In 1943 the legislature amended the retirement law, providing that prior service credit shall be granted for service in the armed forces in any period within which a federal selective service act is in effect.

When members withdraw from service for causes other than death or retirement, upon request they are paid their own accumulated contributions with interest; at death such payments are made to the member's estate or to a person nominated by the member by written notice filed with the retirement board. Ten years after a teacher ceases to be a member of the system, if he does not claim his contributions and the board cannot locate him, such contributions are

forfeited to the retirement system. A teacher with twenty years service, upon withdrawal from membership, may elect to receive at retirement age an annuity which is the actuarial equivalent of his accumulated contributions with interest plus the employer's contribution with interest.

Rights of members to retirement allowances, or any other benefits are exempt from state or municipal taxes, and are not subject to garnishment, attachment, or any other similar legal process.

Through authorization granted in the retirement law, the Teachers Retirement Board approved the following five annuity options, one of which the teacher selects at retirement:

Option A. Annuity payable for the lifetime of the teacher.

Option B. Annuity payable for the lifetime of the teacher, and provided that, in the event of the teacher's death before the total annuity payments, supported by teacher's contributions, equal the teacher's accumulated contributions at retirement, a sum equal to the balance (determined upon an actuarial basis) of such contributions shall be paid to the beneficiary or the estate.

Option B-1. Annuity payable for the lifetime of the teacher, and provided that, in the event of the teacher's death before the total annuity payments, supported by teacher's and employer's accumulated contributions, equal the teacher's and employer's contributions at retirement, a sum equal to the balance (determined upon an actuarial basis) of such contributions shall be paid to the beneficiary or the estate.

Option C. Annuity payable for the lifetime of the teacher, and provided that, should the teacher die prior to the beneficiary, the annuity would be continued for the same amount to the beneficiary for the lifetime of the beneficiary.

Option D. Annuity payable for the lifetime of the teacher, and provided that, should the teacher die prior to the beneficiary, the annuity would be continued for half the amount to the beneficiary for the lifetime of the beneficiary.

Members of the retirement board are the trustees of all the funds of the system. Investments are made only in bonds of the United States Government and bonds of the State of West Virginia, or one of its subdivisions such as a county, school district or municipality. When a governmental subdivision issues bonds, it must offer to sell them to the retirement board before advertising; however, the board of public works accepts or rejects the offer.

In 1942-43 total interest earnings were \$24,968.56, and average annual interest rate was 2.51 percent on investments in effect on June 30, 1943. On June 30, 1944, total securities held by retirement board amounted to \$2,685,500, in two funds: par value, Employers Accumulation Fund, \$1,381,500, and par value, Teachers Accumulation Fund, \$1,304,000.

STATE FIRE MARSHAL

HISTORY AND DUTIES OF THE OFFICE

The West Virginia State Fire Marshal's Office has been in continuous operation for thirty-five years, having been created by an act of the Legislature in the year 1909.

This department of the State Government was established for the purpose of organized fire prevention work, inspection of buildings for the elimination of fire hazards, investigation of all fires of incendiary origin and the bringing to justice of culprits charged with arson. The officials of the department are not only interested in securing evidence against arsonists but it is their duty to assist the Prosecuting Attorneys in the trials of such suspects.

The investigation and prosecution of arson, important as these phases of the office's duties are, are only part of the program which embraces the protection of the citizens and their belongings from the hazards of fire. Fires, whether they be the result of criminal intent and action, of negligence and carelessness on the part of the individual or of unavoidable origin, are in the final analysis equally destructive in their results. Therefore, inspections of every sort for the purpose of preventing conflagrations and reducing fire losses as well as training and educating the masses in all conceivable safety measures are major objectives of the Fire Marshal's staff.

In recent years inspections of public buildings and of private property, where it has deteriorated into a fire hazard, have been made in increasing numbers in every section of West Virginia. Although the number of inspectors and investigators working under the direction of the Fire Marshal consists of only four, a record in this field has been established. During the year of 1943 more than 1,250 inspections were made, 1,167 of which were schools of six rooms or more. Incidentally, these inspections covered every one of of the fifty-five counties of the state.

Public buildings, including schools, theatres, moving picture houses, dry cleaning plants, in addition to private buildings which were fire hazards to adjoining property, have been investigated throughout the state.


The inspection of the public schools, a sizeable task, is to be an annual event. In fact, the reinspection for the year 1944 is now practically completed.

In this connection it will probably be of interest to school patrons to know that a careful inspection of all schools of six rooms or more was completed December 31 and all violations of a minor or major nature were recorded and recommendations for the corrections sent immediately to the County Superintendents and Presidents the Boards of Education of the respective counties. In the 1,167 schools a total of 3,734 violations were listed. These included improper storage of ashes, coals and combustibles, inadequate means of egress, insufficient clearance for cooking and heating stoves, use of flexible gas tubing, broken parts of stoves, unapproved electrical installations, unprotected openings and various other violations. In most instances the school authorities gladly cooperated with this office and marked improvement has been made in the schools of most counties.

The State Fire Marshal's Office and the fire departments of the state are so entwined by legislative enactment and by bonds of mutual endeavor that they cooperate as a single unit. The Fire Extension School held annually at the West Virginia University, sponsored by the University and the State Fire Marshal, is an example of this close cooperation.

For thirty-five years this office has worked smoothly and efficiently in the discharge of its duties and is now carrying on in the second world war of its history. The participation of our nation in military conflict adds to the responsibilities of the department but it nevertheless strives with renewed vigor to fulfill the tasks assigned it by circumstances.

Cheat River

Formed by the junction of Black Fork and Shavers Fork at Parsons, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Monongahela River at Point Marion, Pennsylvania.

Coal River

Source in central part of Raleigh County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at St. Albans, Kanawha County.

Elk River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at Charleston, Kanawha County.

Gauley River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with New River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Greenbrier River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with New River just above Hinton in Summers County.

Guyandotte River

Source in southern part of Raleigh County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Huntington, Cabell County.

Kanawha River

Formed by the junction of New and Gauley Rivers just above Kanawha Falls in Fayette County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Point Pleasant, Mason County.

Little Kanawha River

Source in southern part of Upshur County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Parkersburg.

Monongahela River

Formed by the junction of Tygart and West Fork Rivers at Fairmont. Joins the Allegheny River at Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, to form the Ohio River.

New River

Source in southern part of Watauga County in northwest corner of North Carolina. Mouth, junction with Gauley River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Ohio River

Formed by the junction of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers, at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Mouth, junction with Mississippi River at Cairo, Illinois.

Potomac River

Formed by the junction of the North and South Branches near Green Spring, Hampshire County. Mouth, Chesapeake Bay.

North Branch Potomac River

Source at Fairfax Stone which today marks western limits of Maryland and corners of Grant and Tucker counties. Mouth, junction with South Branch to form Potomac River.

South Branch Potomac River

Source near Hightown, Highland County, Virginia. Mouth, junction with North Branch to form Potomac River near Green Spring, Hampshire County.

Tug Fork

GEOGRAPHICAL CENTER OF WEST VIRGINIA

The geographical center of the State is $4\frac{3}{4}$ miles southeast of Sutton, 6 miles south of Flatwoods, and 4 miles west of Centralia.

DEPTH AVAILABLE FOR NAVIGATION

(Data Furnished by the War Department-Revised to July 1, 1944)

Ohio River—Improvement of the Ohio River, as authorized by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of June 25, 1910, provides for a channel depth of 9 feet in the entire 981 miles of the river by the construction of locks and dams and open channel work. The system of locks and dams throughout the river

provides a navigable depth of 9 feet at ordinary river stage. New dams of modern design have been completed near Hogsett, West Virginia, (Gallipolis Lock and Dam), at Montgomery Island, 32 miles below Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and at Emsworth Locks 6.2 miles below Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Monongahela River, West Virginia and Pennsylvania—The existing project provides for improvement of the river by 13 locks and dams to afford slackwater navigation for its entire length from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to one mile above Fairmont, a distance of 128 miles. The project is approximately complete and the controlling depth between Pittsburgh and Point Marion, Pennsylvania, 90.6 miles above the mouth is 9 feet, and above Point Marion 7 feet to the upper limits of the project.

Kanawha River, West Virginia—The existing project provides for the construction of 3 modern dams on the Kanawha River, with twin locks at London, Marmet and Winfield, and the Gallipolis lock and dam on the Ohio River, near Hogsett, West Virginia, to furnish a 9-foot navigable depth from the Ohio to a point 90.57 miles above the mouth. The dams at London and Marmet were completed in 1934, and the Winfield dam in 1937. The Gallipolis lock and dam was completed in October, 1937, thus making available a channel depth of 9 feet from the mouth of the river to the head of navigation.

Big Sandy River, West Virginia and Kentucky, including Levisa and Tug Forks—The existing project provides for 3 locks and dams on the main river, and one lock and dam each on Levisa Fork and Tug Fork. Only the lower lock and dam on the main river is in operation at the present time to provide a slack-water depth of 6 feet from the Ohio River to a point about 10 miles above the mouth. The remaining two structures on the main river have movable dams which are placed in use only at such times as the needs of navigation require. The Levisa Fork Lock and Dam No. 1 and the Tug Fork Lock and Dam No. 1 have not been operated for several years.

Tygart River Reservoir—The Tygart River Dam, located on the Tygart River 2½ miles upstream from Grafton, as authorized by the Public Works Administration January 11, 1934, and approved by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of August 30, 1935, provides for a dam 1,880 feet long and 207 feet high for the storage of 290,000-acre tract of water to control floods and aid navigation in the Monongahela River. The dam has been completed and is now in operation as a unit in the reservoir system for the protection of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and the upper Ohio Valley generally.

Bluestone Reservoir Project—This Federal public works undertaking was authorized by Presidential executive order in 1935 and approved by Congress under the Flood Control Act of 1936. Construction work did not get under way until early in 1942, however, when the Dravo Corporation of Pittsburgh, Pa., the principal contractors, started construction of the dam. In January, 1943, the War Production Board directed that construction of the project be deferred except for a certain amount of work required to bring the project to a safe point of suspension. This work completed during February, 1944, consisted principally of completing that portion of the dam inside the first cofferdam to a level approximating that of the top of the cofferdam and removal of the cofferdam.

The project is expected to cost about 27 million dollars when entirely complete. The reservoir project, designed by Army Engineers to provide flood control for the "war industry" Kanawha and Ohio Valleys, will also generate electric power and will aid navigation on the lower river. The dam when completed will be 165 high and 2,060 feet long. The reservoir will serve a watershed drainage area of 4565 square miles and will provide a lake some 36 miles long. A water-head of about 135 feet will be impounded behind the dam which is located just outside the corporation limits of Hinton on New River. The proposed ultimate power installation will provide an average primary energy output of 122 million kilowatt hours and a secondary energy output of about 300 million kilowatt hours, with a gross annual power value of \$1,625,000.

WEST VIRGINIA LIBRARIES

At the end of the fiscal year June 30, 1944, the West Virginia Library Commission completed its second full year of service to the people of the state. In those two years the commission purchased 7,500 books which were properly catalogued and processed for use. To this number were added the 6,200 volumes transferred to the commission by the federal library project at its termination. The commission headquarters in Morgantown in this short time has become a state lending library and a clearing house for public library problems. It has been engaged in the work of editing the quarterly library news publication, promoting library extension activities, compiling statistics and taking part in numerous institutes and meetings of the library profession.

The Library Commission book circulation records show that 111 traveling library loans have been sent, a total of 5,778 books. Of these, 2,556 were adult and 3,122 juvenile books. Thirty-nine communities in 32 counties have used and are using these loans. Three traveling libraries were introduced into communities by Farm Women's and 4-H Clubs. Other loans to libraries were sponsored by P. T. A., A. A. U. W., B. and P. W. Clubs, lodge groups and other organizations,

As borrowers the public libraries take advantage of the state Library Commission to get books to supplement their own collections. A box of from 50 to 75 books called a "traveling library" is loaned for three months, upon request, to libraries that have a regular librarian in charge and that are open to the public regularly. The only cost is postage. Several clubs and P. T. A. groups have also undertaken the sponsorship of traveling library service by keeping the books in a central place in the community and having a regular person in charge to distribute them.

A check on the registration file shows that books have been sent by mail to residents of Hancock County in the tip of the northern panhandle, to Jefferson County in the very extremity of the eastern panhandle, to Pleasants, Jackson and Mason Counties along the Ohio River, to Hardy, Pendleton and Pocahontas Counties in the eastern mountains, to McDowell, Mingo and Wayne Counties down on the Kentucky line and to every county in between except seven.

Smaller "package" loans are available from the Library Commission to club leaders conducting study or recreational programs within their groups. The loans are sent for one month with a four-week renewal privilege. The only cost is postage. From five to fifteen or twenty books are sent in the "package loan" to the club reading leader who distributes the books among the members and sees to their frequent exchange.

During the past year the Library Commission has cooperated with the State Farm Women's Council in providing books for the many Farm Women's Clubs in their education committee study of war and postwar planning. The Commission staff prepared and circulated an annotateed book list, "Call to the Colors." It listed the books on the subject of war and peace plans which are available at the Library Commission and the titles were much used.

The registration file shows that 75 clubs in 30 counties took part in this study and in the program of recreational reading, which is a wide distribution in West Virginia's 55 counties. Monroe and Upshur Counties were high with eight clubs in each county participating in the reading project and borrowing books from the Library Commission. In Nicholas County all the farm women's clubs (six) took part and in Hampshire County there were five or more. Clubs in Doddridge,

Grant, Jackson, Monroe and Putnam counties found in the Library Commission their only free library service for there are no local public libraries in any of these counties.

The circulation of books for a one-month loan period, that is, package libraries, inter-library loans, or loans to individuals, totals to date 1,762. Of these, 1,387 were adult and 350 juvenile. Letters received indicate that these figures could be multiplied by two or three or more to show actual number of times the books were read. However, the Library Commission record conforms to practice of state commissions elsewhere and shows only a circulation of one for each book sent out.

The Legislature of 1941 appropriated the sum of \$10,000 annually for the support and maintenance of this needed department. The personnel of the agency consists of a Librarian, who serves as the head of the commission, an executive secretary, a cataloguer and a part-time typist. Although one of the newest commissions of the state, its work has been so comprehensive and its results so farreaching that it has quickly taken its place among the worthwhile institutions of West Virginia.



ROADS

"THE POST-WAR HIGHWAY SYSTEM"

By ERNEST L. BAILEY, State Road Commissioner

With victory looming on the horizon, and the outcome of this global conflict well apparent, the State Road Commission turns its thoughts to future channels—channels which will have a decided effect on our mode of living in the post-war years ahead. Ever alert of the great transition facing us after V-Day, the Commission has carefully prepared its plans for this period of readjustment and will be ready to turn blueprints into new roads at an instant's notice.

Foremost with the Commission during wartime has been the task of conserving its 33,000-mile network of highways, representing a \$600,000,000 investment of the citizens of the state. At the same time our engineers and supervisory personnel have given unsparingly of their time over the past thirty-three months preparing for this transition, and today we are in position to accept the challenges which will arise in the near future.

Among the major problems involved in post-war planning are the relief of traffic congestion in and around urban areas, and the relief of post-war unemployment. Although there are many miles of rural highways that remain to be improved, there are few rural areas in West Virginia that are unreasonably remote from some type of hard-surfaced highway. We anticipate a tremendous increase in the number of motor vehicles in post-war years, as well as an increase in mileage travelled per vehicle. This condition, aided by the hard-surfacing of rural highways, will create a congestion in cities and large towns, almost the opposite of the traffic problems of thirty years ago. Bettering traffic conditions in and around our cities constitutes a major phase in our post-war program. It will also be necessary to include in post-war planning a vast program of replacements of highways in which maintenance has been deferred in favor of highways that were deemed essential to the war effort.

The future of our secondary road system appears assured with a long range planning program ready to become a reality. A few years ago the Commission laid out a 20-year program of work for our rural system that would afford the people, the schools and churches, and rural free delivery adequate roads, adjacent to a higher standard of living. A review of that program reveals that there is much unfinished work ahead. A bare outline shows that we have yet to complete 150 miles of high type pavement; 800 miles of low bituminous pavement; 3,000 miles of metal surface; 9,000 miles of stabilization and the reconstruction of 500 bridges. This is an immediate need and one that will add up to many millions of dollars before its completion. We have today more than 28,000 miles of our secondary system with less than 900 miles being designated on the Federal Aid Secondary system. Therefore it can be readily seen that the burden of construction and improvements to rural roads will be left up to state financing.

Our rural program's future lies in the decentralization of population now concentrated in industrial areas. Adequate secondary highways plus diligent action and intelligent planning will be indispensible in this return to the farm movement, anticipated at the conclusion of the war.

The needs of war have necessarily during the past year curtailed peace time highway construction. The Federal government, through the War Production Board, has restricted new construction to projects considered essential to the war effort, such as providing adequate roads to serve military establishments, important war industries and sources of raw materials, particularly coal. For many years the largest producer of bituminous coal in the nation, this state has greatly expanded production by new development. Coal stripping operations alone are expected to produce approximately 12,000,000 tons of coal in 1944, and this coal is trucked over highways to railroad loading points.

For the above reasons our engineering department has had a rather full program in the development of current surveys and plans. The necessity for preparing plans for the expected expansion of construction after the war is fully realized and the Congress has under consideration a bill to provide funds for a very large Federal-aid highway program to be undertaken immediately after the cessation of hostilities. This is based on the premise, first that there will be a grave unemployment situation during the readjustment period, and secondly that the cessation of normal highway construction during the war has created a deficit which only an accelerated road building program can overcome. During the last depression it was in construction where men first began to lose their jobs in large numbers. In 1932 a large per cent of the construction workers were jobless. Unemployment in construction was directly responsible for throwing other millions out of jobs in mines, mills, factories, stores, offices and railroads Our contemplated program will provide jobs on work of paramount necessity.

In view of the above the State Road Commission has set up a list of projects to be engineered as rapidly as possible. The estimated construction cost of these projects totals more than \$66,000,000. Although they were selected on the basis of highway needs and were approved by the Public Roads Administration as priority projects, full consideration was given to a proper distribution to afford employment and other benefits to every section of the state.

Our tremendous turn-over of maintenance crews is attributable to the loss of men to the armed forces and to industrial development. More than 800 employees of the Commission are now in the service. Around industrial areas, personnel replacements are not readily available as the Commission operates on a fixed wage scale and cannot compete with wages prevalent in such areas.

Despite shortage of personnel and pressure of other work, real progress has been made in preparing post-war plans. As of August 1, 1944, surveys and plans had been started or completed on projects of an estimated value of over \$31,400,000. Of this contracts in the amount of approximately \$5,000,000 cculd be advertised at once, and others could follow rapidly. In addition to these heavy construction jobs, there is a large volume of resurfacing and reconstruction work requiring little engineering and which could be let quickly. As our annual heavy construction contracts prior to the war averaged between five and six million dollars, we are in position to rapidly expand our construction after the war, should funds be available.

Highway needs are widespread and urgent and the Commission takes the position that it has struck the right formula in the preparation of its post-war plans. With proper coordination, plus an intelligent method of procedure, these future challenges will be met and overcome.

SPEED LIMITS

The speed limit for automobiles on open country highways in West Virginia is 45 miles per hour; on suburban streets, 25 miles per hour; and on city streets, 20 miles per hour. For the duration of the war, however, the motoring public is being asked to voluntarily accept a 35-mile-per-hour limit in order to conserve rubber.

An operator of a motor vehicle must be at least 16 years of age. The fee for a learner's permit is \$1.00, and the fee for an operator's license is 75 cents. An operator's license expires four years from the date of issuance and may be renewed for successive periods of four years upon the payment of a fee of 75 cents for each such renewal.

WAR TIME RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

West Virginia, due to her geographical location, natural resources, transportation facilities and topography, early became recognized as a great center of one of the most vital and extensive war production areas. All the great manufacturing plants and natural resource producing industries are engaged in an extensive production effort, all of which is integrated as a job of indispensable war production.

The Department of Public Safety (West Virginia State Police) recognized both the high privilege and grave responsibility that West Virginia would sustain during this stressive period of conflict, and immediately, in order to make her workers and her industry secure against molestation by subversive elements or representatives of beligerent nations against the United States, inaugurated department training schools to teach its own members effective police methods for the prevention of sabotage in industry, protection of its populace, and facilitating military movements throughout the state. The members who received such training in turn gave instructions to classes of industrial plant police, auxiliary police, and aided in teaching civic organizations in war time duties.

The organization, as has been its custom always, accorded gratuitous and prompt cooperation with all federal enforcement and quasi-enforcement agencies requesting its aid and assistance and in this gave especial effort and promptness to matters touching the common security. Every undertaking was diligently consummated, the results of which are demonstrated by the minimum of disturbances in the vital industries and movements throughout the state.

Today the organization stands at approximately 62% of its 1941 personnel; 38% being in the armed services of the United States. The 62% steadfast remaining have perpetually endeavored to maintain the excellent efficiency which the Department is delighted to preserve and cherish while those members serving their country in arms are absent.

SUBVERSIVE ACTIVITIES—The Department of Public Safety has kept constant vigil in cooperation with all other enforcement agencies for sabotage and espionage since the formal declaration of War by Congress in December, 1941. This constant vigil has minimized the loss of time in production to such a low ebb that it may properly be said the war production program in West Virginia has progressed without suffering a single destructive incident through any agent or agencies, of an alien enemy. All of this was accomplished by careful and diligent investigation of every complaint received from the patriotic citizenry of this state. At present the department has a total of 610 cases in file—7,320 man hours were spent investigating these cases, while 76,250 miles were traveled.

SELECTIVE SERVICE—To this time the organization has aided Selective Service Boards and the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the location of 492 delinquent selectees, which required 30,404 miles of travel and 5,892 man hours; these investigations also constituted voluminous correspondence with officers of other states and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. It has furnished State Policemen for escorting selectees to examination centers prior to induction into the armed services.

LST (Landing Ship-Tank) PROTECTION, OHIO RIVER—The upper Ohio River was the scene of the manufacture of numerous LST Boats, which, upon completion were piloted down the waters of the Ohio. At the request of the United States Coast Guard, Cincinnati, Ohio, plans were formulated in October, 1942, to safeguard the trips of these boats by the police of the states bordering thereon. Bridges were guarded in order that no missile in the hands of a saboteur might

imperil the safety of their journey towards the sea, and no photograph might be made, which might fall into the hands of some foreign agent. The Department contributed 6,076 man hours and 32,586 vehicle miles travel to this task.

MILITARY CONVOYS—West Virginia, due to her topography, offered nearly perfect training areas for army engineers and soldiers. Her highways traversing east and west, north and south, make her a gateway from the west, southwest and south, over which convoys of troops were transported by motor. The State Troopers piloted those convoys from their entrance into the state to their destination of exit from the state, to guard against delay, since time is an essential factor in army movements. 95,607 miles were traveled escorting those convoys and 8,632 man hours were spent in the dispatch of that duty.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE—To date a total of 5,132 man hours and 26,045 miles of travel has been contributed to Civilian Defense in the promotion of measures for application in cases of disaster. Individual members attended various schools conducted in Civilian Defense, and those members were in turn assigned to conduct local schools giving like instructions to groups of citizens throughout the state.

State Police radio network over the state constituted the point of origin and the main channels of the air raid alarm blackout system which was engineered and designed to give the maximum efficiency of coverage with a minimum of time elapsed from the starting signal. The approximate time required to disseminate blackout and white test messages ranged from three to seven minutes. There were 118 blackout messages and 85 white test messages received and disseminated.

PERSONNEL INVESTIGATIONS—153 cases have been investigated for special personnel to fill key positions in the protection and production lines of vital defense plants. 76 of the 153 cases required special investigations, necessitating 11,487 miles of travel and 1,836 man hours were attributed to this task. Faithful employees in industry, demonstrated by World War No. 1, has been recognized as one of great importance since enemy aliens work with greatest success through unsuspected intermediators. The value of the investigations are proved by the fact that there has been no sabotage of major importance where industry has carried out a plan of careful preemployment investigation.

RATION BOARDS—The distribution of rationing coupons by the Office of Price Administration met many obstacles and difficulties in rural and remote communities. The distribution of these coupons was an emergency which necessitated prompt delivery in order that every household should enjoy sufficient food to maintain health and happiness in the home. The West Virginia State Police with its network of transportation and cognizance of the location of the local rural distribution points, aided the Sheriffs of the counties in placing these coupons available to the remotest family in a few hours. This task resulted in the travel of 27,102 miles and the consummation of 3,259 man hours.

THE PUBLIC WELFARE LAW OF WEST VIRGINIA

Condensed Statement of Its Enactment, Its Purposes, and Its Services
(Compiled by the Public Assistance Staff)

The Public Welfare Law of West Virginia was enacted June 20, 1936, to take effect from passage, the Legislature "declaring itself eager to provide, so far as it is possible to do so, for the permanent protection of its citizens against the recurring misfortunes of life". The act modernized the statutory provisions relating to welfare services assembling them into a single integrated system, and created the State Department of Public Assistance and a public assistance office in each county to administer the State's welfare services.

Provision is made for three general kinds of public welfare services:

- Asistance to the extent necessary to safeguard a decent and healthful existence:
- 2. Treatment aimed at restoring health;
- 3. Service designed to protect the welfare of certain groups.

Cash assistance is made available in the following forms: Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children, and General Relief. These types of cash assistance are financed entirely from the State and Federal funds. Primary financial responsibility for General Relief rests upon the counties, although State funds are available as appropriated by the Legislature for supplementation when county funds are insufficient. The eligibility requirements for cash assistance are established by the Public Welfare Law, and there are three requirements which are common to all four types of cash assistance: need, residence in the state, and the responsibility of certain relatives to assist an indigent person. The necessity for complying with these eligibility requirements readily differentiates the assistance through the department from pension plans.

Old Age Assistance

Old Age Assistance, as the name implies, is available only to needy persons when they become sixty-five years of age. Although the Public Welfare Law stipulates that a maximum monthly grant of \$40 can be paid an Old Age Assistant recipient, the actual grant depends upon an individual's needs and the funds appropriated for assistance purposes.

Aid to the Blind

Aid to the blind can be granted only to those persons with extremely limited vision. The degree of vision which enables an applicant to qualify for this form of assistance is set forth in the Public Welfare Law and is determined by medical examination.

Aid to Dependent Children

Aid to dependent children is designed to prevent the breaking up of homes when children are deprived of parental support because of a parent's death, absence from home, or physical or mental incapacity. This form of assistance has made it possible for thousands of children to remain in their homes under the supervision of their mothers, with opportunity to obtain education and parental care.

General Relief

Needy persons who do not qualify for any other form of assistance may be provided for through the General Relief Program. Treatment to restore health for those in need is provided through three separate programs: general medical care and hospitalization, adult physical rehabilitation, and crippled children's services.

General Medical Care

General medical care is provided persons, irrespective of age, on a needs basis, and includes treatment by physicians, surgery, dental care, and the fitting of glasses.

Adult Physical Rehabilitation

Adults who have physical handicaps which can be corrected by means of surgery, medical treatment, and artificial appliances, and who are eligible for assistance, can be treated.

Crippled Children's Services

The State Department provides medical, surgical, and other corrective treatment to those children for whom adequate care, treatment and rehabilitation is not available from other than public services.

Three kinds of services are available to protect the welfare of certain groups: children, veterans and persons with visual defects. These services are available to any resident of West Virginia, irrespective of financial circumstances.

Child Welfare

The Public Welfare Law gives the State Department of Public Assistance wide responsibility for the protection, care and treatment of any child under eighteen years of age who is destitute, homeless, or abandoned; has not proper parental care or guardianship; is living in an improper place; violates a law or municipal ordinance; engages in an occupation which is in violation of law, etc. This includes supervision of children in their own homes or in foster homes; children who are being adopted; children on probation from juvenile courts or who are paroled from State correctional institutions. The Public Welfare Law charges the State Department with licensing and supervision of institutions giving care to children.

Veteran's Services

Service is provided any honorably discharged veteran or his family in presenting claims before the United States Veterans' Administration. In addition, information is made available concerning compensation, insurance, rehabilitation, hospitalization, and allowances provided by the United States Government, by this State, and by other states. The availability of such services is of paramount importance to the thousands of West Virginians who are serving in the armed forces of their country during the present war.

Conservation of Vision and Prevention of Blindness

Service to persons with visual handicaps is aimed at helping them to secure treatment, education, employment, and in making satisfactory adjustments to their handicaps so that they can lead a happy and productive life. To the extent of available funds, treatment is provided to restore vision or prevent loss of vision. Employers are contacted to enlist their support for safety devices that reduce industrial hazards to vision and to assist visually handicapped persons in obtaining employment.

General Statement

The confidential character of Public Assistance records is set forth in Sec. 16, Art. 11, Ch. 9, of the Public Welfare Law, in order to prevent misuse of Public Assistance lists and records.

Assistance and service through the Department of Public Assistance are administered through offices located in each county seat. County offices take applications and establish eligibility for the various assistance programs under the immediate supervision of county councils. Each county council consists of five members, four of whom are appointed by the Governor, all of whom serve without pay. The president of each county court is a member ex officio of the county council, and not more than three members can belong to the same political party. The State Department directs and supervises the work of county councils and their employees. According to the law, "no employee shall be a candidate for or hold any other public office or trust, nor shall he be a member of any political committee, nor shall he serve as an election official". The law requires the State Director "to adopt a merit system of personnel management in conformity with federal legislation and promulgate in connection therewith a classification and compensation plan".

MERIT SYSTEM COUNCIL

West Virginia made her acquaintance with personnel administration on the merit basis as a result of the 1939 amendments to the Social Security Act. The Act now requires that all state agencies that receive Federal grants for aid to dependent children, old-age assistance, maternal and child welfare, and unemployment compensation, select their employees on a non-partisan merit basis.

In order to be eligible for these Federal grants, the State Department of Public Assistance, Health, and Unemployment Compensation collaborated in the establishment of a Merit System Council for their joint administrative needs.

Work on the West Virginia Merit System Council began to get under way in the summer of 1940, but it was not until October 10, 1940, that the System received the official approval of the Federal authorities. Although the United States Employment Service was separated from the Department of Unemployment Compensation and made a Federal agency, it has voluntarily continued to select its personnel according to the joint Merit System rule. In June, 1944, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation of the State Board of Education adopted the Merit System. These five agencies in West Virginia are at present selecting personnel on a merit basis and are using the services of the joint Merit System.

The Merit System Council consists of three members appointed by the Governor upon recommendation of the agencies concerned. The Council is responsible for the establishment of general policies for the administration of Merit System examinations, the hearing of appeals, review of classification and compensation plans of the State agencies under its jurisdiction, and recommendations to those agencies to insure uniformity of personnel practices. It is also the duty of the Council to select and recommend for appointment by the Governor, a Merit System Supervisor. The Council is charged with the responsibility of inspecting and reviewing the activities of the Supervisor at all times to insure conformity with policies which have been formulated.

The present Council, since July 1, 1943, consists of Mrs. Victor Shaw, Fairmont, Chairman; Dr. M. R. Dodd, Charleston, and Dr. E. M. Sunley, Morgantown. Mr. Robert F. Bingaman, Charleston, was appointed Supervisor August 27, 1942. The budget for the Merit System office provides for the services of a Personnel Assistant, one Principal Clerk, two Senior Clerks, one Senior Stenographer, two Junior Stenographers, and one Typist; consultants, test graders, and monitors are used when examinations are given.

The Merit System has given sixteen different series of examinations. Each series consists of examinations for several different positions. The examining process differs somewhat for different positions. In a few instances the examinations are unassembled and consist of rating the applicant on education and experience and on an oral interview. Doctors in the Department of Health are examined in this manner. Most of the examinations are assembled and require a written examination. The applicants are rated on their experience and education, and for some positions they are given a performance test.

Separate registers are established for each position. Names are placed on these eligible lists according to the final average grade, with the persons who made the best grades listed at the top. When a vacancy occurs in an agency in a particular position, the Merit System Office certifies the three highest names from the registers and the agency chooses one of these for the appointment.

After an employee has served a probationary period, usually six months, and he is retained as satisfactory, he is certified as permanent and cannot be dismissed without cause; and if dismissed, he has a right of appeal to the Merit System Council.

UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION

HOMER W. HANNA, Director

1. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Federal Legislation

The Federal Security Law was enacted by Congress and approved in August. 1935. Titles III and IX of this law are the original statutes pertaining to unemployment compensation having a direct bearing on the West Virginia Unemployment Compensation Law. Title III provides for federal grants to states to cover the expenses of administering state laws and to establish certain minimum standards with which the state law must conform in order to qualify for federal grants. Title IX is an enabling act that authorizes a federal excise tax on all employers having eight or more individuals in their employment. The tax rate with respect to employment under Title IX of the federal act is as follows: One per cent on total wages payable for 1937; three per cent on total wages payable in 1938 and thereafter. The Act provides that a liable employer in a state that has adopted an unemployment compensation law may deduct the amount of the contribution paid to such state from the amount of excise tax payable to the federal government, not to exceed, however, ninety per cent of such federal excise tax.

West Virginia Law

On March 1, 1935, the Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 10 providing for a joint committee of twelve members to study social security legislation and to report its recommendations to the Governor was adopted. On December 14, the second Extraordinary Session of the State Legislature of 1936 was called together for the express purpose of enacting, in conformity with the requirements of the Federal Security Act, such legislation as it deemed wise, dealing with Unemployment Compensation. The West Virginia Unemployment Compensation Law, Chapter 21-a of the Code of West Virginia, was passed December 16, 1936. The purpose of the law as expressed in the act itself is:—"to provide reasonable and effective means for the promotion of social and economic security by reducing as far as possible the hazards of unemployment."

From time to time various amendments to the law have been made dealing with contribution rates, benefit tables, waiting periods, etc. The revisions of the law in 1943 provide for combined wage credits earned in different states. The law provided that the following brackets be included in scale of reduced rates in the experience rating system:—2.7%, 2.4%, 2.1%, 1.8%, 1.4% and 9% It makes it mandatory upon the Director to suspend decreased rates whenever the trust fund falls to \$25,000,000 and to supersede such suspension whenever the fund reaches \$30,000,000. It provides that benefit payments range from \$7.00 to \$18.00 per week and that the duration is 16 weeks. The earnings in the base period were changed to a mere maximum of \$250.00 in the base period. In addition to the above changes, disqualifications were drastically amended to stiffen the disqualification penalties for voluntary quitting without good cause.

2. ORGANIZATION OF THE DEPARTMENT

In conformity with the law, a Director was appointed with direction over all the administrative activities of the department and with authority to create other divisions than the Unemployment Compensation and the Employment Service Divisions.

The Director saw fit to create:

- A Legal Division
- A Fiscal Division (Business Management)
- A Research and Statistics Division
- A Personnel Division

The Unemployment Compensation Division is subdivided into five main sections as follows:

Contributions Accounting Section Benefit Section Field Investigation Section Local Office Claims Section Tabulating Section

On January 1, 1942, the Employment Service Division was transferred by Executive Order of the President to the Federal Government for the duration of the war.

Personnel

The personnel of the Department is governed by the Merit System. The Merit System provides rules for recruitment, terminations, classifications, salary range, salary increases, annual leave, sick leave, etc.

Due to the decrease in unemployment in the state, and to our employees entering into the military service and private industry, our personnel has decreased during the fiscal year, July 1, 1942-June 30, 1943, 30%. As of June 30, 1942, we had 215 employees and in June, 1943, we had 150 employees, a decrease of 65 individuals. The personnel for January, 1944, has been reduced to 106.



Importance of an Adequate Reserve Fund

From the very nature of its purpose a Reserve Fund is of value only in times of unemployment. So long as there is full employment the need for benefit payments drops to negligible proportions. Only once since the enactment of the West Virginia Unemployment Compensation Law has there been a real test of the adequacy of the reserve fund. This occurred in 1938. As the preceding table shows us the total benefits exceeded the total contribution for that year something like \$3,000,000. Within a period of three months the department paid out more than five and a half million dollars. The experience was sufficiently impressive to occasion some anxiety as to what might happen when the war ends,

and the war industries shut down, and the service men return from the army and navy. For three or more years there has been a demand for man power and woman power both from the fighting fields and from war industries. This has not only reduced unemployment but it has increased taxable wages, consequently the reserve fund has increased from \$7,183,926.28 as of 1938 to \$55,494,735.32 by June 30, 1944. In fact, the increase has been such as to encourage employers to urge the legislature to reduce contribution rates, and to encourage employees to ask for more liberal benefits. And as a matter of fact the 1943 legislature did reduce the contribution rates and also increased benefit rates. As long as there is so little unemployment there is, of course, no occasion for alarm. But should the war end suddenly and the war industries cancel their contracts for war materials we would undoubtedly have a great deal of unemployment. Since the taxable wages during the base period have risen and since there has been an increase in the benefit rates the benefit payments will be considerably larger than they were in 1938. In fact, the average weekly benefit check is now approximately \$15.00 as compared with about \$9.00 in 1938. If unemployment persists the reserve fund will dwindle rather rapidly.

The studies of the Division of Research and Statistics estimate that should the war end by December, 1944, that the benefit payments during 1945 would amount to \$36,000,000. This amount would approximately reduce the reserve one-half. This would still leave a fair sum for later demands. But should wages decline and unemployment continue it is conceivable that the fund would in time become exhausted. It would be hard to realize the anxiety which even a minor cut in employment would occasion were it not for an adequate reserve. It is a source of confidence for employers as well as employees to know that West Virginia has or will have a reserve fund by the end of 1944 of more than \$60,000,000, which will go far toward alleviating the distress and hardships that have accompanied periods of prolonged unemployment in years past.

Purpose of Selective Service System is to procure men for the armed forces, a task that must be accomplished with maximum efficiency, economy and equity, and a minimum of disturbance to the social, economic, industrial and agricultural life of the Nation. The processes are registration, classification and selection, and delivery for induction. The Governor of the State is responsible for the administration of the Selective Service law, and performs the functions through the "State Headquarters for Selective Service."

History of Selective Service

The Selective Service System was created by Act of Congress, approved by the President September 16, 1940.

The head of the System in each State is the Governor and, under the Law and Regulations, one local board is created for each thirty thousand population and one appeal board for each seventy thousand population. Under the Law and Regulations, the Governor administers the System through members of the National Guard of the United States and of the State assigned to the State Staff and State Detachment.

At the organization, the then Governor, Honorable Homer A. Holt, appointed members for the required number of local boards throughout the State and the appeal boards, local board Appeal Agents, Medical Examiners, Medical and Registrants' Advisory Boards.

On approval of the Act, the following officers and enlisted men of the State Staff and the State Detachment were ordered to active duty with the Army of the United States:

All of the above enlisted men, except Master Sgt. Slack and Tech. Sgt. Ball, have either been discharged or transferred to other branches.

On the expiration of the term of General Horner as Adjutant General, he was relieved as State Director and assigned to the Regimental Staff of the 150th Infantry, which on January 17, 1941, was called to active service.

Lieut. Colonel Carleton C. Pierce was designated as Acting State Director and Acting Adjutant General and served as such until he was retired by age on October 19, 1941. He was then appointed State Director of Selective Service in a civilian capacity and continued to serve as Acting Adjutant General, having been called back to active National Guard duty in the grade of Brigadier General formerly held.

The Headquarters was opened in the Office of the Adjutant General and the System began to function in a smooth and orderly manner.

The first Call came in November, 1940, and regular Calls have been met each month since that time varying in size from the one hundred fifty-five sent on the first Call to as much as sixty-five hundred in some months and, up to the time of this writing, forty-six Calls have been met for white registrants and forty-six Calls for colored registrants.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE IN WEST VIRGINIA

A state war-born agency, Civilian Defense turned a new corner in late 1943 and early 1944 from its latent possibilities to its aggressive action in the form of active auxiliaries in the protective program and vigorous efforts in all forms of services arising on the home front.

Few blackouts were held by wardens, firemen, police and other auxiliary services but OCD contributed major assistance in one of the state's worst disasters in history when a tornado tore through central West Virginia leaving 106 dead, hundreds hurt and thousands homeless. In this the various volunteers of CD in Harrison, Taylor, Marion and surrounding counties put to good use their training for all types of disasters. Mobilized by county directors, CD gave valuable manpower assistance to the Red Cross in caring for victims. Hundreds were attended by emergency medical units when their injuries were not serious enough to gain them admittance to over-crowded hospitals.

Throughout the state as a regular duty CD trained police and firemen are on active duty because communities have been unable to find replacements for regular departments. A score of fires have been fought by Auxiliary departments where no regular fire fighting force exists.

Thus while there has arisen no dangers from enemy action, Civilian Defense-instructed citizens have proven an extreme benefit in normal pursuits. The 16,500 Forest Fire Fighting Service members fought throughout the fire seasons to again reduce the state's timber loss.

A test made by national officials including Army men, proves that while many counties have been seemingly inactive, there has been no deterioration of the defense units which could spring into action within a few hours and present an almost solid front to battle any disaster.

On the service side Civilian Defense has carried on the major burden of digging out needed salvage in every corner of the state. In many ways those who volunteered and were trained under Civilian Defense programs of the past two years are now coperating with regular services to perform many needed duties resulting from war-time situations. The extensive programs mapped by CD are finding general adoption by communities.

Lending of particular aid for service men and women has been a leading factor in CD service work since January 1, 1944.

Because of the elimination of the blackouts and a diminishing training schedule on the protective side, we have gradually reduced our staff which now includes Walter R. Mitchell as assistant executive director; Farley W. Bell as state-wide supervisor and a smaller office personnel. However the slash in the state office management does not affect the state chiefs of services who remain on call.

Lt. Col. James P. Easley, the Army's liaison officer with the state office since the inauguration of Civilian Defense, was transferred by the service to San Francisco in July, 1944. Colonel A. D. Patterson now serves in Easley's role in addition to being Field Protection Officer of the Fifth Service Command with headquarters in Chicago.




